District Profile

GCS is the third-largest district in North Carolina, serving nearly 70,000 students across 126 schools in urban, suburban and rural areas. We have 48 magnet and choice schools with 66 programs, from Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) to performing or visual arts, advanced academics, Spanish immersion, Montessori, health sciences or aviation. GCS is achieving educational excellence, inside and outside the classroom. We are proud to be GCS.

School Profile

The A&T Four Middle College opened in 2003 on the campus of North Carolina Agriculture & Technical State University. The Middle College is proudly named after four North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University students who initiated a peaceful, civil rights sit-in protest at the F.W. Woolworth Department Store lunch counter in Greensboro, igniting a national movement. Prior to the name change in 2022, The School was known as The Middle College at NC A&T. Our district serves 68,000 students at 126 schools across the county. We are a single gender, all male, school with a history of academic and college going success.

Enrollment

The total enrollment at The A&T Four Middle College for the 2023-2024 school year is 170 students with a staff of approximately 20 educators.

Curriculum

Reflecting the district's commitment to meeting the needs of all students, the core courses of Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies are aligned to the North Carolina Standard Course of Study. Dual Enrollment courses at North Carolina A&T State University are offered to most students. Technology that includes 1-1 laptops and interactive white boards is also integrated throughout the curriculum. World language courses include Spanish with virtual options for French, German, and Chinese at foundational through advanced levels. A wide variety of elective courses are offered in business, physical education/health, social studies, and language arts. Some of the elective courses allow for the opportunity of certifications.

Educational Options

In order to provide educational programs that fulfill the unique needs of our juniors and seniors, students who meet certain criteria are eligible to participate in the following educational options.

- Dual Enrollment Program: Juniors and seniors may earn high school and college credits by enrolling in courses at North Carolina A&T State University.
- Career Exploration: All students are encouraged to sign up for classes offered through our Career Technical Education Program. All students also meet throughout the year with their counselor to discuss post high school options and planning for the future.

Student Assessments

The following assessments are provided to assist teachers and counselors in diagnosing individual strengths and challenges in order to provide more effective instruction.

PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test) – administered to all 10th and 11th graders.

Pre-ACT (Preliminary American College Test) – administered to all 10th graders.

EOC (End of Course Exams) – Students are required to take End of Course Exams for English II, Math II, & Biology. ACT WorkKeys – All Career Technical Education seniors that complete a pathway in a career cluster will take the WorkKeys test their senior year. To be recognized as a completer of a pathway in one of the 16 career clusters a student must have

- two main CTE or CCP classes within a Career & Technical Pathway
- one enhancement CTE or CCP class within a Career & Technical Pathway
- one level two class within a Career & Technical Pathway
