SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope you had a joyful holiday season and are off to a happy and productive start to the new year. By the time you read this, we will have completed the second marking period. Congratulations to the many students who achieved honor roll status! Their names can be found in a later section of this newsletter. It's inspiring to see our students excelling across all aspects of their education. As always, we encourage every student to strive for their personal best, seek support from our dedicated staff and embrace the opportunities our schools offer.

As you may know, Governor Hochul tasked the Rockefeller Institute early in 2024 to evaluate and recommend improvements to New York State's Foundation Aid formula to better ensure equitable and effective education funding. Foundation Aid is the single largest component of state aid that Sauquoit Valley CSD receives. For this school year (2024-25), we are scheduled to receive \$9.4 million of Foundation Aid and approximately \$15.0 million of total state aid from NYS. Here are some key findings from the Rockefeller Institute's December 2024 report:

- The current formula relies on outdated poverty measures and regional cost indices that no longer reflect actual needs.
- Disparities in funding levels disproportionately affect high-poverty and rural districts, including ours.
- A 10% statewide enrollment decline over the past decade has shifted per-student funding requirements.
- "Save harmless" provisions—meant to protect districts from funding decreases—often benefit wealthier areas, contributing to inefficiencies.

The report recommends several updates to address these challenges:

- Using a five-year regional inflation average to stabilize funding
- · Transitioning from weighted formulas to targeted aid for specialized services
- Adjusting local wealth calculations to ensure fairness
- · Phasing out inequitable "save harmless" provisions
- · Allowing districts to maintain larger reserves for unexpected costs
- · Fully funding mandates for electric school buses to ease district transitions

Governor Hochul has recently decided to retain the save harmless provision of the Foundation Aid formula. The save harmless provision states that a school district will not receive less Foundation Aid than it received in the previous year, even if the formula results in a reduced amount of Foundation Aid due to declining enrollment or other factors used in the formula. Currently, Sauquoit Valley is one of 334 school districts on save harmless for Foundation Aid. Though the save harmless provision, as the name implies, is meant to protect school districts from realizing reductions in Foundation Aid, school districts contend that the factors utilized in the formula are outdated and should be updated so that nearly one-half of the school districts in NYS are not utilizing the save harmless provision. We remain cautious about how future state and federal decisions may impact our district. In the meantime, we will continue to explore ways to increase revenue and minimize costs while prioritizing our students' education.

Budget planning for the 2025-26 school year is already underway. I invite you to attend our budget workshops held in the high school library prior to Board of Education meetings. These sessions provide a valuable opportunity to engage with the process as we work diligently to address potential budget gaps while safeguarding our mission to meet the needs of every student. We aim to adopt the final budget on April 8, 2025.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Kindergarten registration for eligible children in the Sauquoit Valley School District will be held March 12 and 13, 2025 from 4:00 - 6:30 p.m. in the elementary school office. Registration will be by appointment only. Please call the elementary office at 315.839.6339 to schedule your appointment. The time slots will be 20 minutes apart.

CHILDREN DO NOT NEED TO BE PRESENT FOR REGISTRATION.

To be eligible for kindergarten:

- •A child must be five years old on or before December 1, 2025.
- •The child must reside in the Sauquoit Valley Central School District.

All paperwork listed must be handed in at the time of registration:

- A completed registration packet
- Copy of a birth certificate
- Immunization record
- Two proofs of residency* *Required documents will be explained in detail in registration packet

If your child attends the Sauquoit Universal Pre-K Program,

you do not need to schedule a time slot. Please send your completed packet in with your child and if we have any questions or need additional paperwork, we will contact you.

You will only have to supply the list below at the time of registration:

- A completed registration packet
- Any new immunizations*
- •If you have moved since your child started Universal Pre-K, you will need to send in new proof of residency.

Students currently enrolled in Head Start or Universal Pre-K will receive a packet prior to registration. If your child is eligible for kindergarten and you have not received a packet, please call the elementary office at 315.839.6339 for a packet.

Senior JUDWAY Katie JUDWAY REPRESENTS SCHOOL AT NATIONAL SCIENCE CONFERENCE

We are proud to highlight the remarkable accomplishments of senior Katie Judway, who recently represented our school at the prestigious American Geophysical Union (AGU) annual conference in Washington, D.C. Katie had the distinguished honor of presenting a published research project she co-authored on the subject of heliospheric physics.


Heliospheric physics is the study of the environment around the sun. This includes the study of plasma, the fourth state of matter, and how solar activities impact other space objects.

Katie's project was the culmination of a paid summer internship she completed through Utica University. She first learned about this exciting opportunity when Dr. Hava Turkakin, a professor at Utica University, visited her Regents physics class last year to discuss research internships available to high school students. Inspired by the presentation, Katie applied for the program and was thrilled to be selected.

Over the summer, she worked closely with Dr. Turkakin and a team of researchers, gaining hands-on experience in scientific inquiry and data analysis. Her research over the summer dealt with geomagnetism, which is the study of Earth's magnetic field. Geomagnetism plays a crucial role in everything from navigation systems to understanding the planet's internal structure. Researchers in this field investigate the origins, variations and effects of Earth's magnetic properties.

At the end of the internship, Dr. Turkakin invited Katie to further her research by enrolling in a college-level course at Utica University. Seizing this unique opportunity, Katie continued her work, which eventually led to her study of heliospheric physics and her research presentation at the AGU conference.

At the conference, Katie delivered her poster presentation over a four-hour period. In addition to presenting her research, she attended several exhibits and interacted with many professionals.



With 35,000 attendees, the conference provided a remarkable networking opportunity. Katie expanded her connections, including making contacts with officials from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

When asked what she learned from the experience, Katie said, "I learned a lot about how research works. Talking to representatives from NASA was really cool. They talked to me about where I can go with my research and what types of careers I can pursue."

Katie has also secured an internship with NASA for the upcoming summer. She will be stationed in Washington, D.C., positioning her well to further grow her professional network. Her future plans include attending SUNY Geneseo, where she will major in astrophysics and minor in mathematics and history. She has also committed to participate on the Geneseo track team. Ultimately, Katie aspires to work for NASA at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Washington, D.C., specializing in solar plasma physics and designing spacecraft capable of traveling near the sun.

Katie's dedication, hard work and passion for science have not only enriched her own academic journey, but have also brought great pride to our school community. We congratulate her on this extraordinary achievement and look forward to seeing her future successes!


