Each month at Byron Elementary, we celebrate positive behavior across our school with a ticket assembly. These assemblies are held the last Wednesday of each month and are split between DK-2 and 3-5 grades. Students earn eagle tickets by showing kindness, offer-ing respect, acting responsibly and remembering safety. Once a ticket is earned, the students can select a drawing to enter in for a random chance at monthly prizes. Thanks to the Erik Jones Foundation, the students can win a gold coin for a new, potentially autographed, book via our book vending machine. The excitement is palpable every month as coins are handed out to the lucky winners! The vending machine will continue to be stocked with high interest books for months to come with another generous donation of \$2,000 from the Erik Jones Foundation. Thank you Erik Jones Foundation!

Another exciting ticket option is our "Read with Mara" drawing. Each month, students can win some special time with our Mara, our certified therapy dog in our school library. The kids love this option as Mara snuggles them and gets some pettings all while the students practice their reading skills. It's a WIN-WIN!

And it is working! Byron Elementary tracks discipline daily and analyzes reports to improve practices to support our students social, emotional and behavioral needs. Since this system has been put in place, our major office referrals have decreased each month from last year to this current school year. For example, this December we only had two major referrals compared to last year's December count of 16! Over the last two years, Byron Elementary students earn well below the 25% for the national average of referrals when compared to other schools our size. We are proud of the work that we have done as a staff over the last 2.5 years in terms of our PBIS and MTSS systems. With these systems, we have increased opportunities to support students using social skills intervention groups as well as Check In, Check Out interventions. We are seeing the results of these heavy workloads but the success of our Eagles makes it all worth it!

I thought this would be a perfect opportunity to celebrate this fantastic accomplishment.

The MIHEARTSafe School award recognizes a school's efforts to prevent sudden cardiac death in young people and preparedness for a cardiac emergency. This three-year designation ensures that schools have: Accessible, clearly marked Automatic External DefiNURSES CORNER

brillators (AEDs) that make it possible, in the event of an emergency, for rescuers to use one in under three minutes.

•A designated cardiac emergency response team that trains on a regular basis and knows what to do in the event of an emergency, along with a written, regularly updated emergency response plan.

•Team members who receive regular CPR and AED training.

 Coaches who receive regular CPR and AED training. •A cardiac emergency response team that conducts cardiac emergency response drills.

Our team began working toward obtaining this des-ignation during the 2023-2024 school year. Last fall, we assembled a team in each building and began training sessions, including running mock scenarios before and after school hours and working with members of our

local Burns Township Fire Department to simulate what waiting for their arrival would be like. With help from our Byron PTA, we were able to purchase a portable AED unit that coaches can have available if desired. We have also been offering American Heart Association CPR/AED classes for staff and students. For the first time ever, our graduating seniors received hands-only CPR training and learned how to use an AED.

In November, we were able to attend a virtual ceremony, at which Byron Area Schools was presented with the MIHEARTSafe Award, along with only 256 other Michigan schools receiving this honor. While earning this designation is exciting, the most important thing is knowing our students, staff, volunteers, and visitors are safer with these emergency response plans in place.

Participating in CTE programs provide students with many valuable benefits, such as the chance to earn free college credit and industry-recognized credentials. Students also gain hands-on experience through field trips, job shadowing, and both paid and unpaid work opportunities. These programs offer leadership and community service experiences, along with key skills like resume writing and mock interviews. Furthermore, students build important skills in teamwork, collaboration, and problem-solving, all of which are essential for success in any career.





OTHER GREAT OPTIONS FOR BYRON JUNIORS AND SENIORS:

THE SHIAWASSEE EARLY COLLEGE PROGRAM

The Shiawassee Early College Program (SECP) is a 3-year program that allows selected students to extend high school by one year in order to earn both their high school diploma and up to 60 college credits. Our current postsecondary partners include Baker College, Lansing Community College, Mott Community College, and the University of Michigan-Flint. Students in the SECP will follow a prescribed program of study, with classes offered online, in-person, or in a hybrid format. Upon completion, students can earn one or more of the following: a MEMCA technical certificate, the Michigan Transfer Agreement (30 transferable credits), a professional certification, or an Associate's Degree (up to 60 college credits).

DUAL ENROLLMENT:

Dual Enrollment through the Shiawassee RESD enhances a student's high school experience by allowing them to take college courses during their junior and senior years. Our current post-secondary partners include Lansing Community College, Mott Community College, and Baker College. Courses are available in online, in-person, or hybrid formats. Students will collaborate with their high school counselor to incorporate dual enrollment courses into their high school schedule. This opportunity allows students to earn college credits while working toward their high school diploma.

THE GENESEE CAREER **INSTITUTE (GCI)**

The Genesee Career Institute (GCI) offers students both instruction and hands-on experience

in high-wage, high-demand fields, preparing them for immediate entry into the workforce or for college-level programs. At GCI, students have access to various opportunities, including gaining knowledge and skills in their chosen field, developing marketable skills for quick employment, and earning college credits at recognized colleges and trade schools. Students can also earn industry-recognized certifications, participate in internship placements and work-based learning, and compete in Career Technical Student Organization events. Additional opportunities include job placement assistance, field trips to colleges and businesses, guest lectures, and volunteer projects. Junior completers also have the chance to return for a senior year of advanced studies with internship placements. The Genesee Career Institute (GCI) offers a wide range of programs for the 2024-25 academic year, including Agriscience, Architecture and Construction, Arts, Audio/Video Technology, and Communications, Education and Training, Finance, Government and Public Administration, Health Science, Hospitality and Tourism, Human Services, Information Technology, Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security, Manufacturing, Marketing, Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics, and US Army JROTC.
