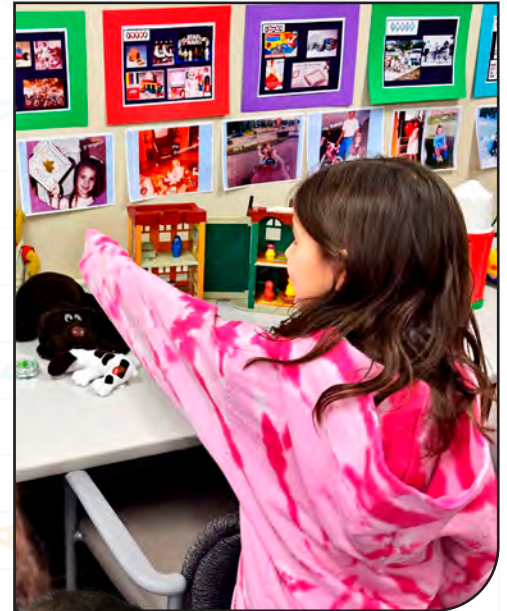

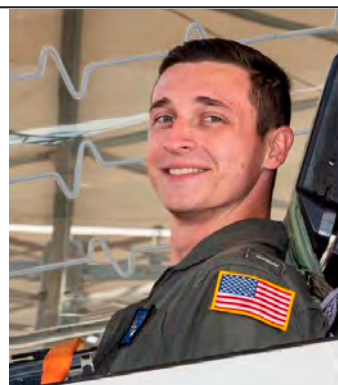

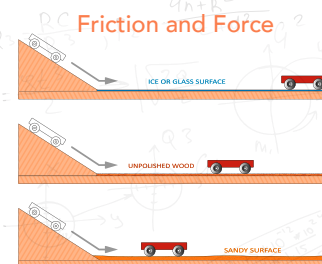

## Focus on force at CCMS

Sixth grade students at CCMS have recently been studying electromagnetism - investigating how different forces work together. Initial lessons focused on how friction and force work together. Through hands-on experimentation, students found that rougher surfaces have more friction and need more force to move an object!



## Government Breakout at CCMS Library

Earlier this month, Middle School Librarian Ms. Loson teamed up with Social Studies teacher Steve Goforth for government breakout review sessions. Seventh grade students visited the library during their Social Studies class and worked in teams to solve a series of puzzles related to American Government. Puzzles included solving Morse code, analyzing cyphers and uncracking other puzzles. This is the third time the classes have teamed up with Ms. Loson to review for their unit tests.



## Child Safety Lessons

Three years ago, Churchville-Chili CSD partnered with the Child Advocacy Center of Greater Rochester to bring safety lessons to all students. We began with lessons for students in grades K-12 and have been excited to add lessons for UPK this school year! All lessons are focused on empowering youth with 5 critical safety rules to help adults keep them safe. Students receive age-appropriate lessons that impart knowledge to help students safely navigate the world (online and in real life) and communicate with safe adults if they encounter unsafe situations.

## Students learn about culture at CES

Third grade students at CES have been learning about cultures around the world. They have been exploring different aspects of culture including race, ethnicity, food, clothing, holidays and celebrations, music, religion and language.

## Our Local History at SHS

Our Local History visited Churchville-Chili to talk to students in Voices of Change about the complicated histories of racism and resistance in our community. During a visit in December, students learned the current state of inequity faced by the Latinx community in Monroe County, the root causes, and the local civil rights leaders who stood up to these issues. In January, Voices of Change invited the Gay Straight Alliance to join them for a discussion on LGBTQ rights. The organization returned in February for a discussion on red-lining that tied into Black History Month.

Students in Mrs. Brongo's class at the high school raised \$1025.50 this winter crafting and selling holiday Cee Cee decorations. Students crafted 120 decorations this year, working as a team to design, cut, sew and glue the materials together to create the finished product.

Each year, the class chooses an organization to donate the money they raise. Since beginning the tradition in 2005, the class has raised and donated \$15,570 for charity. This year the class chose CURE Childhood Cancer Association as the recipient.

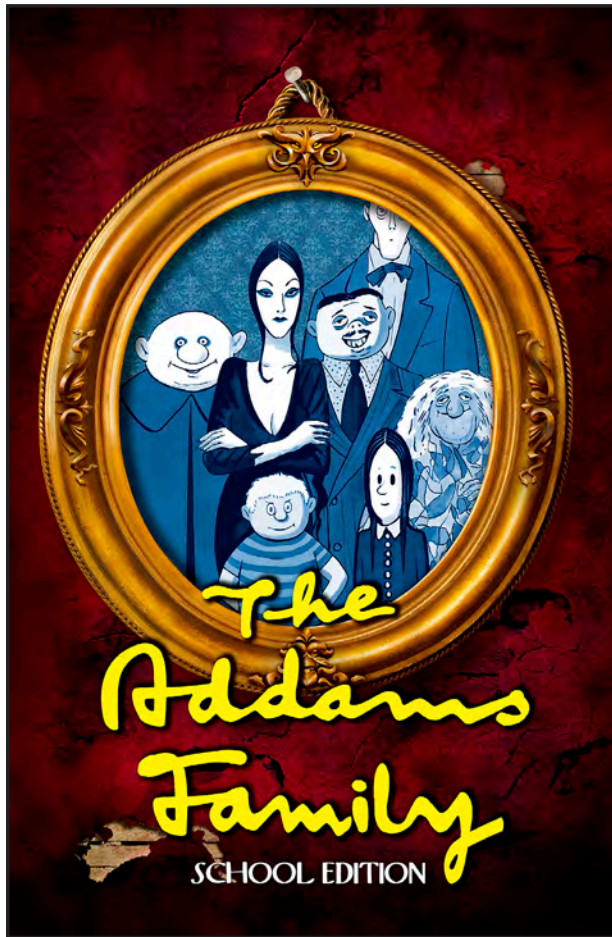


## Mamushka! The Addams Family hits the Churchville-Chili CSD stage

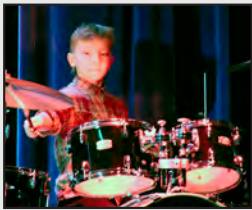
