PBIS TRAIT: Responsibility, Self-Control

OBJECTIVE(S):

 SWBAT explain the importance of accepting responsibility for and/or outcomes of their own behavior/choices.

INSTRUCTION AND ACTIVTIES:

- Share an example of a student properly accepting responsibility for their behavior (e.g., apologizing, moving their color without complaining, complying with a request, etc.).
- Share an example of a student who does not accept responsibility for their behavior (e.g., blaming someone else, talking back to the teacher, rolling his/her eyes at the teacher, etc.).
- Discuss the differences between those responses. How do those responses help or hurt the student? How does that student look to others? What would happen if a grownup handled that situation in the same way the kid did?
- Make a t-chart in which students share ways to properly and improperly responsibility and/or consequences for behavior. Some examples are below.

Properly Accepting Responsibility	Improperly accepting responsibility
apologizing	 blaming someone else for what you did
 admitting the truth/what you did 	 talking back to the teacher
not complaining or talking back	rolling eyes
doing what the teacher tells you to do	stomping
 moving your color without issue 	 slamming down books
 getting past the situation and not 	 not doing what the teacher tells you to
letting it affect the rest of your day	do (moving color, go to Buddy Room,
	etc.)

- Discuss what happens if the student handles the situation properly (the student and the teacher can move past the situation and teaching and learning can continue).
 Discuss how handling the situation properly shows respect and self-control.
- Discuss what happens if the student doesn't handle the situation properly (they
 often get in more or bigger trouble for being insubordinate). How does that show
 disrespect or a lack of self control?
- As a class, brainstorm some situations that might occur in which a student has a choice to accept or not accept responsibility. Role-play proper responses to the class-generated situations.
