On March 7, the Covington High School Concert Band performed at OMEA District Large Group Contest at Versailles High School. The band earned STRAIGHT "superior" ratings - one of only three bands in our area to do so. For this concert the band performed three pieces: Blue Sky Horizon by Randall Standridge, Bunker Hill by Karl L. King (arranged by James Swearingen), and Apex Predator by Michael Oare.

Blue Sky Horizon is a hopeful and reflective piece, Bunker Hill a lively march, and Apex Predator a mysterious and frightening fight for survival. The group was evaluated on tone, technique, and interpretation. The band also participated in a sight reading portion of the contest where they were presented with a new piece of music and performed it shortly after.

The ratings received last Friday qualify the Concert Band to move to OMEA State Large Group Contest on April 25th. When moving on to state, the band is required to change one of their pieces, so students have a few short weeks to learn a whole new piece as well as refine details on the other two that are still being performed on the program.

Middle School Students Superior in Science Fair Events



Covington Middle School science students presented their projects during the Covington Science Day on Wednesday, January 29th. 44 projects were judged by volunteers from Wright Patterson Air Force Base with 13 of those projects receiving a Superior rating. Lucy Foutz and Claira Boothe were awarded "Best in Show" and each received a Chick-fil-A gift card for their project that compared the differences between two brands of softballs. Each group that earned a Superior Rating was invited to compete at the county science day.

Nine student groups from Covington Middle School attended the Miami County Science Day competition on Thursday, February 13th at Tippecanoe High School with four groups earning another Superior Rating qualifying them for the regional science fair! Tessa Lyons and Natalie Parke's project about calf nutrition and weight gain received two additional awards on top of their superior rating - Cargill's "Animal Science" Award worth \$50 each and Abbott Nutrition's "One Team, One Voice, One Goal" Award that included a scientific kit and honorary medallion. Other student groups who also earned a "Superior": Alva Hess & Brayden Lasater, Lucy Foutz & Claira Boothe, and Bri Pfoutz.

Last weekend, eighth grade Bri Pfoutz brought her engineering design project to Edison Community College for the regional Upper Miami Valley Science Days event. There she proudly represented herself as a Buccaneer, earning an Excellent rating. Way to go, Bri!





Middle School Winter Highlights

Middle School students have been busy since we returned from winter break. MAP testing showed the continued growth of our students thus far this year in math, science, and reading. We celebrated the end of the 2nd quarter with Kona Ice and Crew Day. Students wore their "Crew" shirts and participated in a kickball tournament with the Green team besting the Staff after a hard fought final game. The highly anticipated PrideBuccs drawings for basketballs, volleyballs, candy, and art supplies occurred with students turning in their tickets from the past nine weeks to be entered into the drawing.

Covington Science Day was a huge success with forty-four projects from seventy-seven students being presented. Of those projects, thirteen received a "Superior" rating and an invite to compete at Miami County. Nine groups continued on to the county competition with four of them earning another "Superior" rating. One group event went on to compete at the Regional event last weekend at Edison.

Our Scholarship Club hosted their annual induction of 21 new members who have shown great academic excellence while in seventh or eighth grade.

Our winter sports teams' seasons have wrapped up with the TRC tournaments in girls & boys basketball and wrestling. Spring sports practices are now starting! Looking ahead towards the end of the school year, our students are excited about upcoming field trips and events such as the 8th grade Washington DC Trip in May and the MS Dance Party in April.

Winter Athletics Recap By Ashley Naff, Athletic Director

The student-athletes in the winter programs have had an outstanding winter season! The varsity boys' basketball team finished their season with a 6-17 overall record. Brogen Angle earned Second Team All-Conference honors and District 9 Coaches Team honors, and Tanner Palsgrove and Brant Angle earned Honorable Mention All-Conference. Brogen Angle was also chosen to play in the District 9 Senior All-Star game.

The varsity girls' basketball team finished their team as Three Rivers Conference Champions with a 21-3 overall record and a perfect 14-0 conference record. The Lady Buccs had five players receiving All-Conference honors this season. Maggie Anderson was named TRC Girls' Basketball Player of the Year, Avery Koffer earned First Team All-Conference honors, Gabrielle Hartwig earned Second Team All-Conference honors, and Delaney Murphy and Emalyn Johnson earned Honorable Mention All-Conference honors. Maggie Anderson was also named to the District 9 Coach Team, the District 9 Senior All-Star game, and First Team All-Southwest District. Gabrielle Hartwig is also playing in the District 9 Senior All -Star game, and Avery Koffer was named Honorable Mention All-Southwest District.

Maggie Anderson scored her 1,000th point this season, and she finished her career with 1,330 points. Maggie also set the school record for Career Free Throw Percentage. As a team, the Lady Buccs set the following school records: Fewest Points Allowed in a Game, Consecutive Wins in a Season, and Lowest Defensive Average.

The wrestling team finished in 2nd place in the Three Rivers Conference. Brody Taylor, Isaiah Mumford, Caleb Ryman, Aveyen Meek, and Trenton Havenar were individual conference champions in their respective weight classes, earning First Team All-Conference honors.

Caleb Ryman was also voted TRC Co-Wrestler of the Year. The Buccaneers had five wrestlers advance to the District Tournament, and Caleb Ryman and Trenton Havenar qualified for the OHSAA State Tournament the weekend of March 7th -9th , with Brody Taylor qualifying as an alternate.

The competition cheerleaders finished 3rd at the State Competition in Traditional Cheer and 9th in Hip Hop. Brock Gessner also qualified for the OHSAA State Swimming meet in the 100 Butterfly and 100 Backstroke, and he finished 15th in the 100 Butterfly. We also had three student- athletes qualify for the State Indoor Track Meet – Preston King, Day'Lynn Garrett, and Elyza Long.

While these assessments are one measure of student progress and help teachers plan instruction, we also value the many other ways students demonstrate their earning. We encourage students to take the tests seriously and do their best.

On testing days for grades 7-12, there will be a two-hour delay. However, students who are testing should arrive at the regular time (8:10 am). Students not testing may arrive two hours later. Grade 6 will follow the regular daily schedule on all testing days.
