

GEARING UP FOR THE GRAND CHAMPIONSHIP

Seneca Valley robotics teams were geared up for the challenges ahead as they competed in the FIRST LEGO League (FLL) Western Pennsylvania Grand Championship, at Aliquippa High School last month. Approximately 65 teams of students in grades 4-8 participated in the robotics competition. Seneca Valley's FIRST LEGO Lords team from Haine Elementary School earned the "Elementary Excellence Award," by scoring as the top elementary school team.

Each team competed in four rounds of the table robot challenge game, where the students designed, built and programmed a robot to solve various challenges on a competition board. In addition, each team gave a presentation to a panel of judges, describing their robot, programming design, game play strategy and research project.

FIRST LEGO League introduces science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) to children ages 4-16 through fun, exciting hands-on learning. FIRST LEGO League participants gain real-world problem-solving experiences through a guided, global robotics program, helping today's students and teachers build a better future together.

The intention of SV STEM Alumni Days is to inspire and inform current students,








encouraging STEM fields of study. As part of a network of opportunities organized by a committee of teachers, SV STEM Alumni Days joins the highly successful SV Science

Unlike typical orchestra music, fiddle tunes are learned by ear without the use of sheet music. Dr. Perttu taught students the reel by ear and added different musical elements such as bowing techniques, ornamentation, interpretation, and rhythmic nuance which bring out the unique style of Scottish fiddling. Students enjoyed the opportunity to try something different and engage with music in a more informal way.

ATHLETES OF THE MONTH, DECEMBER 2023

The Female Athlete of the Month for December was girls basketball forward/ center Allison Sevin. The senior has been a key part in a historic start to the season for the Raider girls basketball team who are currently 8-2 and on an eight-game winning streak. Allison has scored at least four points in every single game so far. She recorded several double-digit points scoring games, averaging 11 points a game while shooting 60% from the field. This includes 15-point performances in wins over



Columbia-Montour Area Vocational Technical School (AVTS) and Fox Chapel. Allison's career high of 16 points came in a section win over Butler. She has also been a force on the defensive side of the ball, averaging 6.9 rebounds a game along with one steal and block per game. We recognize Allison as the December Female Athlete of the Month. Congratulations, Allison!

The Male Athlete of the Month for December was sophomore boys basketball forward/center Owen Congdon. Owen has stepped into a starter's role and has cemented his importance to the team. Over the first 11 games of the season, Owen has tallied 10.4 points a game along with 5.5 rebounds to showcase his all-around game. He has also been efficient inside and outside of the paint, boasting a 62.5% field goal percentage and shooting 50% from the three-point line, along with 5.3



rebounds a game. His career-high in points came in a win against Baldwin where he scored 17 points, including two three-pointers. For an impressive month, we recognize Owen as the December Male Athlete of the Month. Congratulations, Owen!

EXPANDING HORIZONS

SV unveils updates to program of studies

What do criminal investigations and interior design have in common?

For the 2024-25 school year, they will be the newest courses added to an already robust list of classes available to students in grades 9-12. In fact, for the coming school year, students can expect the addition of an array of both traditional and online options as a way to ensure they have an enriching academic experience.

"It's vitally important that we broaden our expansive offerings because student interests are changing and society is changing," said Dr. Matt McKinley, assistant superintendent for 7-12 instruction. "We need to meet those demands and go beyond." Dr. McKinley strongly suggests students research and understand the courses that meet their interests and skills; to find what they like – and what they don't like. "Fine tuning a career pathway while still in high school is a valuable lesson," he said.

Speaking of pathways, Seneca Valley has five, and secondary students seem to be evenly distributed among them at the moment:

- Arts. Communication and Media 20%
- Business, Management and Information Technology 22%
- Industry, Engineering and Technology 21%
- Health, Medical and Human Services 22%
- Education, Public Safety and Law 15%

Once students have a sense of what path they want to traverse, it's important they then go into the scheduling process viewing it as a team effort. Students are encouraged to invite input from teachers, parents and school counselors while at the same time looking inward at their strengths and abilities. Reading through the program of studies and taking the time to learn more about the course offered, including the requisites/co-requisites, is important. Dr. McKinley explained that the evolution of the program of studies comes from an invested staff and with the feedback of students.

"We really want students engaged in the process," he explained. "And our secondary team and staff have evolved, including cyber, and we want to make sure we are offering online what we have in traditional settings."

The annual WPIAL Hall of Fame induction banquet will be held on Friday, May 31, at the DoubleTree Hotel in Greentree.


COMMUNITY CHAMPION

SV EARNS AP COMPUTER SCIENCE FEMALE DIVERSITY AWARD

Seneca Valley has earned the College Board AP® Computer Science Female Diversity Award for achieving high female representation in AP Computer Science Principles. Schools honored with the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award have expanded girls' access in AP computer science courses.

More than 1,100 institutions achieved either 50% or higher female representation in one of the two AP computer science courses or a percentage of the female computer science exam takers meeting or exceeding that of the school's female population during the 2022-23 school year. In 2023, Seneca Valley was one of 834 recognized in the category of AP Computer Science Principles (CSP).

"We're thrilled to congratulate our female AP Computer Science students and their teachers on this step toward gender parity in computer science education," said Seneca Valley Senior High School Principal, Mr. Bob Ceh. "We're honored that our school earned this distinction and look forward to seeing these young women and others pursue and achieve success in computer science education and careers."

Providing female students with access to computer science courses is critical to ensuring gender parity in the industry's high-paying jobs and to driving innovation, creativity and representation. The median annual wage for computer and information technology occupations was \$100,530 in May 2022. However, women represent just 24% of the five million people in computing occupations.

The first year of AP Computer Science Principles in 2016-17 attracted more students than any other AP course debut, and participation is on the rise. In 2023, 164,505 students took the AP CSP Exam—more than triple the number



of exam takers in the course's first year. In 2023, 55,572 women took the AP CSP Exam, more than four times the number who tested in 2017.

"Computer science is the source code of our economy and much of the career landscape," said Trevor Packer, Head of the AP Program. "In the six years since we began the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award, it's been heartening to see schools like Seneca Valley welcome so many more young women into this vital field."

That's why College Board research about AP CSP is so encouraging. According to the data, female students who take AP CSP in high school are more than five times as likely to major in computer science in college, compared to female students of similar background and academic preparation who did not take CSP. The study also

finds AP CSP students are nearly twice as likely to enroll in AP CSA, and that for most students, AP CSP serves as a stepping stone to other advanced AP STEM coursework.

These findings highlight the importance of schools nationwide achieving gender parity in AP computer science classrooms. Overall, female students remain underrepresented in our high school computer science classes, accounting for just 34% of AP Computer Science Principles participants and 26% of AP Computer Science A participants. Currently, 57.5% of the nation's high schools teach foundational computer science. The 1,127 schools that receive this year's AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award serve as inspirations and models for all U.S. high schools.

SAFEGUARDING YOUR CHILD'S ONLINE EXPERIENCE

We understand the joy that comes with receiving a new device as a holiday gift. However, with new technology comes the need to ensure online safety, especially for children. To assist you in this endeavor, we have provided some tips from Common Sense Media on rules you can share with children regarding device use. Additionally, we have provided a link below to review and consider some of the parental control apps now available for cellphones that will assist you in monitoring and tracking your child's activity.

The Basic Safety Rules for Cellphones Texting:

- Be respectful, both to the people you're texting with and those around you.
- Be careful. Assume that even private texts can become public.

Calling:

- Verify the caller. Don't respond to numbers you don't know.
- Always answer the phone when it's a parent or caregiver!

Taking pictures and videos:

- Ask permission before you snap someone's picture, take a video, or share anything.
- Don't publicly embarrass people.
 Don't post someone's photo or video especially an unflattering one—without their permission.

Apps and downloads:

 Apps, games, music, and in-app upgrades can cost real money. Follow your family's rules about what you can and can't buy, and whether you need permission to download.



 You may not be able to access everything if parental control settings are enabled.
 Depending on your family's rules, some content, downloads, and in-app purchases could be blocked.

Posting:

- Think before you post. Be very choosy about what you post from your phone.
- Be safe. Sharing private information and using location services can be risky.

Social Networking for Teens

For many legitimate reasons, social media is often number one on a parent's list of digital worries. From predators to privacy, there's truly a lot of iffy stuff for teens to navigate. While all of that is true, using social media wisely can also give teens a sense of connection, fun, and creativity. If a caregiver is involved in a teen's digital

life, preps them for how to handle negative online situations, talks about protecting privacy and being kind, it can go a long way toward a more positive social media experience. And if kids can avoid endless scrolling and comparing themselves to others, and instead focus on friendship and creativity, it may give them a boost instead of bringing them down.
