Mission

The mission of the Frewsburg Central School District School Counseling Program is to provide a comprehensive, developmental counseling program that addresses the academic, career, and social/emotional development of every student in the district. With the collaborative efforts of school personnel, families, and community resources, the school counseling program will provide students with opportunities to help grow into, participate in, and become productive citizens of a global society.

Philosophy

As counselors of the Frewsburg School District, we believe:

- all students are valued as individuals.
- all students have a right to, and will benefit from, a comprehensive school counseling program that is culturally and developmentally appropriate.
- all students are capable of learning, achieving and acquiring knowledge in different ways and at different rates.
- students, with their parents/guardians, are responsible for monitoring their educational progress, assisted by the professional school counselor.

and that counselors:

- help students recognize their learning strengths, weaknesses and potential.
- coordinate activities and programs that support the academic mission of the school.
- utilize the strengths of parents/guardians and the community and serve as liaisons between parents/guardians, the community and the school.

- serve as leaders in the advocacy of school reform and are key players in school reform.
- participate in on-going programs and professional development that enhance their skills and knowledge.

Program Objectives

- All students UPK through 12 have access to a school counselor and the comprehensive program and the program will align with district vision, mission, and goals.
- All students in grades 7 through 12 will have annual individual progress review meetings with a certified school counselor to review each student's career/college planning and readiness, academic progress, and social/emotional development.
- All students UPK through 12 will be provided core curriculum instruction by a certified school counselor in collaboration with teachers to address student's competencies in career/college planning and readiness, academic progress, and social/emotional development.
- All students UPK through 12 will be provided direct and indirect student services to assist students with academic, attendance, and behavior needs such as individual and group counseling, advisement, consultation, and referral.
- All students UPK through 12 will be provided with information on college and careers.
- All students UPK through 12 will be provided with opportunities to engage in a social emotional curriculum within the classroom setting.

District Accountability

- The district will analyze program data annually resulting in gap action plans and program adjustments.
- A program outcomes report will be provided to the district board of education annually and will also be posted on the district and school websites.

Professional Development Planning

• The district will monitor school trends and district needs to determine appropriate professional development opportunities to address identified gaps.
