

New HCS and AAST Cell Phone Policy



On January 22, the Horry County Schools Personal Electronic Device Policy went into effect. Please find the policy linked <u>here.</u> As a result, our school's Personal Electronic Device Policy will be changed as well.

As of January 22, students are required to power off and put away cell phones and electronic devices as they enter the school building. Students are not able to utilize cell phones or personal electronic devices while they are in the building, or from 8:10 through 3:15 p.m. Students are not able to use cell phones or personal electronic devices during lunches, which is a change from our previous policy.

The consequences for violating the AAST personal electronic device policy have been changed to align with the HCSD Personal Electronic Device Policy. Consequences for violating the personal electronic device policy have been updated in the AAST STudent Handbook effective January 22, 2025. Please see the updated consequences below. All violations of this policy will result in confiscation of the device. Cell phones or personal electronic devices that are confiscated will be stored in a secure location until the parent/guardian is able to retrieve it. A parent/guardian must pick up the cell phone or personal electronic device from an AAST administrator.

Disciplinary consequences:

1st violation: Warning2nd violation: 1 day ISS

• 3rd violation: 2 days ISS

• 4th violation: 1 day OSS

• **5th violation:** 3 days OSS

• 6th violation: 5 days OSS

• 7th violation: Evidentiary hearing

If a student refuses to give up their cell phone or electronic device, the student will receive a referral for Refusal to Obey and the following consequences will apply:

• 1st violation: 1 day OSS

2nd violation: 1- 3 days OSS3rd violation: 3 - 5 days OSS

4th violation: Evidentiary hearing







Confidence Intervals

Edible Integumentary System Models














In Ms. Cornelison and Ms. Fletcher's Health Science 3 classes, students are learning about the integumentary system by completing a lab on the edible skin model.

EMS III students attended an internship orientation with Conway Medical Center this week. Students will complete a 40 hour internship in the Emergency Department and Critical Care during the semester.










EMS I students have been busy learning airway management skills this week. Students learned multiple real work techniques to assist patients in respiratory compromise.
