



Plan for Naloxone (Narcan) Availability in Waterford Graded School District

Purpose:

To provide life-saving intervention in cases of opioid overdose, Naloxone (Narcan) will be readily available for use on students, staff members, or visitors in need of an opioid antagonist.

Training:

Staff will complete yearly training on the administration of Naloxone through online modules and hands-on demonstrations. The training will include:

- Recognizing signs of an opioid overdose.
- Proper administration of Naloxone using Instructions for Use.
- Steps to take following administration, including calling 911 and performing CPR if necessary.

Signs of Opioid Overdose:

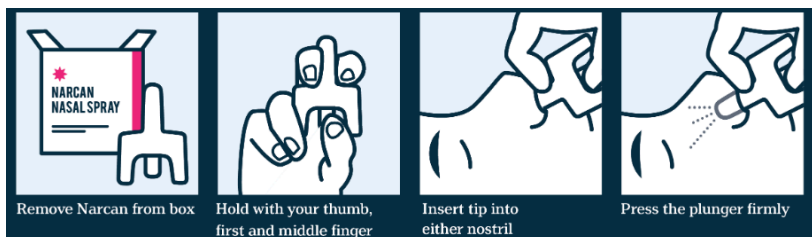
Staff will be trained to identify the following symptoms of a possible overdose:

- Unresponsiveness or unconsciousness.
- Slowed or stopped breathing.
- Snoring or rattling sounds.
- Cold or clammy skin.
- Discolored lips or fingernails.

Administration Protocol:

If an opioid overdose is suspected:

1. Administer Naloxone following the Instructions for Use provided with the medication.



2. Call 911 immediately.
3. Begin CPR if necessary, following established guidelines.

Naloxone Storage Locations:

Naloxone will be stored in accessible locations across the district to ensure timely administration:

- **Evergreen:** AED case in the office lobby.
- **Trailside:** AED case outside of the cafeteria.
- **Woodfield:** AED case outside of the cafeteria.
- **Fox River:** AED case in the cafeteria outside of the gym doors.
- Additional doses will be kept in the health room for use during open office hours.

Informational Materials:

Informational posters and materials about recognizing opioid overdoses and administering Naloxone will be available in staff-only areas and inside the AED cases at all storage locations.
