An anonymous donor has made a significant gift to the *A Gift for Today, A Gift for Tomorrow Campaign*, establishing an endowed fund for the King's Christian Leadership Program of Distinction. This generous gift demonstrates the importance of Christian education and is a great encouragement to TKA's faculty and staff, reinforcing their dedication to keeping the main thing, the main thing!

This new endowment will fuel the continued growth and development of the Christian Leadership Program in perpetuity. It will also strengthen *The Institute for Christ & Culture*, enabling The King's Academy to expand initiatives such as podcasts featuring expert guests, new content and courses designed to deepen students' faith and apologetic skills, Reasonable Faith sessions for families, and other forums for meaningful discussions within the TKA community, including *Refresh for Moms* and *Recharge for Dads*.

As we reflect on God's provision, I am reminded of the spiritual growth TKA witnessed in 2024. Seventy-five individuals made the life-changing decision to follow Christ for the first time, and countless others deepened their commitment to Christian leadership. Looking ahead to 2025, King's faculty and staff pray for an even greater harvest, growing God's Kingdom. As such, spiritual life plans are already in motion for the new year:

• Global Service: In January, 100 students and chaperones partnered with Hope Project International to build 16 homes in Nicaragua, including TKA's 90th home built with Hope Project. Thank you for your faithful generosity to support this effort!

- Leadership Development: Many TKA students also participated in Student Leadership University programs, including SLU 101, SLU 202, and a new SLU 301 experience in Europe.
- **Spiritual Enrichment:** During Spiritual Emphasis Week, we welcomed Christian apologist Lee Strobel, author of *The Case for Christ*, who also contributed to the *Institute for Christ & Culture's* podcast and a new apologetics class for The King's Online Academy.
- Community Growth: New initiatives, like the *Recharge* for Dads group led by Elementary Principal, Mr. Miller and TKA parent, Mr. Eric Bucher will complement the ongoing *Refresh for Moms* program led by Director of Elementary Student Ministries, Mrs. Crews; encouraging TKA parents to grow deeper in faith.



Teamwork – United in Purpose

n today's world, there are frequent examples of conflict between the goals and values of parents with those advanced by many in our culture. Sadly, this tension has often extended to classrooms and districts where the priorities of the school are in stark contrast with the home. Parents across the country are finding themselves in heated debates with school boards over what is permissible and how to shield their children from the array of inappropriate content pushing into earlier grades in many areas around the country. Fortunately, at The King's Academy we are blessed by a unified team of administrators and educators who understand the honor and responsibility we have to partner together to guide students as they develop and learn in a safe environment.

A key component of our mission, is the reference to Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old, he will not depart from it." We believe that the Scriptures delineate parents as divinely appointed authorities over their children while situating the church as the established authority over believers. The synergistic collaboration between these two entities can empower a school to extend this divine mission, thereby ensuring that the educational experience aligns with biblical teachings. witness the incredible progress being made in the hearts and minds of our students.



A Flourishing Environment

ocusing on spiritual formation and rigorous academics creates a flourishing high school environment at The King's Academy. As we reflect on the remarkable achievements of our students, faculty, and staff, TKA's commitment to academic excellence, community engagement, and spiritual growth is evident. Our faculty, students, and parents partner in their dedication to fostering a culture that embodies our core Christian values, leading to noteworthy accomplishments that deserve celebration and recognition. Colossians 3:23 reminds us to "Work wholeheartedly, as for the Lord and not for men." Our students consistently demonstrate this as they give the glory to God for their successes.

We believe that education is a pathway to understanding God's purpose for our lives. This commitment is evident in the outstanding academic achievements of our students. This year, students achieved an impressive 84% pass rate on AP exams, significantly surpassing the national average of 60%. Additionally, TKA recognized our National Merit seniors, with four students earning National Merit Commended Scholars status after scoring in the top 3% in the country on qualifying PSAT. Our students have also earned prestigious academic distinctions: thirteen students were awarded AP Scholars with Distinction, eleven AP Scholars

with Honor, and thirteen AP Scholars. Additionally, twenty National Hispanic Scholars, eleven African American Scholars, five National Indigenous Scholars, and eight First-Generation Scholars were named. Students have also achieved a perfect score on the PSAT/NMQST and perfect sub-scores on the ACT and SAT this school year. These academic milestones reflect our students' dedication and the excellent support they receive from King's faculty.

At TKA, we are committed to helping students grow not only academically but creatively as well. On the stage, the school year began exceptionally strong and rooted in Christ with the performance of *Joseph* by *Sight and Sound*. Presenting an audience with a Biblical performance has continued to impact those involved and those watching. The musical *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* was also a great success for our theater program.

Our music programs also shone this year. TKA's *Christmas Night* of Jazz was spectacular with one of the highest levels of performances to date. The Conservatory teams excelled on the stage as they united for their Christmas performances. Seeing students join across disciplines is always one of the most moving experiences!

Our yearbook, photography, art, and film classes continue to impress. This fall, we debuted *Iron Dusk*, where students were challenged to

read scripture and interview Christian leaders to reveal what the Bible says about men and women. The journey resulted in one of our very best films to date!

Our commitment to excellence extends beyond the classrooms and onto the athletic fields, courts, and pool. TKA athletic teams have displayed remarkable talent this year. The fall season was especially remarkable for our Lions as our teams won an impressive 11 championships. The girls' swim team clinched the program's second regional championship, and several other teams earned district titles, including football, volleyball (their fifth consecutive district win), girls cross country, girls swimming, and boys swimming. Eight of our teams advanced to the regional round of the playoffs, demonstrating both skill and determination. The fall was capped off by national signing day, with eight TKA athletes inking letters of intent to play at the collegiate level, and even more expected to follow in the spring.

As we celebrate the many successes of our student-athletes, we are reminded of the tremendous potential that our students possess. At The King's Academy, we are committed to preparing young men and women to lead lives of purpose and impact with every achievement. Together, we will continue to shine a light in our world, guided by faith and driven by excellence.

The curriculum covers a wide range of legal skills, including critical thinking, logic, analytical reasoning, research, writing, and persuasive speaking. For those students motivated to study law beyond the classroom, the program also offers competitive mock trial and moot court opportunities. These teams are coached by experienced attorneys and compete against other schools locally and nationally, providing students with invaluable hands-on experience.

At the heart of the program is a commitment to a Christ-centered approach to law. The O'Keeffe Pre-Law Studies Program is distinctive not only for its academic rigor but also for its focus on teaching students to view the law from a Biblical perspective applying Christcentered excellence.

The true strength of the program lies in its exceptional staff.

Students are blessed by the heart, passion, and talent of our experienced faculty, who are also attorneys, who selflessly pour into the program. This student-driven program constantly seeks innovative ways to enhance learning, ensuring that each student's potential is realized. Rooted in Faith, Teaching with Purpose

t The King's Academy, each \uparrow faculty member is uniquely called to impart knowledge and share the message of salvation through Jesus Christ with their students. This dual responsibility requires a steadfast commitment to both professional development and spiritual growth. As Proverbs 9:9 reminds us, "Instruct the wise and they will be wiser still; teach the righteous and they will add to their learning." By remaining rooted in their faith, TKA educators are able to fulfill their mission of teaching with purpose and impact lives for Christ.

One of the key ways in which The King's Academy supports the spiritual and intellectual growth of its teachers is by providing opportunities to attend local and national conferences. In preparation for the 2024-2025 school year, seven TKA educators from various departments attended the Rooted Educator Worldview Summit in Black Mountain, North Carolina. This worldview summit, hosted by ACSI and the Colson Center, provided valuable resources for developing a Christ-centered school culture, fostering a healthy faith formation in students, refuting secular ideology, and expanding best practices around a clear and consistent application of the Christian worldview. Keynote speakers included Dr. Sean McDowell, Dr. Kathy Koch, Dr. Matthew Sleeth,

Mr. John Stonestreet, and Ms. Monique Duson.

The Rooted Educator Worldview Summit proved to be an impactful and enriching experience for our educators. High School Science Teacher, Francine Cangelosi shared a valuable analogy presented at the summit that emphasized the importance of allowing students to organically see God's hand in every subject area: "Our course content is like a pizza. God is not a separate slice of the pie—He is the crust that holds it all together. God is rooted in all areas of the subject matter we are teaching." English Department Chair, Mayra Mesa, echoed the assurance that God's presence can be found within every subject area, "In English Language Arts students explore themes of pride and sacrifice in a short story, making connections to biblical principles of love and compassion. We introduce verses that highlight the patient and kind nature of love while also cautioning against the pitfall of pride." Middle school teacher, Jamie Moyeno highlighted the importance of speaking God's truth to students and reminding students of their identity in Christ.

At the beginning of the fall semester, Mr. Austin Parenti, Executive Director of Digital Media Arts reinforced the principles conveyed at the *Rooted Educator*

Worldview Summit in his professional development session for King's faculty and staff titled "Teach the Bible in Five Minutes or Less." Through the intentional sharing of God's word in his Digital Media Arts classes, Mr. Parenti has seen many students make a profession of faith and express a desire to learn more about the Lord. He reminded teachers that the Word of God does not return void and will accomplish the Lord's purpose (Isaiah 55:11). When God is prioritized within the classroom, He is faithful and will provide the time and resources necessary to accomplish academic objectives (Matthew 6:33).

At The King's Academy, faculty recognize their calling to serve as ministers of the gospel while simultaneously maintaining academic excellence within their classrooms. They understand that teaching with such a purpose requires them to remain deeply rooted in Jesus. As Christ states in John 15:5, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit. Apart from me you can do nothing." This powerful truth reminds us that true success is found through our relationship with Christ. By nurturing our students' spiritual lives and drawing strength from God, our teachers are equipped to impact their students' lives academically and spiritually.





Summer Masterclass Experience

he King's Online Academy (TKOA) launched the first course in a new series of Masterclasses this summer with the Art of Worship featuring instruction by Grammywinning CCM recording artist, Mac Powell. This unique learning experience provided students, with an interest in worship, the opportunity to receive top-tier training from one of the industry's leading experts. The course, delivered in hybrid format, allowed students to complete part of the curriculum online during the summer, and then come together in person to collaborate on an original

worship song and music video release. Students had the privilege of learning from Mac Powell, training with vocal experts, and working alongside local worship leaders to arrange, produce, and record the song, I Sing Victory written by TKA's Producing Artistic Director, Kyle Schnack.

A first of its kind, TKOA Masterclasses offer students the opportunity to learn in a flexible environment, where they can absorb expert instruction while also engaging in hands-on creation. This format empowers students to apply

the knowledge and skills they gain throughout the course to develop a culminating real-world experience or product. Currently, TKOA is developing additional Masterclasses, including courses featuring Dan Cathy of Chick-fil-A, an animation course featuring lessons from a Pixar animator, the Art of Film Production developed by actor, producer and director Andre Gordon, as well as Philosophy & Theology featuring Lee Strobel and his work with The Case for Christ.



Mr. Dan Stuart and Mr. Brandon Marlow, this experience provided an opportunity to go beyond classroom walls and into the real world of competing worldviews.

King's plans to offer its third lifechanging Maven Experience next fall. Through this program, students will see their faith grow bolder, their classroom knowledge become spiritually vibrant, and will have the opportunity to turn potential doubts and questions into deeper convictions.

Connection in College Advising

he College Advising Office plays a crucial role in guiding students as they navigate the process of pursuing their post-secondary goals. With a focus on building meaningful, personalized relationships, the office integrates college planning (versus college-fit) discussions with biblical truths that encourage students to reflect on their vocational calling. This approach is implemented through the development and delivery of relevant, actionable, biblically-based content through a variety of programs and experiences, beginning as early as ninth grade.

TKA's biblically-centered approach extends far beyond college acceptance. It is designed to have a lasting, eternal impact on students' lives. The College Advising Office integrates a vocational calling method with strategic aspects of college planning with a grace-filled air of providence. This approach is designed to prepare students to attend the college or university of their choice as guided by Philippians 1:10 and focus on an eternallyminded, relational outlook on their future paths.

The College Advising Office places a strong emphasis on building relationships and helping students navigate their future aspirations. With a relational heartbeat,

it helps students align their beliefs and behaviors in a Godhonoring manner, particularly in

the context of their future paths. In pursuit of excellence, the office identified the goal of increasing communication with students particularly during their freshman year when foundational conversations take place in a classroom setting. This connection is maintained through a variety of programs designed to maximize developmental stages and curiosity, offering comprehensive college planning experiences. This allows all TKA high school students to engage in grade-specific classroom workshops, college fairs, college admissions nights, college representative visits, college tours, and individual college advising meetings. In just the first semester of this academic year, 167 individual college advising meetings were held with seniors, 54 students were assisted during "Walk-In Thursdays" in the first quarter, 45 juniors visited four in-state colleges, and 330 students engaged with 26 on-campus college representatives.

Recognizing the importance of strengthening relationships with parents, the College Advising Office has also prioritized improving communication with families. This collaboration has led to the introduction of semester grade specific "Connect with College Advising" workshops, which provide parents of students in grades 9-12 with the same information their children receive in classroom workshops. These sessions also offer valuable access

to industry-relevant content and

provide opportunities for parents to network with others in similar stages of life, fostering camaraderie and fellowship. Additionally, all high school parents are invited to attend events such as the annual College Fair, College Financial Aid & Scholarship Night, and bi-annual College Admissions Nights. In the fall semester, more than 200 high school parents attended a workshop, 158 parents and students attended the College Financial Aid & Scholarship Night and Fall College Admissions Night. The increased facetime with students and parents has resulted in greater engagement, involvement, and excitement within the College Advising program.

As accessibility to students and parent partnerships continue to grow, the College Advising Office remains focused on eternal elements and strives to teach students dependence on God (John 15:5) as they navigate the college preparation and application process. This focus provides peace as students seek and fulfill God's calling in their lives, aligning with the mission to "graduate Christian leaders who seek to impact their world for the King of Kings." The College Advising Office is committed to remaining

> receptive to the evolving needs of higher education institutions and prospective first-year college students while staying steadfast in its eternally minded, relational approach.

New House System Launched

he first semester of middle school has been filled with exciting community-building and unforgettable experiences for our students. One of the most significant additions this year is the launch of the House System, an initiative designed to foster community and a strong sense of belonging among students.

In August, students were introduced to the House System during a highly anticipated sorting ceremony where they were assigned to one of four houses. The enthusiasm continues to grow. Throughout the year, students have had numerous opportunities to bond with their housemates, engage in team-building activities, and compete in friendly challenges. They actively work to earn points for their houses by demonstrating kindness, teamwork, academic excellence, and involvement in house events. This has created a sense of excitement and camaraderie with spirited participation during events such as the House Battles and Homecoming Week.

The House System has brought a new level of excitement to every aspect of student life. Whether it's proudly wearing their house shirts on Fridays, participating in games during retreats, or building connections during regular house meetings, students are embracing

the system wholeheartedly. The addition of incentives, prizes, and even field trips has further enhanced their experience. At the end of the year, one house will claim the coveted House Cup. Seeing students and faculty come together in genuine community is a beautiful reminder of the truth in Psalm 133:1, "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!"

Other memorable events this semester included our Back-to-School Bash at Rapids Waterpark, where nearly 400 students gathered for a fun-filled day that was the perfect way to kick off the year. The gradelevel retreats at Realife Camp in Vero Beach also provided a wonderful balance of fun, community, and faith. One of the highlights was the House Battles, such as the Gold Rush, which tested teamwork and collaboration. Students also had the opportunity to try new activities like swimming,



archery, and painting, making the retreats even more exciting.

However, the most important aspect of these retreats were the chapel sessions, where students were given the opportunity to respond to the Gospel message. Many students made first-time commitments to Christ or rededicated their lives to Him. As we witnessed these life-changing decisions, we were reminded of the truth in Luke 15:10: "I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." This powerful reminder of God's love and the joy in heaven over each soul was a highlight of the semester, inspiring us to celebrate these new beginnings in Christ.

We recognize that the middle school vears are a transformative time in a student's life, full of physical, emotional, and social changes. Our mission is to create a joyful and nurturing environment where students are known, mentored, and encouraged. Through initiatives like the House System, retreats, and chapels, we strive to build a community that helps students grow academically, socially, and spiritually. As we reflect on our first semester, we are grateful for the continued growth and development of our students in all areas of their lives.



he final verse in the Old Testament contains a promise. "He will restore the hearts of the fathers to their children and the hearts of the children to their fathers, so that I will not come and smite the land with a curse." - Malachi 4:6. The prophet Malachi is describing the "Day of the Lord," but after scribing these words, there was silence for more than 400 years. Then, Jesus comes to earth as Immanuel, meaning God with us. This changed everything! Jesus was fully man and fully God, one who could relate with us on a personal level. "For we do not have a high priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses, but One who has been tempted in all things as we are, yet without sin." - Hebrews 4:15

This fall, King's was intentional in creating opportunities for fathers and their sons to strengthen their relationship with God and with each other. A five-week *Father and Son*

launched with the goal of restoring the hearts of fathers to their children and children to their fathers. During the weekly meetings, fathers and sons learned about the depth of God's love for them and how that love should transform and positively influence their relationships. The program, developed and led by TKA parent Eric Bucher, concluded with a session by J. Brett Earnest, author of Sons of Men: A Christian Father's Guide to Raising Sons. Earnest challenged the fathers and sons to have a vision and wholeheartedly pursue it. He also led a parent's workshop to a broader audience on practical approaches to confronting and defeating temptation.

It is important to recognize that God's love is the kind of love that a father has for his children. God is our perfect heavenly Father who defines the roles and relationships that humanity epitomizes. At TKA, we often refer to this as "God's design." God's design for the family is for the man to be actively leading, loving, and serving his wife and children. In a culture where godly masculinity is highly scrutinized and under attack, truth from God's word on a male's role is timeless and clear. Men are called to lead, but to do so counter-culturally by following Jesus' personification of servant leadership.

History has shown the consequences of absent leadership. More than 85% of youths in prison come from fatherless homes, 71% of high school dropouts come from fatherless homes, 90% of all homeless and runaway children are from fatherless homes, and nearly 25 million children live without their biological father. Programs like the Father and Son Discipleship Program, Dads and Donuts, and the Daddy Daughter Dance are intentionally designed to reinforce the critical role of the father in God's design for the family unit, which He created for a purpose.





Reading Challenge

In October, TKA's Rosemary Beaumont Library hosted its second annual Battle of the Books, an eagerly anticipated event for elementary students. This competition provides a unique opportunity for young readers to enhance fluency in reading and recall of details, improve literary analysis skills, compare/contrast works by a variety of authors, discover favorite authors and genres, share ideas and thoughts, experience the thrills of reading favorites and the discipline of completing books that may not be a favorite, learn about a wide span of cultures, historical settings, subjects, and literary themes, and develop accountability and commitment to a team.

SO HOW EXACTLY DOES IT WORK?

Battle of the Books is a reading and recall competition for students in grades 3 through 5. A list of 18 books is provided and broken down by grade level. Each student must read the books assigned to their grade level before reading novels designated to other grade levels. Teams are formed with students from all three grade levels who then work together and compete.

During practice sessions, teams prepare for questions that may come from any of the books on the list. The goal is that each book has been read by at least one team member. Although students are only required to read two books, reading more makes them a greater asset to their team.

During the competition, teams are presented with comprehension questions from all 18 books. For each correct response, teams must provide the book title and the author's name with accurate pronunciation. Points are awarded for both the book title and author.

There are two main competitions: the in-house battle, where teams compete against each other, and the final round, where the winning teams from different schools face off. This year, TKA hosted the final battle and welcomed teams from Boca Raton Christian School, Berean Christian School, and Rock Solid Christian Academy. After an intense contest, TKA's own team, the "Winning Whales," triumphed in a thrilling double tie-breaker round!

Empowering International Students to Lead and Succeed

he King's Academy excels in expanding its global reach and continues to be one of the most diverse Christian day and boarding programs in the U.S. In the 2024-2025 school year, TKA welcomed 67 international students from 18 nations, including the Bahamas, Bangladesh, Brazil, Canada, China, England, France, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Japan, Kenya, Slovakia, South Korea, Spain, Thailand, Ukraine, and Vietnam.

For many international students, studying abroad is the realization of a lifelong dream. They bravely leave their home countries to embark on an educational experience in a nation far away, both physically and culturally. This experience offers them a unique opportunity to gain a fresh perspective and valuable insights that differ from students who have spent their entire lives in one culture or country.

A central component of TKA's commitment to global engagement is the International Student Leadership Council (ISLC) which provides international students with a unique platform to leverage their worldwide perspectives and experiences. Through the application process, students gain the opportunity to develop leadership skills while contributing to the school community. As members of the ISLC, students take on various responsibilities, including representing the international student body and organizing events that foster active participation within the King's community. These roles play an important part in enriching the school's diversity and creating a more inclusive environment for everyone.

International student leadership also plays a key role in facilitating communication between school leadership and the student body. Through the ISLC, students are kept well-informed about important events and issues on campus. This council gathers feedback on policies and potential programs to present to school leadership for consideration.

Beyond these responsibilities, the ISLC is integral in welcoming new international students to the school community. During orientation, council members help newcomers feel informed, supported, and included, creating an atmosphere of belonging in what can be a challenging new environment. Similar to the Global Ambassador program, ISLC members act as mentors, connecting with one or two new international students before they even arrive in the U.S. This early outreach provides these students with a friendly, familiar face and a peer resource to ease their transition, reduce anxiety, and foster a strong sense of belonging within the TKA community.

King's commitment to embracing diversity and fostering global leadership is evident in every aspect of student life. Through initiatives like ISLC and the international student body, TKA continues to provide a unique and enriching

environment.

At The King's Academy, we believe in putting our faith into action, especially when it comes to serving those in need. As James 2:15-16 reminds us, "Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it?" This teaching

is a powerful reminder that faith must be accompanied by action. Recently, our students had the opportunity to live out this message. Two teams of 50 students traveled to Nicaragua











with Hope Project International to build 16 homes for families, many of whom were single mothers and their children. These new homes, complete with concrete floors, significantly improve living conditions and contribute to a 50% increase in infant survival rates.

This hands-on effort was a meaningful way to show God's love in a practical way, and they saw God move.









Heroic Figures Share their Stories

ebrews 11, often referred to as the "Hall of Faith," is a passage that recounts the stories of several Old Testament figures who trusted in the promises of God and displayed immense boldness and courage in the face of persecution or opposition. These biblical figures inspire us to remain faithful to God and persistent in trusting in His sovereign will. Today, we can also find modern-day examples of individuals who, when faced with unimaginable difficulty or tragedy, have trusted that the Lord would carry them through.

This fall, middle and high school students had the privilege of hearing from two speakers in chapel who embodied this kind of boldness and courage. Their stories were powerful reminders of faith under pressure and perseverance through pain.



RESCUE FROM THE TALIBAN

Students had the chance to hear from Azizullah Aziz, whose dramatic rescue from the Taliban stands as a testimony to both God's protection and the courage of true friendship. For 16 years, Aziz served in the U.S. Special Operations as a combat interpreter and facilitator. He served our country by aiding U.S. military troops in high-profile and stealth operations in Afghanistan and was recognized by the U.S. Congress for his role in the successful evacuation operation of four Navy SEALs. Aziz's story is one of unimaginable danger and steadfast faith.

Growing up in Afghanistan, he never imagined how the Lord would use his life to impact and save so many lives over the course of his military service. He shared a dream he had in his most desperate moment of God using his friends to save him and his family from the extreme persecution they were facing. The next day, his friend and former partner, Chad Robichaux, reached out and told him he was putting a team together to rescue him and his whole family. The Lord used Jeremiah 6:16 to speak a word over Aziz' life and to remind him that if he followed Jesus, he would find rest for his soul, even in the most dangerous, stressful, and pressured moments of life. His story, and the story of friendship that led to his rescue is documented in Chad Robichaux's best-selling book, Saving Aziz: How the Mission to Help One Became a Calling to Rescue Thousands from the Taliban. His life is a testament to how faith and obedience to God's call can lead to extraordinary outcomes, even when faced with the greatest of fears.

BOSTON MARATHON SURVIVOR

Students also had the opportunity to hear from Rebekah Gregory, a woman whose life was forever changed on April 15, 2013, when she was struck by one of the bombs during the Boston Marathon bombing. As a result of the blast, Rebekah underwent 56 surgeries and has lost her left leg. Despite this immense trial, Rebekah has emerged as a symbol of hope and resilience to others when they experience their own darkest moments. Rebekah founded, Rebekah's Angels, a foundation that was started in 2018 and provides mental health counseling for trauma survivors. Rebekah reflects on the journey God has put her on with authenticity, humor, and a joyful spirit. She counts each day as a blessing from God and reminds others to not take the little things for granted.

The stories of Aziz and Rebekah are living testimonies of faith, courage, and trust in God's sovereign plan. Both have faced unimaginable fear and pain yet have chosen to use their lives to point to God's goodness and encourage others to never waver in their trust in Him. Their stories challenge us all

to live boldly in our faith, to trust God even when the path ahead is unclear, and to rely on His grace when faced with adversity.

Spiritual Growth in Middle School

At The King's Academy, we are committed to creating an environment where middle school students can not only excel academically but also grow in their faith. This year, we have taken intentional steps to tailor spiritual life to meet the unique needs of our middle school students, fostering their spiritual journey.

Our middle school chapels have been intentionally designed to engage students with shorter, impactful lessons crafted to meet the unique needs of our students. These middle school chapels focus on practical, age-appropriate truths that students can apply to their daily experiences. To complement the chapel experience, we introduced House Small Groups as part of our House System initiative. These advisorystyle groups offer a space for students to build meaningful relationships with their peers and teachers. Each group is led by a teacher who guides students in devotions, prays with them, and follows up with those who make significant spiritual decisions. This one-on-one discipleship approach strengthens our commitment to guiding students

A major highlight of the fall semester was our grade-level retreats, where students had the opportunity to experience extended times of worship, small group discussions, and powerful messages. These retreats are designed with eternity in mind, providing students a clear presentation of the Gospel. This year, many students responded, with some making first-time professions of faith and others rededicating their lives to Christ. The sense of God's presence during these retreats was unmistakable, leaving a lasting impact on our students and teachers.

Another exciting spiritual life opportunity for students is our choice Bible studies. Group 3:16, led by our Director of Student Ministries, Mr. Josh Bartz, offers a lunchtime meeting space where students hear a devotional message from teachers, high school students and guest speakers. Several student-led Bible studies have additionally flourished during lunch and after school. It is inspiring to see students encourage their peers to grow

in their faith. In February we hosted our first Faith Ignited Conference, a retreat designed for students who desire to deepen their walk with Christ. This retreat included teacher-led panels, in-depth Bible study, worship, and focused prayer, equipping students to be a light for Christ in the community.

We are already seeing the fruits of God's work in our students' lives. Many are stepping out boldly in their faith through baptism, missions, and professions of faith. We are celebrating the goodness of the Lord as we witness God's good work in our students lives. As the Apostle John said in 3 John 1:4 "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth." At TKA, the middle school years are not just about academics or activities, they are about cultivating a lifelong faith that will guide students through every stage of life. As we continue to nurture both the academic and spiritual growth of our students, we are excited to see how they will impact the world for Christ.

tudio 70 proudly concluded the fall semester with the premiere of *Iron* Dusk, TKA's fifth feature-length film, and undoubtedly the highest quality and most ambitious to date. Iron Dusk tells the tale of Aeneas, a goatherder and disgraced knight who journeys across the land to reclaim his honor and earn a woman's hand in marriage. This film represents the culmination of Studio 70's years of work, growth, and accomplishments.

TKA alumna Ziyan Zheng '23, the director of Flamingo Heist, returned to serve as production designer, enhancing the film and immersing the audience into the medieval age with period costuming, sets, and props. Ziyan attends New York University's Tische School of the Arts, the number one film school in the world. The new skills and perspective she has gained in the art of filmmaking were paramount to the success of Iron Dusk.

Producer, Allison Cavanagh and co-producer Ella Garcia '25 secured spectacular locations for the film's setting, most notably Saint Augustine's Castillo de Marcos. Philip King and his camera crew led by Xane Olson '25, Stuart Lewis '24, and Lina Apicella '22 captured beautiful scenes that rival the quality of Hollywood cinema. Trinity Shahriyar '24, organized the production schedule to ensure filming wrapped up on time each day. Trinity studies film at the University of Southern California, tied with NYU for best film school in the country.

Ethan Bender '24 designed virtual locations to supplement for real-world locations on our LED virtual production volume in the Esther B. O'Keeffe Innovation Center. This was the first of Studio 70's major productions to primarily utilize that space as roughly half of the film's scenes were shot in the Digital Media Studio.


Sarah Best, Director of Visual Arts students with a platform to showcase

exciting ways through the intersection of sound and art.


In November, the Visual Arts


