

Staffing

The District has received ten resignations by certificated staff for next year. Based on "intent forms" we expect one additional resignation. We are still evaluating a few of the staffing needs for next year, due to reductions in student population at several sites and the specific program needs at each school. The majority of contracts should have been sent out on February 15th. Falling within the normal timeline for the District's recruiting process the 30-day window of time where teachers may consider the contract offer and either accept or decline a contract for next year has begun. Most of the contracts should be returned by the middle of March, so that the District has a good idea of all vacancies before the primary teacher recruiting fairs

held in April. Typically, the District has had success finding qualified candidates at the Anchorage and Minneapolis Job Fairs. Other efforts including utilizing the Alaska Teacher Placement website and database will continue to be primary recruiting sources.

Superintendent Travel

Superintendent Piazza attended the Building Student Success RTI Conference in Anchorage on January 25th through 27h. Response to Instruction/Intervention (RTI) continues to be emphasized across the state as districts, schools and classrooms work to meet the learning needs of each student under the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act. The conference provided learning opportunities through a variety of sessions to over 1000 Alaskan school district teachers and administrators.

This year's event featured a pre-conference session lead by Lexie Domaradzki to assist with the implementation of RTI in small schools or rural school districts. While the District has worked with Lexie in the past, it was good to see and hear how RTI tools can be further utilized to make a stronger impact on student learning. Through a hybrid approach blending a linear standard protocol and a circular problem-solving plan, students can receive additional intervention instruction to meet their individual needs. Lexie discussed the need to establish non-negotiables including the universal screening for all students, the allocation of core instructional time, the adoption of a common instructional materials that will form a core reading or math program, establishing a common scope and sequence of curricular standards and objectives across the grades levels, and the establishment of whole and small group instruction. The development of a comprehensive assessment system is an important part of the RTI model. This not only includes the benchmarking or universal screening of students in the Fall, Winter, and Spring, but also includes diagnostic testing to determine the specific leaning challenge that a student is encountering and checking on the student's programs as instructional interventions are put in place. provided guidance for managing small groups through skill grouping or ability grouping. Examples for structuring a 90-minute reading block helped to demonstrate how to fit the essential elements of reading (phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension, and vocabulary) together to ensure students receive quality reading instruction. The pre-conference session concluded with a discussion of the need to plan and implement collaboration times for instructional staff to meet in professional learning communities to learn new strategies, discuss student data, and design appropriate instructional intervention groups for students.

The main conference began with a keynote speech by Dr. Deena Paramo the Superintendent of the Mat-Su Borough School District. The speech compared RTI to baseball as she feels that the implementation of response to instruction is similar to a team sport.

Dr. Anita Archer presented a full-day workshop entitled "Response to Instruction and Intervention: Increasing Reading Success for all Students. The session looked at the critical elements of effective reading instruction including each student's ability to build skills for phonemic awareness, decoding, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. Dr. Archer is well know for pointing out the need for explicit instruction and following an "I Say, You Say, We All Say" model.



The conference ended with half-day sessions that allowed participants to learn about two additional aspects of building student success utilizing RTI structures and practices. The session "The Role of District and School Administrators in the Implementation of a Response to Instruction Model" was presented by

Dr. Judy Elliott, the Former Chief Academic Officer for the Los Angeles Unified School District and George Batsche, Ed. D. Director of the Institute for School Reform, Florida Problem-Solving/RtI Project. The workshop helped participants to learn the barriers that threaten buy-in by the majority of staff in a school system. Strategies that were presented to address the barriers included consensus building, infrastructure building, and the ability to produce a return on investment through implementation. The workshop discussed the critical elements that are needed for successful RTI implementation including the use of district-based leadership teams and school-based leadership teams. Coaching and the use of evaluation data are also critical. The roles of district administrators as compared to the role of school principals were discussed. The session detailed the professional development in data-based decision making, coaching and consultation, problem-solving, data collection and management, instruction and intervention development, intervention fidelity, and effective interpersonal skills necessary to successfully implement RTI into the educational system. Finally the workshop looked at starting the action planning process to initiate and sustain a "Process of Systems Change" to implement an RTI model in the classroom and school.

The final half-day session that Dave was able to attend entitled "RTI, Inclusion and Differentiated Instruction: How Does It All Work Together was presented by Dr. Sharon Azar. This session pieced 4 puzzle pieces of Administrative and Leadership Support, Inclusion/Collaborative Planning & Problem Solving, RTI/Inclusion (Co-Teaching) and Differentiated Instruction together to provide access and success for all learners.

Instructional Support

Superintendent Piazza, Director of Instruction Noonkesser, and Technology Specialist Evans were able to attend the Student Council Leadership Retreat in New Stuyahok on Sunday, February 10th – Monday, February 11th. Twenty student leaders in grades 6-12 from Koliganek Manokotak, New Stuyahok, Togiak, and Twin Hills participated in team building activities and bullying recognition and prevention. Students used small "flip" video cameras to create short movies describing different types of bullying, the effects of bullying, and possible solutions to combat the problem.



Legislative Report

The 28th Alaska State Legislature is well into their 90-day session. There are several bills currently in the House and Senate Education Committees that could impact the District:

- •HB 17 STUDENT LOAN PRINCIPAL An Act providing for a reduction of the principal of postsecondary education loans for residents.
- •HB 21 FOUR-DAY SCHOOL WEEK An Act relating to the length of a school week.
- •HB 27 STUDENT COUNT ESTIMATES An Act relating to student counts, unreserved school operating fund balances, restrictions on school district money, and estimates for public school funding.
- •HB 31 CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY CURRICULUM An Act requiring school districts to develop and require completion of a history of American constitutionalism curriculum segment.
- •HB 41 FORWARD FUNDING FOR EDUCATION An Act relating to forward funding of education programs.
- •HB 45 ELECTRONIC BULLYING IN SCHOOLS An Act relating to harassment, intimidation, or bullying by students attending a public school in the state.
- •HB 55 AUTHORIZE FIREARMS FOR SCHOOL PERSONNEL An Act allowing school districts and private schools to adopt a policy authorizing one or more permanent employees to possess one or more firearms on school grounds under certain conditions.
- •HB 85 EXTEND SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICE AGENCY An Act extending the special education service agency.
- •HB 87 EXTEND SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICE AGENCY An Act extending the special education service agency.
- •HB 93 CHARTER SCHOOLS An Act relating to the authorization, monitoring, and operation of charter schools.
- •HB 95 BASE STUDENT ALLOCATION; DISTRICT PLAN An Act requiring school districts to provide a plan for hiring highly qualified teachers; adjusting the base student allocation used in the formula for state funding of public education to account for inflation since fiscal year 2011.
- •HJR 1 CONST. AM: EDUCATION FUNDING Proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State of Alaska relating to state aid for education.
- •SB 6 FUNDING FOR SCHOOL MEALS An Act providing for funding for school lunch and breakfast.
- •SB 15 PREKINDERGARTEN SCHOOL PROGRAMS/PLANS An Act relating to prekindergarten programs within a school district; relating to pre-elementary students and pre-elementary schools.
- •SB 41 SCHOOL SPORTS/INTERSCHOLASTIC ACTIVITIES An Act relating to student participation in interscholastic activities in religious and other private schools

Building Student Success

Director Noonkesser attended the Building Student Success RTI Conference in Anchorage on January 25th through 27th with Superintendent Piazza, Instructional Support Specialist Endicott and several site personnel. The conference was a good one, filled with information related to targeting instruction to student needs. One session the group found particularly relevant was the day of presentations by Dr. Anita Archer, "Response to Instruction and Intervention: Increasing Reading Success for all Students. Her session covered the key elements of learning to read: phonemic awareness, decoding, fluency, comprehension and vocabulary development. Her presentation was impressive enough to explore the possibility of having her present to our staff at fall inservice.

MAP Assessment

The winter MAP testing window closed on Friday February 8th and we are beginning to look at the data generated during the testing window. Initial examination of the K-2 data in reading show promising gains for our students.

Wireless Network Upgrades

As mentioned in previous reports, we are finding issues in our networks caused by the proliferation of personal handheld devices like iPods, smart phones, and iPads. Personal devices are, at times, taking over enough bandwidth that it is difficult for teachers and students to complete necessary tasks including assessments. Last month a request was sent out







for bids on the design and construction of the wireless network in the new Koliganek School building and an upgrade to the wireless network in Togiak School. The reviewing team has evaluated the bids that were submitted and a vendor has been chosen for the projects from the submitted proposals.

Site Visits

Steve Noonkesser and Corey Evans recently completed a site visit to Chief Ivan Blunka School and Koliganek School. During the visits, both Corey and Steve had opportunity to meet with staff and listen to their concerns and successes and Corey was able to perform network testing in an effort to improve the MAP assessment experience of our students. New Stuyahok and Koliganek have a lot to be proud of!



Battle of the Books

We hosted a "Practice Battle" for Battle of the Books for the third and fourth grade teams in our district. We had multiple teams from Dillingham, Unalaska and Aleknagik participate. The students were so excited to have this opportunity and to see their peers via the Video Conferencing equipment all the way in Unalaska!

Aleknagik School will represent Southwest Region Schools with a third/fourth grade team and a fifth/ sixth grade team at the State level this year. Our third and fourth grade team consists of Virginia Andrews, Austin Finkenbinder, Jamal Toyukak, and Ayden Ilutsik. The fifth/sixth grade team consists of Jolynn Bavilla, Tasha Gilila, Treyton Toyukak and Autumn Coolidge. Ryan O'Sullivan coaches both teams. They will be competing the 27th and the 28th of February. I have been asked to be one of the moderators at the State level for the 5/6 grade. competition.

Media Center

We are busy gathering magazine orders from our sites for the Migrant "Literacy in the Home" program. Migrant coordinators will also be assembling their book orders, some have already done so through Scholastic Book Orders and Scholastic Book Fairs.

Soon our RIF coordinators will be putting together RIF orders for next years distributions. Coordinators are responsible for ordering enough books for each student to have three books, which will be chosen at three separate book distributions.

Iditaread!

Teachers are being encouraged to participate in the 2013 "Iditaread" Reading Challenge district wide. Iditaread is set up to happen during the Iditarod, or close to it. Every minute you read is equal to one mile in the race, or 5 minutes for K-2nd grade students.



State & Federal Programs

No Child Left Behind (AK STEPP)

District improvement planning is continuing and focusing on data analysis. The district improvement team is close to completing the data analysis and determining measurable goals for future achievement. I've included just the section that has been updated since January, which is the data analysis domain including indicator 7.1 through 7.10.

Migrant Education

I was able to represent Southwest Region School District at the Alaska Migrant Education Program Service Delivery Plan development committee meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to develop strategies and measurable program objectives related to the identified needs of migrant students. The committee consisted of representatives from various districts, parents, and migrant staff. A draft of the service delivery plan will be written as a result of the meeting.

Title VII Indian Education

Part one of the Title VII Indian Education formula grant has been completed and submitted. This part of the grant process is getting a student count of all the eligible Alaska Native/American Indian students in the district for which funding is based. There was a 4% drop (25 students) in the number of Alaska Native/American Indian students in the district that is comparable to the overall decrease in students seen throughout the district.

Career & Technical Ed. (Industrial Arts)

The industrial arts programs at Togiak, New Stuyahok, and Koliganek will be receiving GV190 Honda small engines as part of a donation program through American Honda Company. The engines are free; we just pay the shipping and handling. Carl Perkins funding is being used to get the engines to each site. Deb Endicott brought the program to the attention of the district and helped jump-start the process.

Site Visit

I was invited to attend the January CSC meetings in Togiak in order to share information and answer questions relating to the various federal and state grants, including Impact Aide and Indian Education, as well as, student achievement data (Togiak and district report to the public). The CSC is very involved in building relationships between various community organizations and the school through communication and sharing resources in developing projects.

Migrant Education

In order to meet new federal requirements, the state Migrant Education Office required SWRS to submit course grades for all Migrant Education students for the first time. To accomplish this, the format of the report that the state requires was analyzed and a PowerSchool query that returns most of the information needed was created. Unfortunately, not all of the information necessary for the report is available in PowerSchool, so handentry of data for students that had transferred and some course-related information was necessary. Kyle is continuing to look for ways to automate more of this process.

PowerSchool

With the end of the first semester, grades were stored in PowerSchool so students would receive course credit. As is normal during the start of a new semester, several changes to course offerings were made, and a significant amount of time also went into ensuring that all students had a full class schedule for the second semester.

During the January Leadership Meeting Kyle presented on several PowerSchool related topics. He showed principals how to use the administrative features of the teacher grade-books, showcased the new transcript format that went into effect this semester, participated in a discussion about grading practices and GPA, and led a discussion on how semester grades were calculated. As a result of that discussion, a how-to document was sent to all middle and high school teachers to help them properly configure their grade-books.

School Climate & Connectedness Survey

Students and staff across the district took the School Climate and Connectedness survey in mid-January. We had a high participation rate with approximately 80% of staff and 76% of students taking the survey. As of this writing preliminary results were not yet available, but they are anticipated to arrive soon.

Alaska Performance Scholarship

Alaska Performance Scholarship eligibility is one of the tasks that Kyle has been working on during the past month. As part of that, he has been working to create a report that will use data in PowerSchool to provide a list of students that meet the eligibility requirements for the scholarship. The report currently generates a list of students that meet the GPA, WorkKeys and ACT/SAT requirements. Determining whether students meet the curriculum requirements is more difficult to automate and is still being worked on.


Alaska STEPP

AK STEPP meetings at the District Office have resulted in several projects for Kyle. Over the past month, he has drafted letters to be sent to parents of students who are: in danger of failing a course after the first quarter of a semester, have failed a semester course and therefore will not receive credit, and have not passed one or more sections of the HSGQE. As part of this drafting process, Kyle has been analyzing data and found some important trends:

- 66% of Southwest students who do not graduate with a high school diploma in 4 years never receive earn a Southwest diploma.
- Based upon data extrapolated from first semester, 32% of Southwest students are on track to be chronically absent this school year (absent 10% or more of the school year). This compares to an estimated national average of 14-15% of students being chronically absent.
- 16.8% of the student body is on track to miss 30 or more days of school this year, another 10.7% will miss between 20 and 30 days.

Research has shown that:

- There can be a 50% (or more) difference in the graduation rates of students who miss 0 to 5 days of school and students who miss 15 or more days a year.
- The reason a student misses school has no impact on the effect of being absent. Excused and unexcused absences are equally harmful.
- Students that are chronically absent in kindergarten and first grade scored 60 points below good attenders on California's third grade reading test and 100 points below on the third grade math test. (Scores range from 150-600, 350 marks the proficient level.)





Counseling & Assessment Specialist: Steve Ito

WorkKeys National Career Readiness Certificates for grade 11 & 12 students that completed the WorkKeys test have been received and disbursed. Electronic reports with both reportable and state allowable scores will be available through EED the end of February to upload to Powerschool. The WorkKeys assessment targets the workplace "foundational" skills that are needed for virtually all occupations and at any level of education.

Alternate Assessment testing are being completed for students with significant cognitive disabilities. The Alternate Assessment satisfies the requirement for all students in grades 3-10 to participate in statewide assessments. The Alternate Assessment is a non diploma track test, based on Alaska standards but measured against alternate achievement goals.

EED mandated World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA) ACCESS Test for the spring 2013 Limited English Proficiency testing cycle has begun. Coordination of training at all sites is currently taking place. Testing will be district-wide February through March. Identified teachers will complete webbased proficiency training in order to be qualified assessor/proctors for the February administration of the WIDA Access Test to identified Limited English Proficient grade level students. The WIDA Access test is family of tests are comprehensive standardized tests that assess listening, speaking, reading and writing.

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) administration is currently taking place at selected sites within Southwest Region School District. The NAEP is also known as the "Nations Report Card" and is the only nationally representative and continuing assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Since 1969, assessments have been conducted periodically in reading, mathematics, science, writing, U.S. history, civics, geography, and the arts.

In the winter of 2013 (from January 28-March 8, 2013), schools will take part in grade 4 and grade 8 NAEP reading and mathematics assessments. The NAEP in grade 4 and grade 8 reading and mathematics is given every other year; the 2013 administration will be the sixth administration of NAEP in Alaska since 2003.



Business Office Lee Ann Andrew, Director

We received the FY13 Preliminary Foundation funding based on the OASIS count. (included in board packet)There is an increase in the expected funding for this year. The increase is reflected in the budget revision this month. The revision also has updated numbers for health insurance and salaries. We have around \$329,000 of revenue for FY13 that is not currently allocated for anything in particular.

I am planning on going in for the Koliganek School bid opening on February 21. This is a part of the process I have not seen yet. I am sure it will be a learning experience.

The district received five proposals for a health consultant. The proposals are currently being reviewed. Hopefully a decision will be made soon and I can meet with the new firm when I am in Anchorage for the bid opening. The proposals are very comprehensive and any choice we make looks like they have the resources to research health insurance thoroughly and offer us a good package.

We are still on hold with the FY14 budget to see if any more Impact Aid funding is allocated. Without another allocation we will have to make adjustments to the currently proposed budget.

Sites are preparing their orders for supplies for next fiscal year. We plan to have everything ordered and received at sites before people leave for the summer.

We have found some vendors that can supply the district with Alaskan, grown, harvested or produced foods so that we can utilize the \$38,556 that the state awarded us this year. Some of the items available to us this year are fish burritos, pollock breaded with sweet potatoes and breaded pollock patties. If this program continues next year there may be other options because Alaska vendors will be able to prepare to supply to school districts.



Special Education Robin Gray, Director

During the month of February I went to the State of Alaska Response to Instruction/Intervention Conference in Anchorage. Training on providing intervention and instruction appropriate to the needs of the students occurred. Presenters from inside and out of the state brought research, programs, and resources for all who attended. Different districts presented their own intervention processes. What was exception about the opportunity was to have access to a variety of resources and then networking with professionals and districts in various stages of Response to Instruction, RTI.

The State of Alaska Special Education Conference occurred this month and most of the special education staff went to Anchorage. Presentations in the areas of assistive technology, autism, transition data tracking systems, SEAS, and new special education teacher training, are just a few of the sessions.

We have made this the year to make a concentrated effort to work on the special education transition process. With the different training that has occurred in Dillingham, and the conference, the quality of our IEPs and services to our students have improved. Everyone in the department feels good about the direction we are going.

Transition planning for students from their freshman year through their senior year will occur and the list of agencies, outside resources, post secondary training, and working with students and families are becoming more defined.

Total Physical Response Storytelling

The K-2nd Yup'ik Studies Curriculum Committee traveled into Anchorage (January 31st – Feb 3rd) to be introduced to a method of second language instruction known as Total Physical Response Storytelling. They first observed TPRS in action in Ms. Martina Bex's (teaches Spanish) classroom at the Clark Middle School. It was fascinating to watch the method in action and to take note of the classroom highlighting words in the language of instruction. This followed with a session with Ms. Martina Bex and Ms. Michele Whaley (teaches Russian) where the committee was totally immersed into this method using Russian as the language of instruction. The instruction involved lots of talk, lots of motion, visuals and acting out the different motions. The presentation was based on a Yup'ik oral story that was translated into the Russian language. This followed with the committee developing a lesson unit on a Yup'ik oral story that is known throughout our district. Each of the members participated in presenting using this method of instruction and being coached by Martina and Michele. The committee members will take this lesson and present this lesson in their respective communities with the students that they work with. This will be followed with sessions over the DLS and then coming into to work on the development of the K-2nd Yup'ik Studies Curriculum. We are looking at piloting-testing this curriculum at all the sites in the Fall of 2013 following intensive training.

Professional Development

The professional educators at Koliganek School are involved in several activities that provide for professional growth throughout the year. For starters, Koliganek School is utilizing Charlotte Danielson's Framework for Teaching as a tool to reflect on "effective" teaching practices. Educators spend time during weekly Collaborative Meetings on Tuesdays to focus on specific domains and elements of Danielson's framework. Educators reviewed Domain 2- The Classroom Environment. and especially elements 2c. Managing Classroom Procedures and 2d. Managing Student Behavior. The current focus for educators at Koliganek School is Domain 3-Instruction and specifically element 3b. Using Questioning and Discussion Techniques. The instructional leader facilitates the discussions at the Collaborative Meetings and provides educators with opportunities to review the "effective" and "proficient" aspects of the various elements as outlined in Danielson's books that all educators utilize. Educators are also given specific examples of effective Kagan Cooperative Learning Strategies that they can use in their classrooms to improve specific elements of their questioning strategies.

Peer Observations

Professional educators at Koliganek School have been trained to conduct peer observations using Measured Progress's lenses. Educators invite one of their peers into their classroom to collect data on a specific aspect of their teaching. Peer observations are a three-step process that include a Planning Conversation, Classroom Data Collection, and a Reflecting Conversation. Peer observations are a tool that Koliganek School utilized last year and will continue to utilize this year.

Student Activities

Koliganek girls and boys basketball teams have been traveling around the area. They played in Dillingham, New Stuyahok, Koliganek, and will be playing games the rest of the season in Naknek and Newhalen.
