One of the highlights has been our Buddy Classroom program, which has allowed classrooms from both schools to collaborate on fun activities designed to help students make new friends and feel excited about uniting as one school family. Some classrooms have enjoyed reading together over Zoom, while others have worked on creating thoughtful holiday gifts for their buddies.

The staff at both Mount Caesar and Cutler have also been working hard to ensure a smooth and positive transition. Over the summer, educators from both schools came together to begin planning the many important decisions involved in merging our communities. Additional meetings are planned as we continue to grow, share our unique cultures, and strengthen our connections. Staff members have also participated in social events, both at the start of the school year and after the holidays, to build relationships and camaraderie. Moreover, a group of staff members from both schools will be attending an upcoming literacy conference to continue their professional growth as a team..

Mr. Gottheimer and Mrs. Suarez have spent time at both Mount Caesar and Cutler, immersing themselves in each community to learn what makes each school unique. Videos about the construction progress have been shared with Cutler students, giving them a glimpse into the excitement Mount Caesar students experience daily from their classrooms.

Together, we are working hard to make this transition a positive and exciting experience for everyone.

Cutler's theme this year has been "Cutler Strong." Our school-wide community (assembly) meetings have consistently reinforced this theme, with related lessons on Citizenship, Gratitude, and Courage (including academic and social courage), followed by classroom lessons. Multiple students volunteer at each community meeting to share their own experiences related to these ideas and how they have overcome struggles and tried new and difficult things.





Students and staff are refining their use of the **Illustrative Math** program and the new **95% Phonics** program. Illustrative Math encourages mathematical discourse, with teachers facilitating student learning through exploration and real-world problem-solving. The 95% Phonics program has strengthened students' foundational reading skills, leading to noticeable improvements in reading fluency. This, in turn, supports continued opportunities for growth in comprehension and vocabulary development.

Last year, we saw noticeable student academic growth in classroom and state assessments. Cutler staff are building upon this growth by continuing to engage in professional development. Many Cutler teachers have completed or are currently participating in Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling (LETRS) training. Some will attend a literacy conference this spring, along with Mt. Caesar staff. Those teachers plan to come back together and share their learning with both school's staff at upcoming meetings.

Our Unified Arts classes, including Art, Wellness, PE, Music, and Library/Makerspace, continue to expand our students' horizons through various outlets. We emphasize their overall well-being, deep thinking, aesthetic sense, self-awareness, and understanding of the world around them. Monadnock Huskies Special Olympics 2024-2025

Special Olympics is a global sports organization that offers year-round training and competitions for individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism. Special Olympics offers levels of competition which may include inclusionary unified peers on teams or supporting individual athletes as they train and compete. Special Olympics supports over 5 million athletes, unified partners, coaches and volunteers with 32 Olympic-type sports.

The Monadnock Huskies Special Olympics team roster consists of 21 athletes; 3 MRHS current students and 18 alumni athletes. Additionally, we have 3 unified partners, 7 volunteers and 3 coaches. One example of the success of the Special Olympics and the engagement and heart of our Special Olympics athletes and family members fan club. We have athletes who have competed



in bowling, basketball, individual skills, athletics (track and field), bocce and weight lifting. We are in the process of adding all age bocce and corn hole sports as well.

One goal of Special Olympics is to promote and support individuals with intellectual disabilities to learn skills that help become leaders. Special Olympics International strives to unleash leadership potential in people of all abilities. This starts with building advocacy skills into training, practices and competitions. It grows to promote leadership responsibilities. It is heartwarming to see our experienced athletes mentor athletes new to the team, celebrate each other's successes and grow to take on leadership roles at practices and events.

Further benefits of Special Olympics include improving the health and well-being of people with intellectual disabilities. At summer games athletes can attend health check sessions. During COVID shut down athletes were able to join Fitness teams to track their physical activity and earn rewards for being active. Several Huskies participated, hitting goals and earning swag.

These are the words of the Special Olympics oath, recited by all participants at the start of competition. Our athletes take this oath to heart each time they practice or compete at an event. It is a pleasure to see them reach

2025-2026 MRSD Warrant Articles(Ballot Version)

ARTICLE ONE: Shall the Monadnock Regional School District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, totaling \$39,199,676 (\$970,000 is required for federal grants and nutrition grants that are funded by separate State and Federal revenues)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget will be \$38,819,434 (\$970,000 is required for federalgrants and nutrition grants that are funded by separate State and Federal revenues) which is the same as last year with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Monadnock Regional School District by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40: 13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE TWO: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to approve the cost items included in the 3-year Collective Bargaining Agreement reached between the Monadnock Regional School Board and the Monadnock District Educators Association of SAU 93 for the following increases in wages and benefits at the current staffing level. The estimated increase in the costs for wages and benefits under the collective bargaining agreement are as follows:

Year **Estimated Increase** 2025/26 \$524,604 Salaries \$141,118 Wage associated costs \$59,500 Increases in various stipends and professional development \$725,222 2026/27 \$365,602 Salaries \$98,273 Wage associated costs \$463.875 2027/28 \$362,333 Salaries Wage associated costs \$97,395 \$459,728

And further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$725,222 for the 2025-26 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in wage and benefits over those of the appropriation at the current staffing level paid in the 2024-25 year. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE THREE: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120,000 to renovate a portion of the roof at the Monadnock Regional Middle High School. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32:3 VI. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article per RSA 32:7 VI and will not lapse until the renovation projects are complete, or June 30, 2028, whichever is earlier. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE FOUR: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the Special Education Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This sum is to come from the June 30, 2025 unassigned fund balance available for transfer on July 1, 2025. No new amount will be raised from taxation. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE FIVE: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be added to the District Vehicle Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This sum is to come from the June 30, 2025 unassigned fund balance available for transfer on July 1, 2025. If there is an insufficient, unassigned fund balance as of June 30, 2025, to fund this appropriation and the appropriation in Article Four, then Article Four will be funded first, with any additional unassigned fund balance to be applied to this warrant article. No new amount will be raised from taxation. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE SIX: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000 to be added to the School Grounds Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This sum is to come from the June 30, 2025 unassigned fund balance available for transfer on July 1, 2025. If there is an insufficient, unassigned fund balance as of June 30, 2025, to fund this appropriation and the appropriations in Articles Four and Five, Four and Five will be funded first, with any additional unassigned fund balance to be applied to this warrant article. No new amount will be raised from taxation. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE SEVEN: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the School Bldg. Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This sum is to come from the June 30, 2025 unassigned fund balance available for transfer on July 1, 2025. If there is an insufficient, unassigned fund balance as of June 30, 2025, to fund this appropriation and the appropriations in Articles Four, Five, and Six, then Four, Five, and Six will be funded first, with any additional unassigned fund balance to be applied to this warrant article. No new amount will be raised from taxation. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE EIGHT: To see if the Monadnock Regional School District will vote to authorize the School Board to convey the parcel of land with the buildings thereon located at 31 South Winchester Street in West Swanzey, as identified on the Town of Swanzey's tax records as Tax Map 109, Lot 22 (current location of the Cutler School), and to further authorize the School Board to take such additional action as necessary to facilitate and/or consummate such conveyance, including securing the necessary approvals and the execution of any documents necessary or attendant thereto. The School Board supports this article. The Budget Committee supports this article (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE NINE: Shall the Monadnock Regional School District receive and approve the reports of the agents, auditors, committees, and officers chosen as printed and distributed in the Annual Report? (Majority vote required)

2025-26 MRSD Warrant Articles(Plain Language Version)

Article One Plain Language:

Each year a default budget is identified using the actual expenses of the prior school year plus contractual obligations, and then minus any one-time expenditures. This year's default budget is \$38,819,434. The budget proposed by the district's Budget Committee was \$39,199,676. That amount was amended to \$36,000,000 by the voters attending the Deliberative Session on February 1st. This new proposed budget is \$3,199,676 less than the original proposal, and \$2,819,434 less than the default budget.

If the proposed budget passes (a YES vote), the district will be funded at \$36,000,000. If the proposed budget fails (a NO vote), the district would be funded at the default budget level \$38,819,434.

Article Two Plain Language:

The current agreement with the Monadnock District Education Association ends in June 2025. This association includes certified teachers, school counselors, social workers, and nurses. School Board representatives and representatives from the association have negotiated a new three-year agreement. This contract includes wage increases to allow the district to compete for these employees and a few language changes around working conditions and time off. A summary of the changes can be found on the District webpage www.mrsd.org under the heading "Budget & Voting" subheading "2025 Deliberative & Election Information". Only the 2025-26 costs of \$725,222 are included in this article. The cost for years 2026-27 and 2027-28 are displayed because if this article passes in the first year, the district is obligated to fund the next two years of the agreement.

Article Three Plain Language:

This warrant article allows for replacement of the roof over the boys' locker room at MRMHS. The District intends to complete the work over the summer break of 2025, but will have until June 30, 2028 to complete the work if necessary.

Article Four Plain Language:

The Special Education Expendable Trust Fund is designed to give the district financial resources should there be unexpected special education costs. This article will not raise funds from new taxation. If this article passes, and ONLY if unallocated funds are available at the end of June 30, 2025, then up to \$1.00 will be added to this trust fund. This article was a placeholder for the February 1st Deliberative Session. Although the amount was not increased, once an article is created it cannot be removed from the warrant.

Article Five Plain Language:

The District Vehicle Expendable Trust Fund is designed to give the district financial resources should the need for a new vehicle arise. The district owns and operates various vehicles such as shuttle vans, plow trucks, etc. This article will not raise funds from new taxation. If this article passes, and ONLY if unallocated funds are available at the end of June 30, 2025, then up to \$25,000 will be added to this trust fund.

Article Six Plain Language:

The School Grounds Expendable Trust Fund is designed to give the district financial resources to address the need for repairs and maintenance on school grounds and school parking lots. This article will not raise funds from new taxation. If this article passes, and ONLY if unallocated funds are available at the end of June 30, 2025, then up to \$100,000 will be added to this trust fund.

Article Seven Plain Language:

The School Bldg. Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund is designed to give the district financial resources should there be a need for unexpected major repairs to district buildings. This article will not raise funds from new taxation. If this article passes, and ONLY if unallocated funds are available at the end of June 30, 2025, then up to \$1.00 will be added to this trust fund. This article was a placeholder for the February 1st Deliberative Session. Although the amount was not increased, once an article is created it cannot be removed from the warrant.

Article Eight Plain Language:

This article asks the voters of the district to give the School Board permission to offer the Cutler School building and property for sale, negotiate terms of the sale, and complete the sales transaction should an appropriate buyer emerge.

Article Nine Plain Language:

This article is for housekeeping, and does not require funding.
