Course Description:

The Advanced Placement Art History course is a college level art history course that will prepare the student for the AP Art History exam. This course will explore the history of art across the globe from prehistory to the present. By analyzing works of art through observation, discussion, reading, and research, students will learn the following skills:

- Evaluating works of art from different eras and cultures
- Developing a theory about the meaning of a work of art and explaining and supporting their interpretation
- Seeing connections to artistic traditions, styles, or practices in a work of art No prior experience in art or art history is needed, but the course requires a strong commitment to academic work. The student is encouraged to take the AP Art History exam in May.

Course Rationale:

The Advanced Placement Art History course offers a chronological survey of art from the dawn of civilization to the present. The highly motivated student will be able to study college level art history. Architecture, sculpture, painting, and other art forms will be studied within the historical, social and political cultures which they were produced. Concepts such as style, function, and thematic issues will be investigated as a means of examining and appreciating art. This study of art history will enrich student knowledge of humanity. Many colleges and universities offer advanced placement and/or credit to the student who has performed successfully on the A.P. Art History exam.

Course Objectives:

- The student will demonstrate knowledge of art in historical and cultural context by examining the artwork in terms of artist, media, methods of production, thematic approach, function, time period, and place/culture.
- The student will analyze artworks, written and orally, using the art criticism process: description, analysis, interpretation, and judgement. (A+ Writing)
- The student will analyze and examine historical content from their readings using aesthetics to discover how the subject matter and style of the artworks reflect the preferences of the time periods. (A+ Reading)
- The student will demonstrate knowledge of the elements and principles of design through oral presentations to critique artworks. (A+ Speaking and Listening)
- The student will research and write about a range of subject matter, ideas, symbols, and themes such as politics, gender, patronage, religion, function, ethnicity and society to develop a thesis. (A+ Research)
