SPFHS Ice Hockey Wins First-Ever Kelly Cup

The SPFHS Ice Hockey team brought home its first-ever Kelly Cup after winning 4-1 at Codey Arena. It was a pinnacle moment for not only the players but also for the Ice Hockey program, now celebrating its 20th year.

The match on Feb. 10 pitted the Raiders against Montclair Kimberly Academy (MKA). After a scoreless first period, MKA took the lead and held onto it until the third period.

"There were a lot of emotions," said Varsity Ice Hockey Coach Matt Gunther. "The clock was dwindling."

With the Raiders down 1-0, senior Anthony Lorenzetti, who they call "Mr. Clutch", scored a hat trick – two goals within seconds of each other, followed by a goal during the final minute of play. That final shot was his 100th goal of his high school career!

Charlie Sacchetti also scored for the Raiders with an empty-net goal – ending the game with a 4-1 victory.

"That moment was amazing," Lorenzetti said. "There was so much excitement in the air and everyone was hugging. You could feel the family bond that had been built over the entire season."

Gunther, who has led the program for 12 of the 20 years, said the moment



brought him back to when he was a player winning the Kelly Cup for Watchung Hills.



"As a coach, it was a great feeling to see the players set their minds on this goal since freshman year and to finally achieve it," he said. "It was a glorious moment for us to bring a championship to SPF for the first time ever."

Gunther explained that over the program's two decades, there have been highs and lows, with this season being by far the best with a 17-5-3 record. "The senior captains (Anthony Lorenzetti, Ryan Mauer and Ryan Sacchetti) were true leaders."

The 17 varsity players set their eyes on this final prize at the beginning of the season. Their coach continuously reminded them that the reward for winning was both a trophy and a hat – a symbolic moment in which the Kelly Cup champions each receive a hat, recognizing them as the top of the seven-team Kelly Division of the New Jersey Interscholastic Ice Hockey League's (NJIIHL).

"It's just a hat but to us it's so much more," Lorenzetti said. "The dream became a reality."

Lorenzetti was named 1st team all-conference, with Ryan Mauer named 2nd team all-conference. Mauer also broke past 100 points earlier in the season. Nicholas Movsesian and Lorenzo Tittanegro were named Honorable mentions for the conference.
