Chicken.


Would you rather live in a city or at a beach?

It's now the off season in the NFL, and teams are making moves to benefit them the most. Our Pittsburgh Steelers are one of the more weaker teams that need to change things around, and they are. With two round-one exits in the past two seasons, the Steelers need to look for a real playoff push in the fall.

The biggest move so far was getting rid of our strong backup quarterback, Justin Fields. Traded to the New York Jets, he's now paired up with his college teammate Garrett Wilson. It was nice having Fields on the team, he was a great backup and helped the team out in tough situations, but unfortunately his contract was too expensive, so he was let go. Star wide receiver from the Seattle Seahawks recently signed a 4-year, \$132 million contract with Pittsburgh. Many say this may be the deadliest receiver duo, as both are known to get into scuffles with defenders.

Other moves on offense include trading our main runningback Najee Harris to the Los Angeles Chargers. Despite his strong performances
