

Williams Scores Way Into Record Book

This Valentine's Day was one Leighton Williams Jr. will never forget.

Wheatland-Chili Boys Varsity Basketball was taking on Oakfield-Alabama at home, and he was about to make history. The senior point guard was just eight points from becoming the team's all-time

leading scorer, and upon notching his 1,754th career point with a fast break layup three minutes into the second quarter, he secured the title, and the crowd erupted.

The previous program mark of 1,753 points had been held by Rodney Roberts since 2015. A decade later, Roberts, who now

coaches basketball, presented Williams with the game ball after his record-breaking bucket. Williams finished with 24 points in a 55-48 win over Oakfield-Alabama. And that wasn't his only record-breaking game of the season. With 52 points in a match against Elba the week before, he set a program record for most points in a game.

Williams has played on the varsity squad since eighth grade, but he will join a new team next year — the Cardinals. He has committed to St. John Fisher University, where he plans to major in athletic performance.

Drama Club Brings Little Women From Page to Stage

The Middle/High School Drama Club is bringing an American classic to life for their upcoming production of "Little Women."

A musical adaptation of Louisa May Alcott's coming-of-age novel, the show follows the adventures of sisters, Jo, Meg, Beth and Amy March, and their experience growing up in Civil War America. After putting on musical comedies the last few years, director Amanda Petrella-Christ chose "Little Women" to give students the opportunity to develop their artistry with a more dramatic piece. The upcoming production features a total of 34 students in the cast, crew and pit band.

The ceremony was originally scheduled for Saturday, June 28, however, the time and location will remain the same: 2 p.m. at Roberts Wesleyan University's Hale Auditorium. Graduation rehearsal will still take place on Friday, June 27.

Digital Signage Lights Up District

New digital signs outside T. J. Connor Elementary and the Middle/High School are enhancing District communication.

Unveiled in January, the Daktronics digital displays share important information with the community, including upcoming events, and they are hard to miss. The sign in front of the MS/HS is located near the bus loop entrance and replaces an outdated version that had been in the same spot. T. J. Connor's



is positioned at the entrance of the dropoff loop on Beckwith Avenue and is a new addition to the building.

The signage as well as the installation of new electronic locks throughout both schools are the final phase of the capital project approved by voters in 2022.



Work on the next capital project, approved by voters last May, will begin this spring and continue through summer 2026. The no-tax-impact project includes renovations to the MS/HS counseling suite and pool, bathroom renovations and fire alarm upgrades at T. J. Connor and repaving of parking lots and new roofing at both schools.

Students Complete Technology Classroom Renovations

Technology students are using what they learn to transform where they learn.

The Middle/High School has been working to retool its technology program to offer students more authentic opportunities and more variety of projects. But the updated programming required upgrades to the school's technology classrooms. These necessary renovations presented a real-time, hands-on learning experience for technology students, so they were put to work.



The project started with the demolition of the existing space, which was made up of two classrooms separated by a woodshop. Guided by teacher Scott Melville, students began by knocking down the wall separating the woodshop and one of the classrooms. They also ripped out the anchored workstations and put them on wheels to make the space — also used for ceramics class — more versatile. The work, which began in December and was completed by the middle of January, also included the installation of new flooring and expansion of the dust collection system.

Prince Earns Golden Apple

T. J. Connor Elementary's Katie Prince thought it was going to be a normal school day, but when she walked into her classroom on January 13, the fourth grade teacher was greeted by the enthusiastic cheers and applause of her students, as well as a crew from News 8 WROC. They were there to surprise her with a Golden Apple Award.

The award recognizes teachers and administrators from across the Greater Rochester region who make a significant impact on the lives of students. Recipients are selected based on nominations by students, families or colleagues. Student Andrew Harper, who was in Prince's class last year, nominated her for the award.

"She's really kind, is always there when you need a hug. She's never mad at you. She's just an awesome teacher," Harper told News 8.

Prince has been teaching for 15 years and has worked at T. J. Connor since 2020. She spoke to News 8 about the approach she takes in the classroom.

"It's important to take care of their hearts first," she said. "I always tell the kids, 'I have to love you, keep you safe and then we can learn.' Because if they don't feel loved, don't feel safe, they won't feel comfortable taking risks."

"She builds a classroom family. She loves the kids. She tells them that, and she gets them to work really hard. So, I think by creating an environment in the classroom that is safe and conducive to learning, the kids really do learn, and her academic results are outstanding too," added Principal Daniel Murray.






Swavely Wins Section V Long Jump Title
