

## Increase Availability of Advanced Coursework & Appropriate Instruction

- Differentiation Canvas Module provides support to classroom teachers by providing relevant information and samples of differentiation techniques for gifted and advanced learners
- AG PD Series focuses on the characteristics of academically gifted students and highlights best practices for meeting their needs in the classroom

The AG Department goal is that by the end of 2025, there will be:

- Increased access to English I enrollment as an 8<sup>th</sup> grade option
- Provide an advanced course option for middle school Science and Social Studies

- Provides an explanation of the service that is marked on the SER
  - For each grade level, describes the differences between the on-grade level course and the advance course options
  - For advanced courses, serves as the Group Annual Plan for Differentiation because it details the embedded acceleration and extension provided in these courses
- The Progress Report and Report Card serve as documentation of student performance in AG programming

Sixth Grade Math Course Content				
Math 6	Math 6 is the on-grade-level course. It is a rigorous math course that covers 100% of 6th Grade NC Math Standards. For AG math students enrolled in Math 6, through differentiated practices the classroom teacher will ensure that these students have opportunities to participate in the embedded enrichment designed for deeper exploration into the sixth-grade math standards.			
ACC 6	Accelerated 6 is a course that is accelerated by both speed and depth. It is a rigorous math course that covers 100% of 6th Grade NC Math Standards AND 60% of the 7th Grade NC Math Standards.  For enrollment in advanced courses, all math identified AG students should meet the district's placement guidelines for the course.			
AIMM	AIMM is a course that is accelerated by both speed and depth. It is a rigorous math course that covers 100% of 6th Grade NC Math Standards AIMD 60% of the 7th Grade NC Math Standards. The curriculum includes opportunities for enrichment to dig deeper into the standards to meet the needs of each student taking AIMM. For enrollment in advanced courses, all math identified AG students should meet the district's placement guidelines for the course.			

#### **Sixth Grade ELA Course Content**

This course continues the development of word analysis, vocabulary development, reading comprehension, listening, speaking, and study skills. Students will read literary and informational texts from a variety of genres, subjects, authors, and styles with increasing complexity throughout the year. Students will learn the foundations of argument and how to recognize effective arguments by distinguishing claims that are supported by reasons and evidence from claims that are not. Students will analyze a variety of texts by comparing works in terms of their approaches to similar themes or topics. Students will edit their work for sentence formation, usage, mechanics, and spelling. For AG reading students enrolled in ELA 6, when appropriate based on the student's demonstrated performance, the classroom teacher will provide opportunities for the student to experience more complex texts by using the AG support strategies provided within the district's course overviews.

This course addresses grade-level objectives with greater depth using more complex texts. Students are required to use advanced written and oral communication skills while honing higher-level critical-thinking skills. A faster pace allows time for exposure to a greater number and variety of high-level texts and extensions into above grade-level objectives. The district provides Advanced ELA units that are to be used by the classroom teacher when designing instruction for this course. Students who are identified as eligible for AG services in English/Language Arts should be enrolled in the advanced course. However, upon parent request or in review of performance data, these students can be enrolled in the grade level course.

#### At the School Level:

- Classroom Teacher Responsible for the implementation of the standard course of study and using differentiation to address student needs
- Team for Academically Gifted (TAG) A cross-section of school staff who act on behalf of all gifted students in the building
- Curriculum Facilitator Supports all teachers in the building with best instructional practices for all students
- School Counselor Supports students with the development of the social, emotional, and academic skills needed for post-secondary success. Also available to address scheduling questions

- Monitors AG student records and services



## **AG Support**

## At the District Level:

- ❖AG Department Provides support to schools and families with identification and service of AG students in grades 6-8
- \*Guilford Gifted (formerly known as Guilford PAGE) A community group comprised of parents and other stakeholders with an interest in gifted programming throughout the district.





## Middle School Service Model

- The entirety of the academically gifted student's day is spent in a general education setting, therefore, the responsibility for differentiation is with the classroom teacher
  - The middle school AG service model does not include pull-out enrichment services
- Advanced Courses:
  - ELA: Advanced ELA at all grade levels and English 1 available, at grade 8, at select schools.
  - o Math:
    - Grade 6: Accelerated Math, AIMM
    - Grade 7: Accelerated Math, NC Math 1
    - Grade 8: NC Math 1, NC Math 2



#### Differentiation in the Classroom

## Schools are given guidance for grouping AG students in classes.

- 1. Teacher Qualification: AG students will be assigned to a teacher with AIG licensure or who has met minimum LEA requirements.
  - a. AG PD Course
  - b. AG Scholarship
- 2. Clustering Grouping: Students are grouped with similarly achieving peers in the fewest grade level classrooms possible and placed in the appropriate course according to their area of AG identification and district placement criteria.



## **28 Academic All-Star Camp**

- FREE opportunity for high-achieving rising ninth-grade students
- The camp provides students with a unique experience that exposes them to subjectrelated interests, ACT/SAT preparation, an overview of advance placement (AP) opportunities, and leadership skills.

#### **Selection:**

- Eighth-grade students from each middle school are selected to participate based on their 7<sup>th</sup> grade endof-grade scores. Top 10% from each middle school.
- Two hundred (200) seats are available
- Held at two GCS high schools; last year's camps were held at Grimsley and Ragsdale High Schools
- Transportation may be available
- All students who accept the invitation must be able to attend the duration of camp (3 weeks)
- Notification and registration begins late January
