

Car Rider Line 2025-26

- There will be TWO car rider lines.
- Parents will enter Foxland Drive entrance OR the Murray Lane entrance (the very last one before you get to Granny White Pike) on the left side where the current bus line is located.
- Students will be dropped off at the front door before parents exit onto Granny White Pike.

Arrival Procedures

- Doors will open at 7:25 AM at the main entrance and the gymnasium entrance
- All students will report to the gymnasium until they are dismissed to go to first period class at 7:35 AM.
 - If students want to eat breakfast, they may go to the cafeteria, but they must stay the whole time.

• Buses will run at the regular time.

• Doors will open at 7:25 AM.

Arrival

- Students will be released to classes at 8:20 AM.
 - Classes will begin at 8:35 AM.

Dismissal



- School is dismissed at 2:57 PM.
- Students will go to the sidewalk along the front of the BMS building to be picked up by parents. Parents will use either the Foxland Hall or Murray Lane entrance to the car rider line.
 - Bus riders will exit the building on the Murray Lane side along the new wing (C wing) and load buses in the new bus lane which exits on to Murray Lane.



Brentwood Middle School's "**Parent University Night**" is designed to provide information, training, and resources that will support and empower parents to become leaders and advocates for their child's learning through 3 interactive sessions designed around Technology, Support, and Engagement.

Parent University

BMS Parent University will:

- Increase parental involvement and participation in their student's education.
- Empower parents to become effective advocates for their students.
- Strengthen home-school-community partnerships.
- Help parents develop the skills needed to implement positive parenting practices.
- Equip parents with the knowledge and awareness of resources available to them and their students.

Academic Recovery is a program in response to students who have failed ELA or Math for a nine weeks. It is hosted on Saturday morning, and is an intensive time with small groups of students.

Teachers work with the small groups (2-4 students) to remediate the essential skills needed to put students on a path to success in the future.
