Spotlight on Women Activists: Malala Yousafzai

This month, we proudly honor **Malala Yousafzai**, a symbol of courage and resilience in the fight for girls' education. Born in Mingora, Pakistan, Malala's passion for learning was evident from a young age. When the Taliban took control of her hometown, they banned girls from attending school. Unwilling to accept this injustice, Malala began speaking out publicly, advocating for girls' right to education.

In 2009, at just 11 years old, Malala wrote an anonymous diary for the BBC, detailing life under the Taliban and the challenges faced by young girls yearning to learn. Her voice resonated globally, but this activism made her a target. In 2012, Malala survived a brutal assassination attempt by the Taliban, an attack meant to silence her advocacy. Instead, it amplified her voice worldwide.

After her recovery, Malala co-founded the **Malala Fund** to champion education for girls globally. The fund supports local educators and advocates policy changes to ensure every girl has access to 12 years of free, safe, and quality education. Her relentless dedication earned her the **Nobel Peace Prize** in 2014, making her the youngest laureate in history at just 17.

"One child, one teacher, one book, one pen can change the world." – Malala Yousafzai

Today, Malala continues to inspire millions as a human rights advocate and author. Her story is a powerful reminder that no voice is too small to make a difference. Let her legacy inspire us to support education and equality in our own community.



Women have been making significant strides in the construction industry, a field traditionally dominated by men. As of 2023, women constitute approximately 10.8% of the construction workforce in the United States. This marks a notable increase over the past decade, with about 1.3 million women employed in various construction roles in 2022, reflecting a 53% rise during that period. Organizations like the National Association of Women in Construction (NAWIC), established in 1953, have been instrumental in supporting and empowering women in the industry. NAWIC offers networking opportunities, professional education, and mentorship programs to help women advance in their construction careers. The increasing presence of women in construction not only enriches the industry with diverse perspectives but also helps address labor shortages by tapping into a broader talent pool. As the sector continues to evolve, the contributions of women are proving essential in building a more inclusive and robust construction workforce.

Child Find

Child Find, a component of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), enables states to locate, identify, and evaluate all children with disabilities, aged birth through 21, who need early intervention or special education services. Special education services are available for children of any age (birth through 21 years). Wilson School District is responsible for locating, identifying, evaluating, and serving all children with disabilities (ages 3-21) and referring children ages 0-3 to AzEIP for evaluation and appropriate services. AzEIP is the Arizona Early Intervention Program for infants and toddlers. Wilson provides free and appropriate public education that includes special education and related services to children at public expense, under public supervision and direction without charge to parents. For all school-age students who are new to the district, the classroom teacher will complete screening activities within 45 days of enrollment. If any concerns are noted, the child will be referred for help. Parents who have concerns regarding their child's education may contact the Special Education Department at Wilson, (602) 683-2400, ext. 8500.

McKinney-Vento

Are you currently experiencing temporary living arrangements due to eviction, job loss or a traumatic event? Wilson School District offers services to families through the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act. Services such as enrollment and immunization assistance, uniforms or school supplies, community referrals and in some cases, transportation can be available. Your family may qualify due to living with another family or friend due to financial hardship or living in a shelter,

transitional housing, or motel. Please contact your school office or Josue Parra at 602-683-2515, ext. 6008 for more information about this program.
