As we move forward, let's continue



The Gold Ribbon Program, modeled after



Thespians Shine Bright in "Pippin: The Musical"


Four Student-Performers Earn Scholarships to NYCDA

With decades of experience in Kansas City's urban education landscape, PREP-KC's CEO and founder needed partnerships to close the "opportunity gap." The organization provides strategic funding, technical assistance, and innovative programs to empower students facing socioeconomic challenges.

HMC-1's partnership with PREP-KC began when Superintendent Dr. Marjorie Williams invited the organization to collaborate, recognizing its track record of boosting high school graduation rates and expanding college and career exploration. Since then,

Honoring a Lifetime of Service



Alvin Brooks, a dedicated Hickman Mills C-1 School Board member, has been named the 2024 honoree of the Paul Morris Community Service Award by the FutureBuilders Foundation. The award, given in recognition of his lifelong commitment to community service, was presented at the Missouri School Board Association's (MSBA) Annual Conference at the Westin Crown Center this fall.

Mr. Brooks brings an unparalleled depth of experience to his role on the HMC-1 School Board, shaped by a career spanning law enforcement, education, and public administration. As a retired Kansas City Police Department officer and educator with the Kansas City Public Schools, Mr. Brooks has devoted his life to advocating for children, ensuring equitable access to education, and fostering safe communities. He previously served on the Hickman Mills School Board and has now returned to continue his advocacy for the district's students.

Among his many contributions, Mr. Brooks is perhaps best known as the AdHoc Group Against Crime (AdHoc) founder, established in 1977 in response to a rise in violent crime within Kansas City's African American community. Under his leadership as director since 1991, AdHoc has taken on critical roles in grassroots efforts to curb crime, reduce substance abuse, and provide vital support to families affected by violence.

Mr. Brooks' impact reaches far beyond Kansas City. Appointed by President George H.W. Bush to the National Drug Advisory Council, he served on this national platform for three years, contributing to drug policy reform and crime prevention efforts. He was elected to Kansas City's council, and later appointed mayor pro-tem in 2003.

A committed advocate for civil rights, Mr. Brooks has held notable positions such as chairperson of the Missouri Human Rights Commission and membership on the Missouri Supreme Court Advisory Committee.

Mr. Brooks impact, built on a foundation of compassion and commitment, inspires the



Hickman Mills community and anyone dedicated to building stronger, safer communities. His legacy reflects a lifetime of meaningful work and solidified his standing as an irreplaceable leader within Hickman Mills and beyond. His award as the 2024 Paul Morris Community Service Award recipient is a testament to the positive and enduring impact he continues to have on the lives of countless individuals.

From Banking to Brewing: HOW ONE ALUM TAPPED INTO HIS ROOTS TO CRAFT A BEER LEGACY

When Steve Holle graduated from Hickman Mills High School in 1976, he had no idea his path would lead from banking and real estate to launching a celebrated craft brewery. Now, as founder of KC Bier Co., Steve has turned his German heritage and love for authentic brewing into a Kansas City institution. With a successful banking and real estate career under his belt, Steve left his mark on both industries before returning to KC to start his brewing legacy.

THE FOUNDATION AT HICKMAN MILLS

Steve credits his Hickman Mills education for laying the groundwork for his diverse career. He says his German language classes exposed him early to a culture that would later shape KC Bier Co. and its authentic German-style beers. Beyond academics, his experiences on the basketball court instilled discipline and a drive for excellence.

"The values I learned in sports – discipline, hard work, and teamwork – are the values that I carry with me to this day," Steve explains.

His English classes, too, prepared him for professional life and, later, a career as an author in the brewing world.

A CAREER BREWED WITH PASSION

After earning degrees in German and business at Northwest
Missouri State, an MBA, and a master's in real estate investment analysis, Steve built a career in banking and then with Northwestern Mutual, where he led their Dallas real estate investment office. But brewing remained a hobby. Over the years, his home-brewing experiments and his passion for German beer grew, sparking the desire to bring authentic German beer culture

to Kansas City. He retired early at 55, returned to his hometown, and launched KC Bier Co., sourcing German ingredients and brewing in the Waldo neighborhood.

The brewery is now one of KC's largest, occupying a 26,000-square-foot facility with a tasting room and spacious beer garden. He shares that KC Bier Co. has a second location in the works: a new site in Olathe with a beer hall, garden, and event space, set to open in 2026. Holle reflects on how the craft beer industry has transformed, with increased competition and booming interest in authentic, high-quality brews - a testament to how KC Bier Co.'s commitment to genuine German-style beer has resonated in

Reflecting on his journey, Steve

encourages current students to pursue their passions and set short-term goals that lead to broader accomplishments.

"I wish I had been more assertive and confident when I was younger," he shares. For him, success came from pursuing his passion and putting himself in a position to build on his strengths.

Today, Steve Holle's legacy is brewing in more ways than one. His journey from Hickman Mills High to KC Bier Co. shows that it's never too late to follow your passion and that an excellent foundation, whether in the classroom, the court, or the community, can make all the difference.
