I have reservations about both StudySync and myPerspectives because they both appear to be set up almost as additional LMS. I am concerned that they will become "one more system" for students and parents to struggle with (as well as teachers). I know myPerspectives says it can integrate with an existing LMS, but I'd want an in-depth tutorial before deciding if that would negate these issues. Additionally, I am concerned about StudySync because the materials all appeared to be in the form of a sales pitch. I wasn't able to get a sense of the actual curriculum. While myPerspectives gave me a better sense of the curriculum, I was incredibly disappointed to see some of the texts selected. It felt like a return to the old canon, which lacks diversity, modernity, and authenticity. The classes have a place, of course, but the reading lists felt unbalanced. I was especially displeased to see British Literature as a huge focus for 12th grade. It felt far too Euro-centric to reflect my students' experiences.

Some questions concerns: Whichever curriculum we end up with, will we have access to both hardcopy and digital curricular materials? Our options appear to be primarily (if not only) digitally based. I worry about being reliant on screens for teaching and learning. I am concerned about the accessibility of a digital curriculum (student will access at home) and physical health impacts on both students and teachers, like eye strain and musculoskeletal disorders, that develop from extensive use of screens. Also, in addition to this curriculum, will we still have access to tangible books for book clubs and classroom libraries?
