#### A note from the Headteacher

In the last newsletter I shared how the mental health needs of young people are increasing and the support networks in place to help families. In our staff CPD session on Wednesday, we received training from Abigail Gilbert, an Educational Psychologist, who is leading a programme on attachment awareness. The training focused on the difficulties that some children face due to an early life experience and the impact it can have on how a child's brain works and how they function. In the training we spoke about the importance of trust and what we can do in school to be a place where the children feel safe. The training is the first of two sessions which staff will receive as we work to become an attachment aware gold award school. Mrs Moore and Mrs Horton are jointly leading this project and working with professionals from the Local Authority. We are confident this will help support staff develop their skills as the needs of our young people change.
