### LEARN TO EARN DAYTON EXPANDS CAREER PATHWAY WORK TO 8 ADDITIONAL DISTRICTS

Learn to Earn Dayton has received a \$1 million grant from The BlackRock Foundation to expand its Pathways for Accelerated College and Career Experience (PACCE) program. This work was initially funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation which allowed Kettering to begin this work. 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


## Local Partner Ready to Collaborate with Educators on Project Based Learning!

The 2025 State of the Future U.S. Workforce Report reveals a significant mismatch between students' natural talents and current job market demands. Despite possessing aptitudes suited for sectors like healthcare, technology, and manufacturing, many students lack exposure to these fields, leading to unfilled positions. The report supports the work that we are doing which leads to enhanced career exploration and early engagement to better prepare students for highdemand careers and to build sustainable talent pipelines. # **HIGHLIGHTS ACROSS THE DISTRICT**

Check out some of the amazing ways that teachers and administrators are integrating career awareness, exposure, and exploration into their lessons!

Dr. Jessica Dennison, Library Media Teacher at Fairmont High School, hosted nearly 80 first graders from Oakview Elementary exploring Holiday Celebrations around the world. The library was transformed into stations that 1st graders visited to celebrate their learning. Stations included a google translator station where they learned how to say happy holidays in different languages, holidays around the world using AI storytelling, and a station with cultural dance and music.





Cambrie Borchers, 4th grade teacher at Orchard Park Elementary noticed that many of her students have an interest in graphic design so she started an after school club to help peak their curiosity and exposure. Cambrie connected with Trisha Lamb, a local graphic designer and Kettering resident, who came in and spoke to the students at Orchard Park about her work.

Emma Teeter, long term English sub at Fairmont High School, and Randy Swain, Special Education Coordinator, recently partnered with Junior Achievement to implement their Inspire to Hire curriculum for Emma's RR English 12 class. Following the lessons, students traveled to the Dayton Convention Center for a field trip where they had the opportunity to meet with future employers. Students took resumes and were able to apply many of the work-ready skills that they learned through the Inspire to Hire curriculum leading up to the event.
