

#### DUAL ENROLLMENT PROGRAM

Georgia's Dual Enrollment Program provides students enrolled at an eligible public or private high school or home study program in Georgia the opportunity to earn high school and college credit at a participating eligible postsecondary institution in Georgia.

Georgia's Dual Enrollment Program offers students the opportunity to experience college courses and begin their college academic career while still in high school and provides for standard tuition, mandatory fees and required books.

The program is offered during all terms of the school year.

Students can only enter the DE program summer or fall semester.

#### WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

- 9<sup>th</sup> graders and 5<sup>th</sup> year seniors are not eligible per state of GA.
- Eligible students must be on track with HS credits for graduation.
- 10<sup>th</sup> graders: eligible students may enroll in approved CTAE courses listed on the DE Course Directory (GAFutures.org) at a participating <u>TCSG institution</u> only and / or meet SAT / ACT test score criteria.
- 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> graders: eligible students may take any approved DE courses listed on the DE Course Directory at an eligible PSI (USG, TCSG, or private).
- DE Funding Cap is 30 semester hours or 45 quarter hours for the traditional DE program. Accelerated Diploma Program has no cap.
- No residency or citizenship requirement.
- Student must maintain "Satisfactory Academic Progress" at the DE college.

## 10<sup>TH</sup> GRADE ELIGIBILITY

- Students in the 10th grade with a minimum SAT score of 1200 or minimum ACT composite score of 26 in a single test administration, taken prior to the terms of enrollment, may enroll in any approved DE course at a TSCG, USG or private eligible participating postsecondary institution.
- Students in 10th grade may enroll in approved Career, Technical, & Agricultural Education (CTAE) elective courses at a participating TCSG institution only (ex: GTC).

## REQUIREMENTS TO PARTICIPATE

- Parent/student complete required GCPS and McClure Health Science HS DE Permission forms and complete the 25-26 DE Funding Application on Gafutures.org.
- Student must have completed the DE college admission process and been accepted & approved by the participating PSI.
- All DE college work must be completed prior to graduation.
- Students can be denied participation for violation of high school and DE college rules.

## WHERE CAN I ATTEND?

A student may apply to attend any participating public college, private college, or technical college in Georgia.

#### WHAT ARE THE PROS AND CONS?

#### <u>PROS</u>

- Students can get a head start on college credits.
- Helps students adjust to the college experience.
- Students may take classes not available at the high school.
- Earning college credits saves money on future college coursework—earlier graduation from college (not high school).

#### **CONS**

- Students must keep up with important high school information.
- Higher expectations / rigor
- Some colleges prefer a different curriculum path (i.e. AP classes).
- Colleges will not communicate with parents / counselors of Dual Enrollment students.
- More appropriate for students who only plan to apply to GA colleges.

#### TRADITIONAL

- Traditional DE students will complete required EOC assessments.
- A traditional DE student cannot take more than 15 semester or 12 quarter hours each semester (funding max).
- DE funding limited to 10<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> graders.
- Some graduation requirements will be completed through DE courses (ex: ENGL 1101 as 12th ELA)
- Traditional DE students are subject to the DE funding cap of 30 hours (set by the state of GA, House Bill 444).
- Traditional DE students can self-pay for additional courses.

## ACCELERATED CAREERS

- Students can graduate with their high school diploma while being exempt from specific academic course requirements.
- ACCELERATED CAREERS are NOT subject to the 30-hour funding cap.
- Students must complete specific courses during their 9th and 10th grade years.
- Students choose to simultaneously earn a HS diploma AND (a) a college associate's degree; (b) Technical diploma; or two (2) Technical Certificates of Credit (TCCs) in a specific career pathway.
- Students must work closely with their counselor and postsecondary staff to ensure they meet both the high school and college graduation requirements.





Accelerated Career pathway offers dual enrollment students a unique path to high school graduation. Some of the required high school courses may be taken under the state-funded Dual Enrollment program. Students should contact their high school counselor regarding high school graduation requirements.

- 2 English: American Lit/EOC & another English
- 2 Math: Algebra I or Coordinate Algebra and another math
- 2 Science: Biology/EOC & another Science
- 2 Social Studies: US History (recommended) and another Social Studies
- 1 Health/PE

- Any Technical Diploma program

#### BE ADVISED...

- McClure Health Science HS does not provide DE classes on campus at MHSHS.
- GCPS and MHSHS do not provide transportation to the DE college campus.
- MHSHS students must have an MHSHS parking pass (see attendance office) or consistent daily transportation / pick up from or drop off at MHSHS.
- Online DE classes can be taken on campus at MHSHS.

### WHAT ABOUT TRANSFER CREDIT?

- It is the student's responsibility to talk with colleges regarding their policies on Dual Enrollment credit. Generally, public colleges in the state of Georgia will honor any credit earned at any other Georgia public college when a grade of "C" or higher is earned.
- Colleges granting transfer credit will require a transcript from the DE college (student requests this via DE college registrar's office).
- If the DE college requires the student to pick a "major", best to select "general studies".
- Private colleges and out of state colleges vary on their acceptance of Dual Enrollment credit.

#### **HOW DOES GRADING WORK?**

✓ If colleges provide the high school with letter grades, the high school will transcribe the letter grade to the midpoint of the grading scale (unless grading scale is provided).

- √ Students may NOT drop a class without penalty!
  - √ Withdraw Failing (WF)
  - ✓ Withdraw Passing (WP)

- ✓ If the student fails a class, it could jeopardize graduation and future Dual Enrollment status!
- ✓ No points are added to the final grade (exception – 10 pts. are added to Georgia Tech Math, Science, Computer Science).
- ✓ All Dual Enrollment funded classes are included on the high school transcript.



#### "Z" GRADES


- Any Dual Enrollment course for which GCPS receives funding (October and March FTE) will be included on the transcript.
- If the student withdraws from the course after GCPS has received funding, a "Z" score will be entered on the transcript.

# Students MUST inform Mrs. Tinsley immediately if there is any college schedule change.

\*\*If you do not inform Mrs. Tinsley of these changes, you cannot continue with Dual Enrollment the following semester.

#### DE COLLEGE END OF SEMESTER GRADES

- If the student wants the higher grade on their high school transcript, they need to request that their DE professor send documentation of the actual grade (if higher than it would be transcribed for GCPS (Ex: anything above a 75, 85, or 95); i.e., an email or something on letterhead, and send to the high school dual enrollment coordinator.
- We defer to the policy of the DE college on this. Some DE colleges will decline the student's request for this.



#### HOPE GPA

- For HOPE GPA (high school) calculations, all language arts, math, science, social studies, & foreign language courses are used in the calculation.
- When students take additional courses in the core areas all will be used for HOPE calculations.
  - --Georgia Student Finance Commission
- Students earn a .50 boost for DE courses on their HOPE transcript...but only for B's, C's, and D's (A's are ineligible for .50 boost since DE grades are on a 4.0 scale)

## CREDIT CONVERSION

► 1 - 2 semester hour college classes = .5 HS credit.

➤ 3 - 5 semester hour college classes = 1.0 HS credit.

Note: Science labs will receive a grade, but NO credit on transcript. They will not count toward fourth science requirement.

All DE students have a 6-segment max per semester.



#### **6 SEGMENTS**

- 4 DE + 0 HS = 6 segments
- 3 DE + 3 HS = 6 segments
- 2 DE + 4 HS = 6 segments
- 1 DE + 5 HS = 6 segments
- Anything beyond the six segments will need to be self-pay.
  - Self-pay courses can be added to transcript (if on approved DE course list in GAFutures), but not in high school schedule.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Note: MHSHS classes are NOT offered every period of the day.

#### **HEED IN MIND...**

- ✓ A student must meet the entrance requirements of the college.
- √ It is the student's responsibility to register for the correct classes.
- ✓ If a student registers for a Dual Enrollment course they previously failed, they will receive a bill from the college. Dual Enrollment will not pay for the course.
  - ✓ Students will also be required to self-pay if they have already met the 30-hour max.
- ✓ The student is responsible for ALL interaction with the college. The college will
  not speak with a parent or the high school counselor regarding the student.
- ✓ Students must have all schedule changes approved by Mrs. Tinsley.
- ✓ Holidays such as Spring Break will be different from the Gwinnett County holidays.
- Literature II EOC is required.

## POLICY ON WITHDRAWING FROM A DE COURSE

#### 1604.7. Course Withdrawals and Retaking a Course.

- A student becomes ineligible to continue receiving Dual Enrollment program funding after his or her second (2nd) course withdrawal from an approved Dual Enrollment course(s), occurring Summer term 2020 or later, regardless of the total Paid Hours or Funding Cap calculation.
  - Lab component corequisite courses, when withdrawn in the same term as the lecture/classroom course, is considered as one course withdrawal.
- A student is ineligible to receive Dual Enrollment funding to repeat or retake a
  Dual Enrollment course for which Dual Enrollment funding was received
  Summer term 2020 or later, regardless of the total Paid Hours or Funding Cap
  calculation, unless an Exception is granted in accordance with Section 1615.2.




The only DE ECONOMICS course that counts toward HS graduation is ECON 1101.





# POLICIES AND PROCEDURES THE FOLLOWING STEPS SHOULD BE FOLLOWED IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO PARTICIPATE IN THE DUAL ENROLLMENT PROGRAM:

- X 1. Attend Dual Enrollment Information Meeting/View Dual Enrollment Presentation.
- \_\_\_\_2. Meet with Mrs. Tinsley to review remaining credits for HS graduation and discuss Dual Enrollment fit. Join DE Google Classroom.
- \_\_\_3. Student and parent complete the GCPS Permission Forms & MHSHS DE Contract.

  Return to Mrs. Tinsley in A102 or upload on Google Classroom by March 25th.
- \_\_\_\_4. Apply to the college/university of your choice. Heep in mind that different schools have different admissions procedures. NOTIFY MRS. TINSLEY WHEN YOU HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED
- \_\_\_\_5. Meet with Mrs. Tinsley again to complete DE advisement worksheet (only after all documents have been received).
- \_\_\_\_6. Create a GaFutures.org account and complete an electronic Dual Enrollment Funding application. One time per academic year (opens February).



#### PROCEDURES CONT.

7. Speak with your college advisor and select classes. Obtain a copy of your college schedule.
8. Student uploads a copy of DE college schedule so McClure schedule can be adjuste / funding approved (Google form on DE Google Classroom).
9. MHSHS completes the GA FUTURES funding application AFTER receiving the schedule from the student (exception: Georgia State University).
10. During this process, you may get emails from the Bursar's Office indicating that payment is duebe patient and do nothing!
11. College transcript must be turned into Mrs. Tinsley before end of semester. If DE college transcript is not ready until after GCPS semester ends, student needs to email screenshot of semester final course grades to <a href="mailto:Jordyn.L.Tinsley@gcpsk12.org">Jordyn.L.Tinsley@gcpsk12.org</a>





## WHO QUALIFIES FOR DUAL ENROLLMENT AT GGC

- By the first day of semester at GGC:
- must be 16 years of age
- must be an 11th or 12th grade student
- Be on-track for completing all high school graduation requirements
- Be on-track for completing the USG's Required High School Curriculum (RHSC)
- Have a 3.25 High School GPA as calculated by GGC Admissions on the RHSC courses completed
- Meet all other dual enrollment admission requirements
- Meet GSFC's Dual Enrollment funding Program eligibility (details on GAfutures site: gafutures.org)



### **TEST SCORES**

GGC is test-optional for admission into the dual enrollment program. However, SAT/ACT or ACCUPLACER exams might be needed for placement purposes.

- Dual Enrollment students may only enroll in an English or mathematics course if they exempt placement in corequisite Learning Support.
- Meaning, it is possible to be accepted but not place into a math or English course.
- For course placement purposes, limit of two Next Generation ACCUPLACER exam attempts per academic year



#### **HOW AND WHEN DO I APPLY?**

- 1. Create Grizzly Profile to Apply Online, Dual Enrollment Students are exempted from application fee- watch for a pop-up in your browser window
- 2. Review Admission Requirements
- 3. Submit Document Requirements
- Meet with your high school counselor so they can begin the approval process on the high school side.
- 5. Once accepted, register for an orientation where you will be advised and register for your classes

## All application materials must be submitted by the dates below for each semester.

- Spring Semester, priority Nov. 1
- Summer semester, priority April 1
- Fall Semester, priority May 1

## **Dual Enrollment**

- Dual Enrollment: Program that allows rising <u>junior and senior</u> high school students to earn
  college credit while working on their high school diploma. Uses DE funding until exhausted (30
  credits
  - Does not take away from HOPE benefits
- Must have the approval from HS counselor and parent/guardian
- Tuition is covered by Georgia Student Finance Commission (up to 30 credits) and courses must be selected from state approved list
- Students are enrolled as Non-Degree seeking student type (no major is assigned)
- If student wants to pursue the Associates pathway will be declared when applying for graduation
- Students can take classes during the regular Fall, Spring, or Summer semesters with traditional undergraduate students



## **Dual Enrollment Classes**

• In order to receive funding, the courses must be selected from state approved list on GA Futures:

#### **Course Directory**

The Dual Enrollment Course Directory is a list of the approved courses at eligible participating postsecondary institutions for Dual Enrollment funding, beginning with the Summer term.

#### **Approved Course Categories**

The approved eligible course categories include:

Core academic areas: English, math, science, social sciences and world (foreign) languages (the same categories used in the high school HOPE Scholarship calculation for academic eligibility).

- Test-optional policy is in place until Summer 2026
  - ATL GPA requirement 3.4
  - PC GPA requirement 3.2

Any GPA below than the TO requirement but above a 3.0 can use test scores below:

#### Satisfactory test scores

- SAT 580ERW/560 Math
- ACT 23 English/23 Math
- PSAT: 580 Evidence-Based Reading and Writing, 560 Math (SAME as SAT)

#### **Perimeter College**

#### Satisfactory test scores

- SAT 530 ERW/530 Math
- ACT 20 English/21 Math
- PSAT: 530 Evidence-Based Reading and Writing, 530 Math (SAME AS SAT)
- Accuplacer (237 Reading, 4-8 Writeplacer, 258 QAS)





## Requirements

#### Core Curriculum

A dual enrollment student must have completed Algebra II or higher in order to take collegiate-level math.

SUBJECT	UNITS	COURSES:
ENGLISH	4	Any 4 English/Language Arts
MATH	4	Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry & 1 Higher Level Math
NATURAL SCIENCE	4	1 Life Science/Lab, 1 Physical Science/Lab, & 2 Science Electives
SOCIAL SCIENCE	3	1 U.S. History, 1 World History & 1 Social Science Elective
FOREIGN LANGUAGE	2	Both units must be the same language. American Sign Language is acceptable.





### Cost

- Tuition is covered by Georgia Student Finance Commission (GFCS)
  - Courses must be selected from state approved list
  - Non-funded classes must be paid for at the time of registration
- Mandatory university fees are waived
- Textbooks are provided on loan basis through the bookstore, but must be returned in good condition.
- Student Responsibilities
  - Course specific fees: (Ex: science or foreign language)
  - Transportation
  - Parking and meals





## **Student Expectations**

- Demonstrate high academic and personal maturity
- Be prepared for college level course work at a research institution
- Communicate with your high school/stay on top of your application status
- Ensure the college courses you select meet your HS graduation requirements
- Remember that your performance affects: HS GPA, HOPE, and college admissions



#### **Benefits of Dual Enrollment**

- Pass the course: you will receive college credit
- Lighten the AP/IB course/testing load for advanced students
- Opportunity to grow and mature
  - Handle college registration
    - Requesting transcripts
  - Communicating with college professors
- Access to campus facilities, clubs & student life activities
  - (Excluding Greek organizations)

#### November 1st

GSU Application and Documentation deadline for Spring

## April 1st

GSU Application and Documentation deadline for Summer

## May 1st

GSU Application and Documentation deadline Fall





## **Parent Expectations**

- Encourage your student with their coursework
- Professors and staff will not provide updates on student progress/ performance in a course
- Students' grades remain part of both their high school and college record

#### **FERPA**

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA):

\*Once a student reaches 18 years of age or attends a postsecondary institution, he or she becomes an "eligible student," and all rights formerly given to parents under FERPA transfer to the student, this includes the right to access records and right to have control over disclosure of personally identifiable information from the records

~ DE participants sign a FERPA waiver granting access for disclosure to the high school counselor. Students can grant access to parent/guardian.


