Whether you have lived in District 196 for years or are a newcomer - one thing is clear - our community takes pride in its public schools. Through thoughtful planning, hiring talented staff, and unwavering support from our communities, District 196 has earned a reputation for excellence. In my first year as superintendent, I've talked with thousands of people, and one theme emerged - pride in our schools and our students.

Our students are on the front line of rapid change, and it's difficult to imagine the world of 2050. That is when our youngest learners will be coming into their own, in careers yet to be imagined. So, our challenge is to prepare students to be adaptable, critical thinkers, and lifelong learners. As I contemplate human development, well-being, and purpose, I believe our "Triple A" philosophy is as important

as ever: Excellence in academics, arts, and athletics. Triple A inspires a growth mindset, responsibility, self-discipline, collaboration, wellness, achievement, community, and lifelong learning.

Our high school students excel academically, earning national merit, college board honors, and over 3,900 college credits each year. Our graduation rates exceed state rates, and every subgroup of students outperforms their statewide peers. We monitor academic data based on socioeconomic status, special education, race and ethnicity. Still, there is more work to do. Local, state, and national data show that academic achievement has not yet rebounded to pre-pandemic levels. However, our students continue to make gains each year on many measurements.

In the arts, thousands of community members can attest to the joyful theatre, band, and choir performances they attend each year. Our fine arts programs continue to bring home state and national accolades year after year-and it all starts in our elementary programs. Finally, our athletic communities lead Minnesota in championships earned.

In education, however, it's not about accolades. Our most meaningful work is providing every student with what they need to succeed - making connections, teaching fundamentals, and inspiring hope for their futures. By focusing on human relationships, we've increased consistent attendance (to 89%) and reduced disruptive discipline and out-of-school suspensions. Keeping students engaged and on track, we can personalize instruction and bring relevance to every learner.

Families continue to choose Rosemount-Apple Valley-Eagan Public Schools because they want excellence in education. They understand that strong schools are the heart of strong communities. We have a shared vision and collective commitment to students, from school volunteers to families, business leaders, and elected officials.

As I look to the future, I'm filled with gratitude. Our tradition of excellence, student-centered values, and partnership with the community form the foundation for future success. The state of our schools is strong, and together, we will adapt and respond to the ever-changing needs and demands to prepare our students for the future.

Elementary Principal Named Finalist for National Distinguished Principal Award



The Minnesota Elementary School Principals' Association (MESPA) has named Chad Ryburn, principal of Highland Elementary

School, one of three finalists from Minnesota for the 2025 National Distinguished Principal award. This prestigious honor, presented in partnership with the National Association for Elementary School Principals (NAESP), recognizes principals who demonstrate outstanding leadership in instruction, student achievement, and school culture.

Ryburn has led Highland Elementary to a National Blue Ribbon Award for Exemplary High Performance. He fosters a culture of innovation, inclusion, and academic excellence by actively engaging parents, staff, and students in decision-making. Under his leadership, Highland's Site Council has grown to be an active Parent-Teacher Organization, and Highland school leadership teams were restructured to focus on student data and school goals.

In November, Ryburn was selected as the founding principal of Emerald Trail Elementary, opening in fall 2025. As the leader of the district's 20th elementary school, Ryburn is concurrently leading Highland Elementary and hiring, scheduling, budgeting, and planning to open the new school.

"Chad Ryburn has more than 30 years of experience as an exemplary elementary educator," shared Superintendent Michael Bolsoni. "At Highland Elementary, he has developed a positive, student-centered culture. His interest in opening 196's new elementary school was met with great excitement across our community. He is assembling an outstanding staff who are eager to work with him to create a welcoming school environment focused on student success."

In May, Ryburn and two other finalists will be interviewed by a panel of principal leaders from across Minnesota. Based on their interviews, applications, and recommendations, one principal will be selected to represent Minnesota as the 2025 National Distinguished Principal.

Share Your Opinion

District 196 has partnered with the Morris Leatherman Company, a research firm, to conduct a community survey to gauge public sentiment about the district.

In March, a random sample of residents will receive phone calls to participate in the survey. Questions will be asked about quality of education, financial management, strategic priorities, graduation requirements, and educational technology.

As new initiatives are considered, they progress through three stages: learning work, implementation science, and, eventually, standard work in our schools. The following are a few of the action plans in the implementation phase this year. These represent a sample of our strategic priorities-achievement and well-being-but do not encompass the full scope of our efforts.

ACHIEVEMENT

MATH AND LITERACY UNIVERSAL **SCREENERS**

Fastbridge, the district's math and literacy screener, is now in its second year and effectively predicts proficiency as measured by Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCAs). Students in grades K-6 take the assessment each trimester. As District 196 schools implement new K-5 math and literacy curricula, Fastbridge helps teachers determine the effectiveness of the curriculum, identify which students might need additional support or interventions, and improve student outcomes.

AMERICAN INDIAN EDUCATION

American Indian Education and Special Education teams are partnering to pilot the Minnesota Department of Education Dream Catcher program at four schools (K-12). The program trains American Indian Education advocates in student support and intervention teaming and builds partnership with special education teams in supporting families through special education referral processes.

DATA DASHBOARDS

Advances in data science and systems integration are transforming data use in District 196. Previously siloed, data is now centralized through a research team and dashboard tool, enabling disaggregation by economic status, English learner status, disability, race, gender, and more. This shift supports informed decision-making, targeted interventions, and improved student learning.

READING, MATH, SCIENCE CORE **CURRICULUM ALIGNMENT (K-12)**

In 2024, the district made a historic investment to update the core curriculum in reading, phonics, math, and science, while implementing Minnesota's READ Act. The state provides extensive professional development and the district supports teacher learning to improve instructional practices. Elementary teachers must complete READ Act training by 2025, and secondary teachers will complete the training the following year. The district converted three school days to professional development days to support teacher training. Curriculum implementation spans three years and is guided by specific goals for each content area.

WELL-BEING

BUILDING ASSETS, REDUCING RISKS (BARR)

Restructuring the ninth-grade experience using the BARR model promises to enhance belonging, responsibility, and achievement. Focused on building relationships centered on students' strengths, needs, and interests, the BARR model will be implemented at all four District 196 high schools to foster strong connections and support so students thrive as they enter high school.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOR AND SOCIAL **EMOTIONAL LEARNING**

Minnesota's Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program improves academic performance, reduces bullying and suspensions, and enhances social-emotional skills. The program will be used districtwide. In addition, Second Step, a K-8 social-emotional learning curriculum, is being used. Both foster safer schools, strengthen teacher efficacy, and promote a positive climate.

IMPROVING DISCIPLINE PRACTICES

Attendance is key to student success. Secondary schools are updating discipline practices to address disruptive behavior and reduce out-of-school suspensions. Over three years, suspensions have decreased by 20% across the district, keeping students in school and promoting academic achievement.





Top Magnet Schools of Excellence

Echo Park Elementary School of Leadership, Engineering and Technology and Glacier Hills Elementary School of Arts and Science earned Top Schools of Excellence awards from the Magnet Schools of America. Only four schools in Minnesota achieved the excellence designation this year.

Summer Construction Will Limit Access to Some Schools

Breaking ground on three high school activity centers may interrupt traffic patterns, relocate some athletic fields, and bring hope and excitement for the future.

- Eastview and Apple Valley High School construction will start in late May 2025. Projects at both schools include adding the Activity Center, renovating for science, and improving performance
- · Scott Highlands Middle School construction will continue through the school year and two summers and include eight new classrooms, new science labs, performance spaces, and additional parking.
- · Valley Middle and Falcon Ridge Middle Schools' new science labs and interior renovations will stretch over two summers
- · Dakota Ridge School construction of six classrooms and a multi-purpose room addition is on schedule for completion in August 2025.
- Thomas Lake Elementary will have a new dedicated bus loop, additional parking, and new traffic flow completed this summer.
- Rosemount High School is the most extensive project, and it will take up to three years to complete the Activity Center addition, classroom additions, and interior renovations. Summer construction will coincide with the closure of Highway 3 (east of the school) as the state constructs a roundabout at 142nd St. W. The city also will rebuild Chili Avenue (southwest of the school) but allow continuous access for school use The middle school north baseball/softball fields will be inaccessible from May 2025 until work is completed in summer 2027.





Emerald Trail Elementary School

With more than 600 names submitted, the district has approved a name for its 20th elementary school. Emerald Trail Elementary School will open in fall 2025. It is located at 13600 Ardroe Ave., Rosemount, near Akron Avenue and Bonaire Path.

"During the parent stakeholder meeting, Emerald Trail stood out," shared Principal Chad Ryburn. "The group unanimously supported it, recognizing the importance of creating a unique identity for this new chapter in our district's history. Emerald Trail Elementary will be where students, staff, and families come together to grow, learn, and thrive."

Why Emerald Trail?

The name was chosen to represent:

- · Community connection: fostering a sense of belonging and pride within the Rosemount community.
- · Sustainability and innovation: a net-zero ready, high-efficiency building featuring geothermal energy, with 440 wells and sustainable landscaping.
- · Walkability and access: School sidewalks will connect to city and county trail systems.

Fun Fact:

The geothermal work involved drilling 440 wells, each 150 feet deep. Stacked end-to-end, they would stretch 12.5 miles almost 200 football fields long.



Battistone Wins National FACS Teacher of the Year

Mia Battistone, a Family and Consumer Science teacher at Eastview High School, earned the National Teacher of the Year title from the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences. Her courses equip students with real-world skills in financial literacy, nutrition, child development, interior design, and consumer education.

"Mia's compassion for all learners is evident, creating a nurturing learning environment where she believes every student can learn," said Eastview Principal Bruce Miller. "Her ability to connect with students, differentiating her teaching to their unique needs, sets her apart."

This national recognition adds to Battistone's accolades, including the 2024 Minnesota FACS Teacher of the Year award and being a 2024 National FCCLA Adviser of the Year finalist.

Nicole Hosek, a STEAM teacher and magnet team leader at Glacier Hills Elementary School of Arts and Science, has been named the Magnet Schools of America (MSA) Region VI Teacher of the Year - one of six finalists for the national honor to be announced in April.

Known for her hands-on, inquiry-based approach, Hosek brings science, technology, engineering, arts, and math (STEAM) to life, fostering creativity, curiosity, and critical thinking in her students. Legislative Advisory Council Advocates for Local Control

With 70% of the District 196 revenue dependent on state aid, the district's Legislative Advisory Council monitors the state's biennial budget process and advocates for full funding of laws passed during the 2023-24 session. The district's legislative platform is particularly concerned with securing adequate funding for Minnesota's new Paid Family Leave Law (cost estimated at \$2.7 million in new payroll taxes) and hourly employee summer unemployment insurance (\$1.58 million). The platform also advocates for more local control.

The governor's proposed budget adjustments would extend summer unemployment insurance reimbursements and hold harmless school district compensatory funding. Both are helpful. Other provisions would reduce education funding and services to families:

- Elimination of quality compensation (Q Comp) program (-\$7.5 million)
- Reductions in special education transportation aid (unclear impact)
- Changes to integration and achievement aid (-\$60,000)
- Elimination of nonpublic school aid (-\$1.3 million)

At a February meeting, the advisory council discussed uncertainty at the federal level. The district's total federal education funding is approximately \$11 million, plus \$7.6 million for the federal school meal program. Federal funding includes Title I, II, III, and IV programs, special education, and McKinney-Vento support for unhoused students. There are also discussions about E-Rate funding, which discounts school technology purchases. District leaders will continue to monitor federal policies impacting school funding.

District Earns 10th for Budget Transparency

For the 10th year in a row, District 196 has received the Association of School Business Officials (ASBO) International's Meritorious Budget Award (MBA) for the 2024-25 fiscal year budget.

"The district's budget books aim to provide our district community with a roadmap through our budgeting process that breaks down the complex world of

school finance into more easily understandable sections," said District 196 Finance Coordinator Danny DuChene. "The progressively detailed layout allows us to share the district's financial story in a variety of ways to help maintain transparency and trust with our communities."

All budget documents for the current fiscal year and nine previous years are available on the Finance Department page at district196. org. These include the annual certified property tax levy, preliminary budget, final budget, capital expenditure budget, and the annual comprehensive financial report for each fiscal year.

2025 School Taxes Decrease

School taxes in Rosemount-Apple Valley-Eagan District 196 will decrease by 5% on average for 2025. The School Board adopted a tax levy 1% less than in 2024, leading to some potential property tax relief. A rise in commercial and industrial property values is contributing to a reduction in residential taxes.

District 196 Finance Director Christopher Onyango-Robshaw emphasized the importance of conservative budget estimates, noting past enrollment projections have been within a percentage point of actual figures, ensuring appropriate staffing levels. The district is projecting stable enrollment, and school tax levies are strictly regulated by state formulas, limiting increases.




