

Forwood Equity Team Update

During the month of February and throughout the school year, Forwood students learned about the pivotal role that the hard work of African Americans have played in shaping our country's history. The 2025 Black History Month theme, "African Americans and Labor," is a powerful reflection on the pivotal role that the hard work of African Americans has played in shaping our country's history. From K-5, students read or researched the legacies of historians like Georgia Gilmore, Ruby Bridges, Jackie Robinson, William Kamkwamba, Frederick Douglass and more.

Although our school-wide assembly will be rescheduled, its theme of getting along and making connections to our school-wide MTSS Expectations of being Respectful, Responsible, and Safe is key to our learning experiences and strengthening relationships with peers and adults.

Moving into the Month of March, our Equity Team will be supporting our students who are in observance of Ramadan by providing a quiet space to fast or pray during this holy month.

We will also be helping to facilitate our *Sense of Belonging* classroom rotations. During the rotations, students will have a chance to spend time connecting with staff, establishing new relationships and deepening existing ones. When students feel they belong at school they also feel respected and ready to learn. That's why we are committed to creating a class environment where every student feels able to contribute and be heard by adults and peers alike. According to Dr. Linda Darling-Hammond, "As human beings, one of the most essential needs we have is the need to belong."

Forwood MTSS Update

The students have done a fabulous job being Safe, Respectful, and Responsible this marking period! We had our awards ceremony on Friday, February 28th, and it was well-attended by parents and caregivers. Congratulations and well done to all of our awards recipients! Several classes have earned 400 Paw Prints and have been able to have PJs, stuffed animals, and movie days! Many students cashed out for rewards that included extra recess and being a Specialist Helper. For this, they attended a different class's Related Arts class and acted as guest teachers in P.E., Music, Art, or Library. It's exciting to see so many future teachers! Our 3rd Marking Period school-wide incentive is our 2nd annual Glow Party! Please encourage your child to follow school behavior expectations, so that they're able to earn going to this exciting event.

Read on for some highlights from across our building...

Kindergarten

The kindergarteners have been busy in the 3rd marking period!

In ELA, students were introduced to letter names, consonant clusters, digraphs, and reading text independently with decodable readers. There was an additional focus on consonant sounds with 2 letters and answering both literal and inferential questions from a text read to the students. When answering the questions we taught the students to answer in a complete sentence by restating the question. In Writing, the students continue to build their stamina. We are encouraging each individual student to push themselves to write more than one sentence when answering a writing prompt. There are many resources in the room to help support them.

In Math, we focused on composition and decomposition with shapes and numbers. Number bonds were introduced to the students to show the parts and total as the students learned that there are multiple ways to record their work. All the students have been learning how to solve addition and subtraction story problems. They were able to model and solve the problem by using objects, fingers, drawings, or their memory. The students learned there is a specific mathematical language used when representing an addition or subtraction sentence.

In Science, we had fun with our Science Kit called, "Push, Pull, and Go". We learned about force and motion by using K'NEX to build ramps, swings, and tops. We also explored the good and bad effects of snowy weather! They learned how snow can be fun for playing and building but also how it can make roads slippery and very cold outside.

In Social Studies, we revisited the concept of wants and needs. In celebration of Black History Month, we also learned about important figures who have shaped history. The children enjoyed listening to the stories and learning how these individuals made a difference. It's been a wonderful way to celebrate diversity and inspire kindness and courage in our class.



Our Forwood Fox Firsties have engaged in exciting learning opportunities during the second marking period.

<u>ELA:</u> We just finished our Fifth Skills Unit in CKLA. Students practiced using spelling alternatives for consonant sounds, for example, /j/ spelled 'j', 'g', and 'ge'. Students learned that the letter 'g' is a spelling that becomes "tricky" because it can stand for more than one sound and can be pronounced in two ways. In addition, students learned about forming plural endings (-s and -es) and that if a word ends in 'sh', 'ch', 's', or 'x', they will add 'es' to make the word plural. Students also learned patterns for root words and spelling changes, for example, if there is a short vowel word that ends in a single consonant, it will change to a double letter spelling when a suffix is added. Students practiced identifying and creating statements, questions, and exclamations. They also practiced creating longer sentences. Additionally, students expanded their knowledge on the writing process and focused on different types of writing: descriptive, informational and opinion. All writing activities were presented in carefully scaffolded steps so that students could learn how to plan, draft, edit, and publish pieces of writing.

<u>Reading Fluency and Comprehension:</u> Students worked hard this marking period at becoming more fluent readers. Every student was given skilled specific activities and decodable passages during our differentiated instruction block to strengthen their fluency and comprehension. Our decodable reader from CKLA, *Kate's Book*, follows a Navajo girl named Kate who has various adventures during her summer vacation and eventually writes a book about them. Students used their DI passages and our decodable reader from CKLA to answer story comprehension questions, both verbally and in written form.

<u>Math:</u> Students recently began exploring Module 5: Place Value Concepts to Compare, Add, and Subtract. In this module, students build on work with tens and ones and compose larger units (such as tens). In addition, students represent two-digit totals in different ways. For example, a total of 21

may be shown as 21 ones, 1 ten 11 ones, or 2 tens 1 one. Students also compare two-digit numbers by using the place value structure of tens and ones - understanding the value of the digits to compare

numbers efficiently. Furthermore, students add a one-digit number to a two-digit number, use strategies of counting on and counting back with tens to add and subtract tens, and represent an equation in unit form to find an easier one-digit fact they know. For example, rewriting 20 + 40 as 2 tens + 4 tens to help see that they can use 2 + 4 to solve. Finally, students use place value understanding to make easier two-digit addition problems by self selecting strategies: add like units, add tens first, or add ones first (may make the next ten).

Science: In Science, students will begin to investigate Light and Sound.

<u>Social Studies:</u> In social studies, students learned about technology and the contributions that African Americans have had in many of the everyday items we see and use. Students learned about different inventors and engineers who used technology to solve a problem or meet a need. This unit was a great transition into Black History Month! Students learned about and celebrated many monumental African Americans.

<u>History:</u> Students used clocks, calendars, schedules and written records to record or locate events in time. They used a calendar to explore how to measure time, they also looked at schedules and compared two schedules to notice how they can change between days. Students developed an understanding for the past, present and future and how things change over time. Additionally, students learned about chronological order, the difference between then and now, and how to use a timeline to show or understand important events.

<u>Geography:</u> Students learned about the world using words, models, and graphics. Students explained where things are using relative and absolute location. Students also learned about maps and map parts (map key and compass rose), and how they show location of places on a map. Then students learned about globes and what they are used for. Lastly, students explored continents and oceans to learn more about them.

Learning and growing together in first grade is SO MUCH FUN! We are so PROUD of our Forwood Fox Firsties accomplishments!



Third grade is staying focused and trying to remain healthy amid snow days and freezing temperatures. We continue to read a variety of fiction and non-fiction book selections, including *Because of Winn-Dixie, Frederick Douglass* and *Susan B. Anthony*. In math, we have completed Module 3 and are moving ahead to cover fractions in Module 5. In science, our most recent unit was

Environments and Survival and we are looking forward to learning about *Inheritance and Traits*. During social studies, we completed our unit on geography with fabulous state reports and are

currently learning about famous Black Americans. We have written informative writing pieces and are excited to compose narratives next! We continue to earn paw prints and classroom paw print celebrations, while individuals earn Fox points for demonstrating safe, responsible and respectful behaviors. We are anxiously awaiting warmer days and anticipate continued progress for all of our Forwood Foxes!



Our 4th grade classrooms spent a good portion of the 2nd marking period focusing on colonial America. We studied this time period during our social studies lessons, shared reading, and even during writing! The students studied the events leading up to the American Revolutionary War, read a novel about Jamestown, and wrote their own historical narrative about a Jamestown colonist who survived the winter of 1609. The students also read "My Life As A Book' and enjoyed learning about the mystery of Susan James. In science, the students took on the role of engineers to help the fictional town of Ergstown solve their blackout problems. Finally, in math the students worked hard on Reflex math to improve their multiplication and division fluency and then used these skills to multiply and divide multi-digit numbers.

Moving into the 3rd marking period, we will focus on fractions for the majority of the marking period. We have just begun a new science unit based around vision and light. The students will use various resources to try and explain why a gecko is disappearing from its rainforest habitat. We will also continue to build students' reading comprehension and writing skills as we prepare for spring testing.



We have been very busy this year writing legends, learning about fractions, and reading a variety of books. We are in the middle of The Great Depression right now as we read, <u>Bud, Not Buddy</u> and learn about a child's journey to find his father. Our unit in Math will help us connect what we learned about fractions and apply it to decimals and the place value chart. We are starting a new writing unit which will have us write an Essay critiquing the narrator's point of view. In March, we are headed to the New Jersey Planetarian which connects with our Science unit on Patterns of Earth and Sky, but first we will go to the Barnes Foundation and study art through the exploratory model of noticing and wondering.

Independent Learning Program

Mrs. Shenkle's Class (K-1): Students in room 203 have worked hard building letter recognition. Now, more focus has been given to letter sounds. The use of visuals and manipulation of letter cards helped students blend sounds together to read words following the CVC pattern. They have also been

learning core vocabulary and sight words. To reinforce these words, we practice writing daily using small blackboards or marker boards following Handwriting Without Tears Program developing correct letter formation with support from an adult.

Through consistent effort and adult support students have demonstrated improved communication abilities expressing themselves on their AAC device. Actively participating on classroom activities through the use of the sound wall, hands on activities with visuals transfers to the visual cues seen on

their AAC device. Providing effective support, students participate with curriculum in all subject areas leading to more independence using their AAC device with praise for their efforts.

Mr. Coffin's class (2nd-3rd): Our class has dedicated the 3rd Marking Period to create a positive community within our classroom through social and academic learning opportunities. By incorporating different levels of communication—verbal, ASL, AAC devices, 2D and 3D cards—we have been able to share ideas, feelings, tools, and toys among peers. Dynamic, center-based learning provides an opportunity for our students each day to learn and grow in ways that are both tailored and challenging to their specific needs.

Ms. Bass's class (3rd-5th): We had a busy third marking period in room 504. 5th graders read two nonfiction books; one about a black women baseball player and a one about dogs. 4th grade is reading short stories about winter while 3rd graders have been reading Because of Winn Dixie. All students practiced reading, vocabulary words, and answering WH- questions. We are working on our number sense and fluency. We also worked on noticing emotions in others and talking about your feelings. As the weather starts to warm up, we hope to spend more time outside.



Physical Education with Mrs. Rogers

Students have been hard at work in the gym learning both basketball and volleyball skills. We have worked on dribbling and passing, focusing on the bounce pass, chest pass, and overhead pass. We have learned several shooting games like Around the World and PIG.

In volleyball, students have learned about bumping, setting, serving, and spiking. We have played games with partners and groups demonstrating these skills. Students are really enjoying this mini unit.

Kindergarten-2nd grade have been focusing on cooperative games. We have worked on gross motor skills, throwing, catching, rolling, striking, and dribbling. They have enjoyed playing Zookeeper, Oscar's Trash Can, Fish Bowl and Capture the Castle.

In March, all Forwood students will attend an assembly put on by the American Heart Association. Students will have the opportunity to raise money for this very special organization and will all participate in the Jump Rope for Heart event during their regularly scheduled PE class at the end of the month. Students can earn prizes based on the amount of money that is raised. Please continue to encourage your students to wear their sneakers on PE day. We still have many students wearing crocs, boots, and Ugg slippers making it difficult for them to play. Thank you for your support with this!

Music with Ms. O'Connor

This marking period has been very busy! The K-1 classes did an outstanding job with their Cookies! musical and grades 2 and 3 got soulful and jazzy during their Gotta Be Jazz! musical. Ms. O'Connor is so proud of all these students accomplished! Both of these musicals were challenging and showcased the children's efforts and talents! Several students in grades 2-5 will be singing the National Anthem and Lift Every Voice and Sing for the UD Women's Basketball game on Saturday, March 8th. The Drama Club held auditions and have started rehearsing for our musical. The actors are already doing an amazing job! They also had the opportunity to go see Talley's production of Descendants on Wednesday, February 26th, and this fantastic performance inspired them to work hard on their own production. The Chorus, Band, and Orchestra have been practicing hard for their annual spring concert which will be held on March 27th, at 7:00 pm, at Claymont Elementary School. We hope to see you there!

Library with Mrs. Szostek

February was a busy month in our library. Students in grades K-2 explored the art and stories written by Jerry Pinkney, learned about animals in the Arctic region and Antarctica, and learned about different parts of a book. This week we are reading fiction stories and informational books about pandas.

Students in upper grades researched accomplished African Americans for BHM and finished the Internet safety unit with copyright law and fair use policy rules. They also practiced typing on type.com and advanced in using Google Slides to create posters and greeting cards.

In March we will host the Spring Book Fair in the library starting on he 10th. Students are already very excited about the event. Other highlights of the month include: Women's History Month, Ireland, leprechaun stories, nature in spring, and author of the month.
