Fourth Grade – Areas of Focus:

<u>Reading</u>

- Refer to examples in text, describe characters in depth, and be able to identify the theme.

Reading

- Read, comprehend, and identify the theme in various literature, including stories, dramas, and poetry.
- Analyze how visual and multimedia elements contribute to the meaning, tone, or beauty of a text.
- Compare and contrast the overall structure (e.g., chronology, comparison, cause/effect, problem/solution) of events, ideas, concepts, or information in two or more texts.
- Read with sufficient accuracy and fluency to support comprehension.

Writing

- Write and understand narrative, informative, and opinion pieces.
- Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development and organization are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.
- With some guidance and support from adults, use technology, including the Internet, to produce and publish writing as well as to interact and collaborate with others.
- Conduct short research projects that use several sources to build knowledge through investigation of different aspects of a topic.
- Draw evidence from literary or informational texts to support analysis, reflection, and research.
- Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.

- Analyze how an author develops and contrasts the points of view of different characters or narrators in a text.
- Determine an author's point of view or purpose in a text and analyze how the author distinguishes his or her position from that of others.
- Evaluate an argument and specific claims in a text, assessing whether the reasoning is sound and the evidence is relevant and sufficient to support the claims.

- Write arguments to support claims with clear reasons and relevant evidence.
- Write informative/explanatory texts to examine a topic and convey ideas, concepts, and information through the selection, organization, and analysis of relevant content.
- Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, relevant descriptive details, and well-structured event sequences.
- With some guidance and support from peers and adults, develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting, or trying a new approach, focusing on how well purpose and audience have been addressed.
- Draw evidence from literary or informational texts to support analysis, reflection, and research.
- Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.

- Determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text, including figurative and connotative meanings; analyze the impact of specific word choices on meaning and tone, including analogies or allusions to other texts.
- Compare and contrast the structure of two or more texts and analyze how the differing structure of each text contributes to its meaning and style.
- Analyze how differences in the points of view of the characters and the audience or reader
- Analyze how a text makes connections among and distinctions between individuals, ideas, or events.
- Describe and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, assessing whether the reasoning is sound and the evidence is relevant and sufficient; recognize when irrelevant evidence is introduced.
