71%

of the Community are supportive of the grade reconfiguration of K-3, 4-6, 7-8, and 9-12.

63%

of the community felt they received enough information from the community forum presentations and Q&A sessions to determine their level of support for the proposed changes.

The Board of Education has approved the new grade configuration as follows:

- Current - K-5 (Elementary), 6-8 (Middle) and 9-12 (High) grade spans.
- New - K-3 (Primary Elementary), 4-6 (Upper Elementary), 7-8 (Middle), 9-12 (High School) grade spans.

The new grade configuration will focus our efforts on becoming Schools of Distinction with a relentless focus on all students reading by 3rd grade, moving 6th grade into upper elementary school, and providing enhanced course offerings and opportunities in grades 7-12. The expansion of FCCTC and CMS offerings will conclude the K-12 school experience with required Credentials, Internships, and Apprenticeship prior to graduation to upgrade the value of a High School Diploma.

As a reminder, the Elementary Schools are full and at capacity in 9 of our 13 elementary schools as we continue to grow by 1% or 100 students per year. The middle school buildings infrastructure systems are approaching end of life and our high school CTE and CMS programs need expanding. This will take 3-7 years to fully complete all changes.

TIMEFRAME OF GRADE CONFIGURATION CHANGES

2025-2030

Build a 4th grade - 6th grade Upper Elementary School on 76 acres of land owned by CASD in Green Village near the current Grandview Elementary School.

Renovate and add on to CAMS North or CAMS South to house the 1400 7th grade - 8th grade students.

Build/Renovate Grandview Elementary School and expand capacity to 400-600 students.

Expand seats at CMS and FCCTC with 8 additional programs at FCCTC and 300 more seats at CMS

Depending on the timing and completion of each project above, the schools we would repurpose include Lurgan, Guilford Hills, Falling Spring, Buchanan and CAMS North or South. When fully implemented the grade configuration and educational programming will be updated as we bring all of our students together in one school starting in 4th grade. This approach will create enrollment capacity for the next 10-15 years and provide the most flexibility.

FINANCING THE FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS

WHERE ARE WE NOW AND HOW WILL WE GET FULLY FUNDED.

The current physical footprint of the Chambersburg Area School District includes 17 school buildings totaling 1,656,038 square feet. Over the past two decades, CASD has worked to make needed facility improvements of our buildings and in some instances, building consolidations. This needed work has resulted in the District's annual debt payment is \$11,420,019.

Planning for the Schools of Distinction by 2030, we have identified a future footprint of the District. While we are still early in the planning process, we have identified the need for significant additional capital; and we have started the process of working with our Financial Advisor. We will need to increase our annual debt payments from \$11,420,019 to approximately \$24,618,890.

A preliminary model of borrowing additional capital would require the District to phase in borrowings over a 4 year period starting in the Fall of 2025 and ending in the Spring of 2028. The School Board anticipated this need for the past 3 years with a resolution to set 1% of revenue to build up the debt service fund. In addition, we have allocated approximately 40% of the 8.2 million dollars in reoccurring state subsidy funds towards future debt payments.

The closing/repurposing of four elementary schools and one middle school would certainly bring financial savings by increasing efficiencies in staffing and operational costs while also increasing educational opportunities for all students.

The question is, can we afford this and how can we get to the required level of debt service in the budget? The answer is yes, but is dependent on several factors:



Will the State of Pennsylvania follow through on the Fair Funding formula, which will send to Chambersburg significantly increased state revenue thus lessening the reliance on local tax efforts?



Will the economy stay strong with historically low unemployment rates in Franklin County thus providing strong Earned Income Taxes to the District and strong collection rates for Real Estate Taxes?



How much time will it take to build the footprint of 2030?

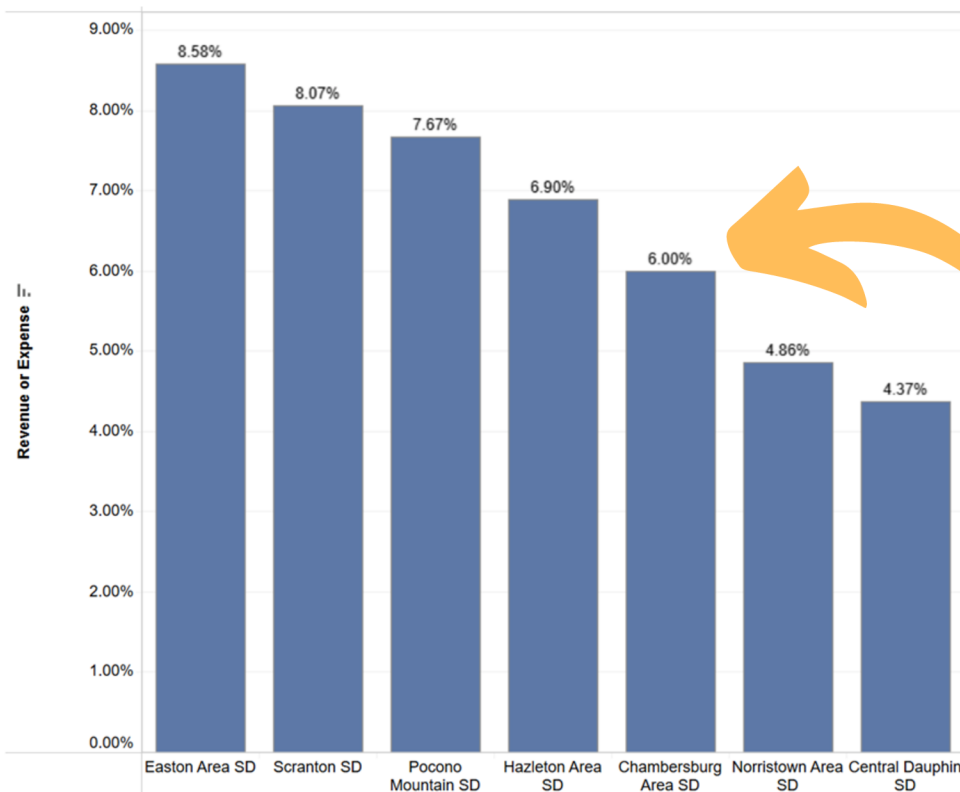


DEBT SERVICE FUND

So how do we get to \$24,618,890 of debt service by the end of fiscal 2028? For the past few fiscal years, the District has been building both the Debt Service Fund and the Capital Reserve Fund. While these funds are one-time revenue and not recurring, both will help sustain the District's capital needs for the future. Additionally, we are planning for the recurring debt service requirement by building additional expenditures into the general fund budget. The chart below shows one path the District can take to reach the goal of \$24,600,000.

NEW STAFFING ENHANCEMENTS TO MEET AND SUPPORT STUDENTS

Dean of Student Affairs: Each elementary school will have a dean of student affairs (replacing the head teacher model) to provide targeted support for interventions, assisting in student behavior, mentoring new teachers, and ensuring access to quality education for all students within the elementary division. (Safer Schools)

Counselors: The addition of 3 elementary counselors will align the student to counselor ratio with the middle and high school level to 1 counselor to 350 students. (Healthier Students)

Interventionist: The addition of 4 interventionists will provide targeted support in reading to meet the district goal of all students reading, comprehending, and writing by the end of 3rd grade. (More Students on Grade Level)

Content Specialists (non supervisory): These 35 Content Specialists will provide essential expertise, foster professional development, ensure curriculum alignment, address diverse learner needs, and leverage data for continuous improvement. Investing in Content Specialists will ultimately lead to a more effective, and enriching educational experience for all students, equipping them with the skills and knowledge necessary for success in an ever-changing world. The Content Specialists will be assigned grade level bands (K-3, 4-6, 7-8, 9-12). (Improved Student Learning)

Directors: Director of Early Childhood (K-3), Director of Mid-Level (4-8), Director of College and Career Readiness (9-12), Director of Educational Services. The directors will ensure continuity, drive academic excellence, and support succession planning. We will be eliminating 3 administrative positions and repurpose the funds to these positions.

ENHANCED SECURITY AND SAFETY

The Federal ESSERS Grant is coming to an end and has enabled us to purchase counseling/trauma response kits, surveillance cameras, pa systems, portable radios, classroom go-kits and more.

Chambersburg Area School District has been fortunate to use several grants to keep our safety and security updated around our campuses.

The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) Grant in the amount of \$150,000.00 has enabled us to install LED Lighting for all building parking lots and playground fencing at the elementary schools.

The Meritorious Grant in the amount of \$45,000.00 enabled us to purchase and install additional surveillance cameras. The high school has 165 new cameras and each of the middle schools have about 40 cameras each.

Recently, the Board approved a new Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) Grant that is available to us in the amount of \$277,000.00 on January 28th. This will enable us to add a K-9 officer for the District. The K-9 will be certified in narcotics detection. The dog will be around to all the schools and will be more of a community service based project for us with service work that we feel is critical to the district.

We will also have a metal detection system to use at athletic events and other events held at the schools. We piloted the detection system in October and it was very helpful in preventing potential issues in a large sporting event. This is a detection system that picks up all ferrous metals within 36" from the pole. Safety bollards are also being considered for entrances at some of the schools.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Our district's [Artificial Intelligence \(AI\) Policy](#) is designed to help staff and students use AI tools responsibly and ethically, while safeguarding student privacy and data. AI can enhance learning, streamline tasks, and assist with administration, but it must be used carefully and within established guidelines. The new CASD policy establishes guidelines for transparency, accountability, and a safe environment.

Teachers are responsible for providing students with notice of whether AI use is permitted on a particular assignment or project. Students should be using the AI assessment scale below which will be provided when completing assignments. If students receive a teacher notice on the inappropriate use of AI, any violation is subject to discipline.



NO AI

The assessment is completed entirely without AI assistance. This level ensures that students rely solely on their knowledge, understanding, and skills.

AI must not be used at any point during the assessment.

AI-ASSISTED IDEA GENERATION AND STRUCTURING

AI can be used in the assessment for brainstorming, creating structures, and generating ideas for improving work.

No AI content is allowed in the final submission.

AI-ASSISTED EDITING

AI can be used to make improvements to the clarity or quality of student created work to improve the final output, but no new content can be created using AI.

AI can be used, but your original work with no AI content must be provided in an appendix.

AI TASK COMPLETION, HUMAN EVALUATION

AI is used to complete certain elements of the task, with students providing discussion or commentary on the AI-generated content. This level required critical engagement with AI-generated content and evaluating its output.

You will use AI to completed specified tasks in your assessment. Any AI created content must be cited.

FULL AI

AI should be used as a 'co-pilot' in order to meet the requirements of the assessment, allowing for a collaborative approach with AI and enhancing creativity.

You may use AI throughout your assessment to support your own work and do not have to specify which content is AI generated.
