Read -a- Thon	This school fundraising idea might be the favorite of your teachers and parents, as it encourages children to read for pleasure. Students obtain pledges from teachers, family members, or parents for the number of pages or books they can read, and then they log the hours. A read-a-thon is also a comparatively easier way to fundraise for your school.
Walk-a-Thon	A walk-a-thon is a fundraising event where people walk a set distance to raise money for a cause. It's also known as a charity walk or walking marathon Participants walk a set distance or course Donors pledge to donate a certain amount of money for each mile or lap walked Participants collect donations from donors

Select good questions, enlist a great host, and be careful to select a reasonable time and date.
Basketball Fundraiser	A basketball free throws fundraiser, also known as a shoot-athon, is a basketball event where participants ask for donations for each made free throw.
