238 Deported to El Salvador

On Sunday, March 16, the Trump administration defied a court order from a federal judge and deported 238 alleged members of the Venezuelan gang Tren de Aragua to El Salvador. After a meeting with Secretary of State Marco

Rubio, El Salvador
President
Nayib Bukele agreed to jail members of this group in his country's Terrorism



Confinement Center, or CECOT, one of the most notoriously brutal and overcrowded prisons in the world.

None of these 238 people has been tried for any crime in either the US or El Salvador. The Trump administration instead invoked the 1798 Alien Enemies Act, which allows the US government to deport noncitizens without a hearing and based only on citizenship. However, this law only grants this power during wartime, so James Boasberg, a federal judge in Washington, D.C., gave an order on Saturday night that any deportation flights be turned around and the alleged gang members returned to the US for the next 14 days so that they could have a fair trial. The Trump administration did

not heed this order on the grounds that it was given verbally, not in written form, and therefore was not enforceable.

Currently, there is no plan to bring 238 deportees back to America, and the Trump administration has submitted a motion to remove Boasberg from the case. However, deportations have been paused in the meantime.

Tornado Outbreak Through Central US

On Saturday, March 15th, 2025 the strongest and worst storm of this year so far went through many of the Midwest and South parts of the United States. These storms started Friday night and went through Saturday morning. There have been many tornadoes and tornado warnings that have gone through many towns and places in the United States. The amount of damage was still not known on Saturday morning. The National Weather Service furiously sent out many tornado warnings and the radar was lit up a lot to let people know there were severe thunderstorms from Wisconsin to Mississippi.

Approximately three people have been killed and many hurricane-force gusts of wind that created blinding dust storms happened. Many meteorologists were looking at the damage on Saturday. The National Weather Service said

"The storm will gain new strength and take aim at the Southeast with the highest risk of deadly tornadoes and severe



thunderstorms. These severe thunderstorms became more intense through Friday night in the Midwest and possibly could hit more than 900 miles throughout the region, from Louisiana to Minnestota.

Powerful winds were sweeping across central parts of the United States on Friday, the wind gusts got up to approximately 90 mph in New Mexico and the Plains which got as strong as a category 1 hurricane. "In Texas, approximately 3 people got killed on Friday by vehicle collisions caused by heavy winds and dust storms which reduced visibility", according to local authorities. The NWS in Amarillo said, "Dangerous winds and blowing dust are causing lots of issues, like accidents, downed power lines, and low visibility."

Trump Attempts to Void Biden's Pardons

Control of Syria AgreeOn a Ceasefire after MULTIPLE DEATHS

This past year the Middle East has been in chaos. From Israel to Palestine and Syria to Qatar, movements for peace are necessary to resolve tensions. Lebanon's Defence Minister Michel Menassa and his Syrian counterpart Murhaf Abu Qasra agreed on a ceasefire this Monday. This is

French Parliament Member Demands US Return Statue of Liberty

Proposed in 1865 by Édouard de Laboulaye and created sculptor by Bartholdi Frédéric-Auguste engineer Alexandre and Eiffel, Gustave construction of the Statue of was Liberty meant celebrate the close relationship between



America and France and to commemorate both the centennial of the Declaration of Independence and the abolition of slavery in the US. Raphael Glucksmann, a French member of the European Parliament, feels that the US no longer embodies these ideals of liberty and freedom that led his country to gift it to us in the first place, and as such, it should be returned to France.

"We're going to say to the Americans who have chosen to side with the tyrants, to the Americans who fired researchers for demanding scientific freedom: 'Give us back the Statue of Liberty. We gave it to you as a gift, but apparently you despise it. So it will be just fine here at home," Glucksmann told his supporters at a convention on Sunday.

This came in response to the Trump administration's attempted budget cuts to the National Institutes of Health. Last month, they introduced a policy that would cap government funding for indirect costs to medical research, such as electricity and biohazard disposal, at only 15% of the direct costs. This will cause programs researching conditions such as Alzheimer's, cancer, and heart disease to lose several hundred million dollars of funding in total if the policy is ultimately implemented. In response, France has started a government initiative that will provide

these researchers with funding if they work in France instead.

China's Mixed Economic Signals

China's economy, which is the world's second-largest, has recently had conflicting messages in 2025. This has left investors and analysts uncertain. The data shows a 5% GDP growth in 2024, but under the surface there is rising unemployment, slower factory output, and more. Since the global trade tensions have escalated with the U.S. tariff threats from Trump, this can cause more uncertainty with the economy.

Unemployment rose to 5.2% with youth joblessness at 16.1% and factory output



slowed. Deflation is a problem as well with consumer prices barely up (0.2% in 2024) and factory prices down (2.2%). It is unclear where China's economy will go from here.

Capitana: a Review

Cassandra James's debut novel, *Capitana*, tells the story of 17-year-old Ximena Reale, pirate hunter in training, as she goes on a mission to

rescue the queen from renowned pirate captain Gasparilla and attempts to earn the promotion to Cazadora. Along the way, she must grapple with her feelings toward the empire she serves, as well as choose which family she will ultimately remain loyal to: her birth parents, a pair of infamous pirates, or Admiral Gabriel Pérez,



the cazador who took Ximena under his wing after her parents' execution.

So often, media starring a "strong female character" falls into the trap of making her utterly infallible to the point that she is no longer interesting. James, however, has managed to create a main character who balances lethal competence with doubts and fears. Ximena is ruthless, a skilled fighter, and the top of her class at the academy. However, she still has challenges to overcome. Others judge her for her parents' crimes. Her faith in the law is tested as she sees, over the course of her mission, how it is enforced throughout the empire. Additionally, Ximena is completely incapable of trust at the beginning of

her mission, and she has to learn how to rely on others and work as part of a team. She is an excellent example of a protagonist who is capable and inspiring but still capable of character growth.

Ximena is also a startlingly accurate representation of a teenage girl. James, who is a recent graduate of Princeton's creative writing program, is young enough to still remember what it was like to be a 17-year-old girl. She has managed to capture the complicated feelings that a teenage girl has towards a hot but annoying older boy in a way that most older authors cannot hope to achieve. Many adult reviewers have disliked *Capitana* because of the romance between Ximena and her class rival, Dante, but I find that it actually makes Ximena more relatable to a high school audience.

In between all of Ximena's budding relationships is an amount of well-written action appropriate to a pirate novel. The various battles and duels are vividly described and easy to visualize. The final duel with Gasparilla is particularly fun because of the interesting terrain it takes place on. Some of the action can be less than fun to read, however: there are some fairly graphic descriptions of keelhauling, drowning, and injuries caused by a whip, so this book may not be for everyone.

The only thing that I did not like about *Capitana* was the second fake out at the end. The first fake out is necessary to make Ximena's final opinion on the empire clear. The second one would not be a problem, except for the fact that it is in the chapter immediately after the one containing the first fake out. The two false endings feel contrived simply because they're right next to each other. Otherwise, the ending is very satisfying, and the epilogue does an excellent job of introducing the coming sequel.

Overall, I loved *Capitana*, and I think it's perfect for our school library. I would recommend it to any high schooler who enjoys both action and romance.
