# Affording a Bryn Mawr Education

BRYN MAWR FLEXIBLE TUITION PROGRAM





## Our Flexible Tuition Program

We understand the cost of a Bryn Mawr education can be a challenge for many families. Our Flexible Tuition Program offers families the opportunity to pay what they can afford. The program is comprehensive and may also apply to school trips, textbooks, transportation, technology, extended day programs and other fees. We want to ensure that the most qualified students have the opportunity to attend Bryn Mawr, regardless of a family's financial circumstances.

**For the current school year (2024–25), Bryn Mawr allocated over \$6 million in Flexible Tuition to more than one-third of our families.** A family's annual obligation is determined after a careful review of their Flexible Tuition application and upon the recommendations made by Clarity Tuition. A family's tuition responsibility can range from \$5,000 to \$40,430. Every family is asked to pay some portion of tuition.

## Who should apply?

Bryn Mawr's Flexible Tuition Program is open to all families. Families submit information about their financial resources to Clarity Tuition and we use standard criteria to evaluate a family's ability to pay the tuition. While it is difficult to define a "typical" Flexible Tuition candidate, common threads among families who qualify are factors like income, the number of children in a family and lifestyle choices.

## How is the family contribution calculated?

Family circumstances vary widely. Often families with similar incomes have different financial need due to differences in financial circumstances other than income. The Flexible Tuition Committee assesses each family's situation individually, looking at the entire financial picture.

### How does Bryn Mawr decide what families will pay?

There are some key factors in determining a family's tuition costs. Within each category below, you will find typical items we consider.

#### 1. Assets

A family's assets may include: taxable wages, self employment income, taxable dividend and/or interest income, alimony or other household expenses paid by a separated or divorced

The Bryn Mawr School is a member of Clarity Tuition, which helps independent schools across the country assess a family's ability to pay tuition. In reviewing each Flexible Tuition application, Bryn Mawr considers the Clarity Tuition recommendation along with the additional required financial information a family is asked to provide.

spouse, pensions, estates or trusts, capital gains, taxable IRA distributions, profits from a business or real estate investments, vehicles and bank accounts.

#### 2. Expenses & Debt

Typical expenses and debts may include educational expenses, home mortgages, medical/dental expenses, prolonged illness, unemployment, past business debts, consumer debt, child support, costs for a child with special needs and child care.

#### 3. Filing Status

We consider your filing status: divorced, separated, never married or widowed. **Awards are not considered unless complete financial information is received from both living parents. If parents are separated, divorced or never married, both parents are required to complete the Flexible Tuition Application.** It is expected that both parents and appropriate stepparents contribute to the education of their child regardless of legal agreements. Bryn Mawr's Flexible Tuition Program does not feel bound by the assertion that one parent disclaims responsibility for educational expenses.

#### 4. Non-Working Parent

If all children in a family are over the age of 6, it is expected that both parents will be employed. If one parent is able but chooses not to work, we impute a full-time income at minimum wage to that parent for the purposes of calculating Flexible Tuition.

#### 5. Number of Children in Nonpublic Elementary and Secondary Schools

Bryn Mawr considers a family's other children enrolled in independent schools. We look for equal commitment to paying tuition for all K–12 children in a family. Students in college have many more resources available to them, such as student loans, employment and scholarships.

## Frequently Asked Questions

### How is Flexible Tuition different from Financial Aid?

Flexible Tuition seeks to increase access to independent schools and is a model of tuition assistance that is based on a family's ability to pay rather than how much a school can give.

### If we apply for Flexible Tuition, will it affect our child's application for admission?

No, our admissions committee considers an applicant based on the applicant's own merit. A family's financial situation is not discussed in admission deliberations.

### What does Flexible Tuition cover?

In addition to tuition, the program may apply to textbooks, transportation, technology, extended day programs, school trips and other fees.

### Will all students eligible for Flexible Tuition receive it?

Unfortunately, no. Every year there are more qualified applicants for Flexible Tuition than available funds. There is a waitlist in the event that additional funds become available.

### Is Flexible Tuition automatically renewed each year?

No, a family currently in the Flexible Tuition Program must reapply for it in subsequent years. Flexible Tuition applications will be available in October and must be submitted by mid-December. Given the same financial circumstances, a family can expect to contribute approximately the same portion of tuition toward a Bryn Mawr education. We are committed to seeing our students reach graduation, pending annual demonstration of continued need.

## Tuition Refund Plan

This plan protects tuition fees in the event of a student's withdrawal from school. A brochure outlining the details of this plan is included with the reservation agreement.

## Payment Schedule

Tuition is due in advance. Sixty-five percent of the tuition is payable on August 1; the balance is due on December 1.

Fees for Extended Day and other charges are billed monthly and are due upon receipt. A late fee of 1.5% per month is charged for all bills remaining unpaid for more than 30 days after the billing date.

## Additional Expenses

Some additional monies are required to cover books, uniforms and activities. Activities fees include items such as transportation for class trips, overnight class retreats, publications like the Bryn Mawr yearbook and PSAT testing. Parents are billed for books and activities fees in July.

## Extended Day

There is no additional cost for before-school care. For students in the Lower School, there is a nine-month after-school care program. The rate for a full year Extended Day contract is \$2,500. In the Middle School, an Afternoon Supervision Program is offered until 5:30 p.m. daily. There is a full school year contract for \$1,200 or drop-in rate of \$15 per day. The deadline for Bryn Mawr's Flexible Tuition Program is **December 15, 2024**. Requests submitted after this date may not be included in the initial allocation of tuition assistance. As a result, funds may not be available to families who qualify if the application is submitted after the deadline.
