Foster independence: Allow teens to make ageappropriate decisions and learn from their mistakes.


Teach positive self-talk: Help teens recognize and challenge negative self-talk, replacing it with more balanced thoughts.

As we continue to embrace community-based instruction, it is clear that this approach provides invaluable life lessons that extend far beyond the classroom. By integrating academic learning with real-world experience, CBI empowers students to envision and achieve a future of greater independence and success. Community-based instruction is more than just a teaching method; it's a bridge to a brighter, more inclusive future for all students.







Grand Lodge Americanism Contest
