# MINUTES ASHE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION September 9, 2019

The meeting was held as scheduled with all members present. Chairman Jones called the meeting to order, welcomed those in attendance and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

After reviewing the amended agenda, the agenda was approved by general consensus of the Board.

During open comments, Rebecca Williams from the Arts Council announced that in July 2010, the House of Representatives passed a resolution designating the second week of September as *Arts in Education* Week. This week, September 9-13, is designated to promote and showcase the immense role arts education has in producing engaged and successful college and career-ready students. The resolution states in part, "Arts education, comprising a rich array of disciplines including dance, theatre, music, media arts, literature, design and visual arts, are essential elements in a complete and balanced education for all students." Mrs. Williams then acknowledged all the art teachers in the school system.

# FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT Proclamation of September as Attendance Awareness Month

WHEREAS regular attendance is essential to grade-level reading, academic achievement and graduation,

- **WHEREAS** early chronic absence missing 10 percent or more of school days for any reason including excused and unexcused absences, or just two or three days a month is associated with lower academic achievement, truancy in middle school, and school dropout,
- **WHEREAS** regular attendance puts children on track for becoming proficient readers by the end of third grade, decreases their likelihood of being retained, and supports the development of social-emotional skills needed to persist in school,
- **WHEREAS** all students even those who attend regularly are affected by chronic absence because teachers must spend time reviewing for students who missed lessons,
- **WHEREAS** chronic absence is an early warning indicator that can reveal that a student needs help long before test scores or grades do,

- WHEREAS chronic absence exacerbates the achievement gap between students in low-income communities, many of whom are students of color, and their peers. Students from low-income communities are more likely face systemic barriers to getting to school and more likely to be impacted academically by missing school,
- **WHEREAS** attendance is actionable and districts across the country are increasing attendance by recognizing good and improved attendance, engaging students and families, monitoring attendance data and practice, providing personalized early outreach as needed, and developing systemic responses to attendance barriers,
- WHEREAS attendance is now a required reporting metric under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act and an area of focus for both the Campaign for Grade-Level Reading and the North Carolina Pathways to Grade-Level Reading Initiative,
- **WHEREAS** improving attendance takes commitment, collaboration and tailored approaches to the challenges and strengths in each community,
- **WHEREAS** regular attendance can be significantly increased when schools, families and communities work together to monitor and promote regular attendance and address barriers that keep children from getting to school,
- **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that Ashe County Schools will stand with the nation in recognizing September as "Attendance Awareness Month." We hereby commit to focusing on reducing chronic absenteeism to give all children an equitable opportunity to learn, grow and thrive academically, emotional and socially.

An update on the Communities in Schools (CIS) program in Northwest North Carolina was heard by the Board. The Middle School Site Coordinator Fawn Roark and Executive Director Glendora Yarbrough talked about the impact the program has made on middle school students in recent years. Ms. Roark reported that the program touched 475 students last year. The CIS focus is on student attendance, behavior and academics, and as Site Coordinator, she has made 8,397 student contacts. Tutoring mentors provided over 4,000 minutes in services last year. The program is viewed as a success at the middle school, and efforts are underway to secure additional funding to implement the program in more schools.

Curriculum Director Julie Taylor updated the Board on the 2019/20 Curriculum Initiatives and programs for Ashe County Schools. Many of the initiatives are a continuation from the prior three years, with an emphasis on writing and math in 2019/20. Vice Chairman Beckworth had questions regarding the iStation program mandated by the State in grades K-3 and the class sizes at the high school. Results surrounding iStation is on a wait and see basis, and the class sizes in English II (from 19-25) are a result of the scheduling process.

Endowment Liaison Marcia Elledge reported that the 18th Annual Golf Tournament netted \$10,370.

Transportation Director Shea Coldiron gave an update on the changes put in place at the beginning of the year to help shorten bus ride times for students, highlighting the details of each. Mrs. Eldreth stated that the ride times are still not acceptable. Mr. Coldiron reported that the cost of adding one bus with an

average route of 75 miles would cost \$38,800.35 and that the impact on current drivers in adding a bus would be loss in time and possibly benefits. Mr. Coldiron did report that some of the changes put in place at the beginning of the year will not work in inclement weather. Mr. McClure requested that Mr. Coldiron continue exploring ways to shorten ride times.

Athletic Director David Koontz and Principal Amanda Hipp gave an update on the policy for home-schooled students participating in high school athletics. Mr. Koontz has contacted athletic directors in our region and conference—most are following the policy drafted by the NC High School Athletic Association and making changes on an "as need" basis. Homeschoolers must register for two classes, sign an intent form and follow the high school's enrollment and attendance procedures in order to participate in sports. There has not been much interest at this point. Administrators plan to wait and see what happens this year before finalizing a policy for Ashe County Schools.

The Board Chairman asked the Superintendent to investigate the feasibility of having a policy on remote participation in Board meetings. The Superintendent found Policy 2302 from another LEA pertaining to this issue. Technology Director Amy Walker felt that remote access was feasible from a technology standpoint. The Board will continue to research.

The Superintendent reported that House Bill 362 was signed into law in July 2019 keeping the 15-point school performance grading scale rather than transitioning to the proposed 10-point grading scale. School achievement will continue to count for 80 percent and school growth for 20 percent of the total sum. Changes in the Math EOC, EOG and Extend 1 Achievement levels became effective in August 2019—Federal levels are now Level 5, Level 4, Level 3 and Not Proficient—State levels are Level 4, Level 3 and Not Proficient.

The Superintendent and Technology Director Amy Walker discussed the need for implementing a confidentiality agreement between parties who use student data and the Ashe County Board of Education to protect the confidentiality of students. The Board instructed the parties to move forward in developing an agreement.

The Superintendent gave an update on the School Start and End Dates Report as required by Senate Bill 343 and approved by the State Board of Education. School calendar legislation outlines the parameters surrounding school start and end times, including those districts who have a waiver for an earlier start time due to inclement weather. Because there is no definition of a "year-round school," several districts have adopted calendars that begin prior to the calendar mandate. After reviewing the LEAs' submissions of school start and end dates, the Department of Public Instruction found that 13 LEAs did not have the statutory authority to start earlier than the date set in law. Ashe County is one of the 13 LEAs due to the fact that the school calendar was aligned with the start of the community college. Ashe County Schools began school for students on Thursday, August 15, rather than Monday, August 19, as approved in the waiver. The State Board of Education sent the report to the State Legislature for review.

The Superintendent offered comments on the following.

- Extended kudos to Ashe County High administration, teachers and staff and local law enforcement regarding the August 29, 2019 incident—formation of special committee to reflect on incident
- Numbers for each Open House at beginning of year were phenomenal
- Testing and Accountability—math scores have been distributed to students—school report card grades/school performance still embargoed—press release for the 2018/19 scores will be soon
