

School Spotlights

Owl of the Week! By: Rihana Dye

It's time for a new topic! The third marking period can be stressful. With the end of the year approaching and tests, your teachers try to fit in all the lessons they can while making sure you're prepared for your finals and regents. The end of sports seasons and even the long winters can be stressful, so we are going to ask people for ways to reduce stress!

This week we picked the one and only Mrs. Torre! She has been a certified school counselor in NY state since 1996 and this is her 27th year here at HCS. She chose counseling because she wanted to help young people and she thought working in a school environment would be the best way to do that.

"A good counselor never offers advice, because we don't presume to know what is best for every person. However, I can offer some general tips that we often follow to help people best understand themselves."

- 1. "Learn your triggers. It helps to understand what situations or events are most stressful to you. This can be different for everyone."
- 2. "Learn how your stress feels for you. How does it make you feel physically? How does it impact your thoughts? How does it impact your feelings? This helps people recognize when they begin getting stressed or helps anticipate stress so that they can put in place a plan to deal with it."
- 3. "Develop strategies that help you prepare for stressful times and use them to handle stressful situations. Again, this can differ depending on the person. Generally speaking, physical exercise, (in the daylight when possible) and good sleep (8-10 hours per night for teens ages 13-18 according to the American Academy of Pediatrics-even more for kids under 13!) help regulate the body and brain. Other people enjoy being in nature or creative outlets like drawing, journaling, playing, or listening to music to reduce stress. There are also cognitive behavioral techniques that we sometimes teach in school like breathing exercises that can slow heart rate, guided imagery, and progressive muscle relaxation."

"Your school counselor or an outside counselor can help teach these and explore other strategies to help. HCS school counselors also have lists of outside providers families can use if students and their families are interested in more information about outside resources."

With Ms. Torre's experience, her tips can be very useful for reducing stress and understanding yourself better when it comes to stressful situations.

Elon Musk Offers 97 Billion Dollars For ChatGPT Parent Company By- Dorothy Disha

In a high-stakes bid that could dictate the future of artificial intelligence, Elon Musk is



leading a group of investors who have offered to buy OpenAI, the parent company of ChatGPT, for \$97.4 billion. OpenAI CEO Sam Altman on Monday promptly posted on

X: "No thank you but we will buy Twitter for \$9.74 billion if you want."

OpenAI is operated by a nonprofit that controls an entity called OpenAI LP, a for-profit company within the larger company's structure. That for-profit company took OpenAI from unknown and unsuccessful, to worth over 100 billion in a couple of years. Musk co-founded OpenAI with Altman in 2015 as a nonprofit but left before the company took off. He founded the competing AI startup xAI in 2023.

Part of the SEPTA's Wilmington- Newark Regional Rail line burst into flames near the Crum Lynne Station as it was traveling from Philadelphia to Wilmington, Delaware Approximately around 6 p.m. on Thursday, February 6th, 2025. This week's review will be on the album PARTYNEXTDOOR 2 by PARTYNEXTDOOR or just "Party" for short.



Released on July 30, 2014, *PARTYNEXTDOOR TWO* solidified PARTYNEXTDOOR as one of OVO Sound's most unique and influential artists. Building on the moody, atmospheric sound he introduced in his debut project, this album takes listeners deeper into his world of late-night thoughts, heartbreak, and self-reflection, all wrapped in his signature blend of R&B and trap production.

The album is full of intrusive thoughts-like tracks, but my personal favorite is *Belong to the City*. The track makes you feel like you're walking in downtown Toronto at night, with a psychedelic feeling rushing through your mind.

Other tracks like *Her Way* and *Bout It* highlight PND's ability to create slow-burning, hypnotic melodies that stick with you long after the song ends. The production, handled mostly by himself, remains minimalistic yet immersive, allowing his unique vocal style to take center stage.

Lyrically, *PARTYNEXTDOOR TWO* explores themes of love, temptation, and the highs and lows of relationships, with PND's signature mix of confidence and vulnerability woven throughout.

With *PARTYNEXTDOOR TWO*, PND delivered an album that perfectly captures the late-night, introspective energy that has since become his trademark. Overall 7.8/10 After a long and expensive journey leading into the following day


