

Helping Your Child With Comprehension

Understanding what we read or what is read to us is the ultimate goal of reading. Here are some questions and/or things to think about and discuss after reading with your child:

- Retelling the story with beginning, middle, and end.
- Setting: Where did the story happen?
- Main Idea: What was this story mostly about? (Who did what where?)
- **Characters:** Who was in the story? What did we learn about (character name)?
- Making Connections: Did this story remind us of an experience in our life? Another book we have read? A movie we have seen? Something we already learned about?

How to Help Your Child Think About Reading

The purpose of reading is to gain meaning. Predicting is a strategy in which the reader thinks about what is going to read based on clues from the text. Predicting keeps the reader's mind

actively engaged in reading as he/she is trying to figure out what will happen next. Here are some questions to ask your child to reinforce


- the skill of predicting:
- Look at the title and the picture on the cover. What do you think this book will be about?
- During reading: "What do you think is going to happen next in the story?" Also ask, "What causes you to think that?"
- What do you think will happen next?
- How do you think (the character) will solve the problem?
- How do you think the story will end?




Favorite February Picture Books

- It's important to read frequently. The more a student reads, the more progress will be made in all areas of
