I. STUDENT CODES

STUDENT DRESS CODE:

The DHS dress code is created to promote safety, good hygiene, workforce readiness, and a wholesome school environment. Certain styles of attire, while accepted elsewhere, are not appropriate at school. All students are expected to follow the dress code while on school grounds before, during, and after school. The administration will make the final decision of any questionable dress code issue.

A. General Rules:

- No excessively tight or oversized clothing.
- No outer clothing which resembles loungewear, pajamas, underwear, or blankets of any kind
- No fads and styles, which differ extremely from conventionally accepted standards, such as pants with slogans/writings across the buttocks.
- All ripped or torn clothing must have leggings or other attire underneath such that skin is not showing.
- Avoid any clothing that is distracting because of extremes in style, fit, color, pattern, fabric, etc.
- No exposed tattoos or clothing that include profanity, nudity, alcohol, drugs, or discriminatory, racist, or gang-related symbols or known gang affiliated colors
- No slides, bedroom shoes, or shoes without a back are allowed anytime while students are on campus.
- No Caps, Hoodies, Scarfs, Do-rags, or headgear of any kind shall be worn inside classrooms or the campus during the instructional day.

B. Specific Rules:

- Blouses/Tops not appropriate for school include those that are low-cut (showing cleavage), see-through, backless, tube tops, tops that expose shoulders, etc. Halter tops, tank tops, strapless tops, spaghetti straps, or tops of any type that expose the bra will NOT be allowed. The midriff must not be exposed when a student goes through the normal activities of a school day (i.e., bending, stretching, reaching, etc.).
- Clothing and socks shall be free of inflammatory, suggestive, racial, or other inappropriate
 writing, advertisement, or artwork. This also includes offensive words and designs, violence
 (blood, death, and weapons), sex, hate groups, tobacco or vaping products, drugs, and alcohol or
 gang membership.
- Dresses, skirts, and shorts must be no higher than 4 inches above the crease in back of the knee.
- Pants will be worn at the waist—NO SAGGING! Wearing pants below the buttocks to
 expose the underwear is in violation of the Dublin City Ordinance. Tights, biker shorts, leggings,
 and jeggings are prohibited as outerwear.
- Shirts may be draped below the waistline, but shirts cannot be oversized, or tied to resemble a
 midriff.
- Shoes or sandals with a back must be worn at all times. House shoes or bedroom slippers (or any shoe that resembles house/bedroom shoes) are strictly prohibited. Also prohibited: flip flops and slides.

C. Accessories

Headgear, including hats, caps, hoods, sweatbands, scarfs, bandanas, "doo rags," head wraps, sunglasses, combs, picks, curlers, headphones and earbuds, etc., are NOT allowed at any time during the school day.

 All students must comply with the dress code for the entire school day. This includes cheerleaders, dance teams, flag corps, athletes, and other groups, except during performances or special activities approved by the principal.

D. Book Bag Policy

• Students are <u>only</u> permitted to carry MESH or CLEAR book bags to class. Certain book bags may be deemed too large and if so will be prohibited from being brought to school. All book bags must be carried. No rolling book bags are permitted on campus without prior authorization from administration. If a student is a member of a DHS Athletic team, they will be allowed one team bag to carry his/her sports equipment. They will be encouraged to place these items in a locker or a designated location assigned by a coach or administrator until the end of the school day.

Cell Phones and Other Electronic Devices. Cell phones and other electronic devices ARE NOT TO BE USED at school during the instructional school day, including lunch periods, breaks, and change of classes. Cell phones must be turned off and kept OUT OF SIGHT at all times. During class time, cell phones will be required to be stored in a Cell Phone Pocket Chart Storage located in every classroom. Students will be required to place their cell phone in the Cell Phone Chart Storage upon entering the classroom and for the duration of that class time. Cell phones must be turned off. The cell phone chart storage pocket will be under the supervision of the classroom teacher. During transitions in the hallway between each of the four blocks, cell phones should be kept in book bags. They are not to be kept in pants, jacket, shirt or hoodie pockets. Cell phone accessories (headphones, chargers, etc.) are to be kept in book bags or purses as well. The use of cell phones while on school buses is strictly prohibited unless an emergency situation arises and students have permission from the bus driver. Violations of this policy will usually result in the following disciplinary action:

First Offense: 3 days of ISS.
Second Offense: 5 days of ISS.
Third Offense: 10 days of ISS.

Continued violations will result in additional disciplinary action.

Cell phones or cameras containing **indecent**, **nude**, **or pornographic pictures or video**, **photos of drugs**, **weapons**, **acts of violence**, **or gang-related activity** will be confiscated and kept indefinitely or turned over to police. Recordings on campus of any event including verbal or physical confrontations will be confiscated by school administrators as part of any investigation.

We are not responsible for lost or stolen cell phones.

DHS DRESS CODE EXAMPLES

The dress code will be enforced **DAILY** at Dublin High School. Please assist us by ensuring that your child is dressed following the school-wide dress code. When we have to call parents for repeated violations, this not only interferes with your child's instructional time, but it also impacts his/her participation in upcoming school-wide events.

Graphic t-shirts MAY be worn. However, ensure they are free from profanity, nudity, alcohol, drugs, discriminatory or gang-related symbols.



While hoodies are acceptable forms of outerwear, no hoods, caps, scarfs or do-rags can be worn on campus during the instructional school day.



Students are only able to carry MESH or CLEAR book bags to class.



Jeans may not have any pre-designed rips, tears, holes or frays as to expose skin. Neither biker shorts or wearing leggings as pants is acceptable.



Crocs MAY be worn as long as the strap is on the back at all times.



House shoes, bedroom slippers, flip-flops and slides are also prohibited.



BUS RIDERS

Bus students may only ride the buses they are assigned for morning and afternoon transportation. They are expected to behave appropriately at all times. Missing the bus is not considered an excuse for tardiness or absence. Bus students will board the buses at the designated area. No car riders should be in this area. School bus transportation is a privilege that may be withdrawn for

inappropriate behavior. Buses are an extension of the school campus, and all rules under the DHS Code of Conduct apply to students on buses and at bus stops.

HIGH SCHOOL DRIVERS

Students may not go to their cars during the school day without permission from the administration. All students must register their cars with the school office, pay a \$15.00 registration fee, and have a current year parking decal. Proof of insurance must be provided. Students who drive to school must follow the rules for driving and parking. Student drivers who are repeatedly late to school unexcused will be subjected to revocation of driving privileges at the discretion of the school administration. Additionally, students who violate driving and parking rules of any kind will be subjected to losing their privileges of driving to school, may be fined, and may have their cars towed from school at the owner's expense. The parking lot is off-limits to students during the school day. Students are to leave cars immediately upon arriving on campus. All students are to leave campus immediately at the end of their school day.





We believe that a safe, secure, flexible and loving environment promotes positive learning communities for academic achievement, personal growth, and emotional well-being.



Our highly-trained safety and security staff monitor, protect and respond 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Our paramount duty is to create a safe learning environment where each student can learn, discover and thrive.

Safety and security staff support and assist in the training of all district staff to be prepared to respond to natural- or human-caused emergencies. We work with communications and school staff to inform families about emergencies as soon as we can with as much information as possible.

We are committed to creating a safe environment in every school, every day. We put a high priority on building relationships with students. And, our safety and security officers proactively work to support our district's promise of supporting the needs of the whole child.

COMMUNICATION DURING AN INCIDENT

In the event of a snowstorm, hurricane, threat to campus or other emergency event, Dublin City Schools will implement safety procedures and may change school start or dismissal times for student safety. Here are the ways we communicate emergency information:

- Automated messages through ParentSquare. Please provide your school with current telephone numbers to reach you and other emergency contacts.
- · Announcements on district and school websites.
- Announcements on social media. Please follow us on Facebook. Twitter and Instagram.
- · Announcements on TV and radio.

Student safety is our number one priority. Our schools have safety plans in place to handle natural disasters, security issues, and other emergency situations, in coordination with local law enforcement and first responders. Help us keep your child safe by following these emergency DOs and DON'Ts.

DO: PREPARE IN ADVANCE



Bookmark our Website: We will post the latest available information at dcsirish.com. Check back frequently for updates and instructions on when and where you can pick up your child if parent pick-up is necessary.



Get Connected: Make sure we have your current phone number and email address on file so we can reach you quickly with an automated text, or email about an emergency situation. When you move, change jobs, or get a new number, please update your contact information with your child's front office.



Have Identification Ready: Always bring a photo ID when picking up your child. This supports school staff with verifying identities quickly and maintaining the safety of all students.



Plan Ahead: Discuss reunification plans with your child ahead of time so they understand the process and won't be alarmed. Let them know to follow their teacher's instructions and not try to leave the school on their own.

DON'T



Call Your Child's School:

Resources are stretched thin during emergencies. Incoming calls take away from our ability to get updates to you through our website, mass notification system, and social media platforms.



Rush to the School: Coming to school may put you or your child at great risk. Additional people on the scene distract first responders from their primary job – keeping our students and staff safe. Instead, check our website, social media channels or your phone for information and instructions.



Share Unverified
Information: Avoid
spreading unverified
information through social
media or other means. This
can lead to confusion and
hinder the efforts of
emergency responders and
the district.




Attempt to Circumvent Security Procedures:

Even if the process seems slow, do not attempt to pick up your child from unauthorized locations or before you've been notified.

This will ensure everyone's safety.
