**Legislative Update** Dr. Stuart Little, district lobbyist, provided a legislative update. He provided status updates on bills related to budgets, special education funding, discussion on expansion of non-public school scholarship programs, graduation rate calculation, Board meeting process, and more. **Middle School Cheer 2025-2026** Dr. Kent Glaser, director of athletics and activities, and Ericka Waller, Trailridge Middle School associate principal, shared a proposal to add Middle School Cheerleading for the 2025-2026 school year. Later in the meeting, the Board <u>approved uniforms</u>, <u>equipment</u>, and coaching supplemental contracts. <u>Click here to view the presentation</u>.

Assessment Update Pam Lewis, associate superintendent of leadership and learning, and Dr. Dan Gruman, director of assessment and research, presented an update on winter 2024 assessments. The update provided winter snapshots, a high-level overview of Acadience Literacy and Northwest Evaluation Association Measure of Academic Progress (NWEA MAP) Reading data and Acadience Numeracy and NWEA MAP Math data. Dr. Gruman also provided details about iReady implementation and explained correlations between NWEA and iReady assessment results. iReady is a math resource being implemented across the district. The iReady Diagnostic Assessment is integrated into this resource. Pam Lewis then highlighted plans for the future, including but not limited to expansion of iReady math resources, expansion of LETRS (a professional development program designed to provide educators with the knowledge

and tools needed to effectively teach reading and spelling, grounded in the science of reading), re-starting structured walkthroughs, and the continuation of monitoring student progress. Click here to view the update.




## Junior Science and Humanities Symposium National Qualifiers

Winter Sports Wrap Up It was a thrilling winter for athletes in the Shawnee Mission School District! Dr. Schumacher highlighted a few state recognitions: In Boys Wrestling, Adam Hageman, a senior at Shawnee Mission Northwest, was state champion in the 175 pound category. In Girls wrestling, Lulu Kirk, a freshman from Shawnee

Mission South, was state champion in her bracket. Shawnee Mission South also had several top finishes including Stella Segura taking third, Addilyn Masters taking third, Rachel Wilson taking third, Sevyn Donovan taking third, and Siobhan Flanner taking second in their respective categories.

Shawnee Mission East was state runner up in bowling and Christian Lahey from Shawnee Mission East earned second place in individual titles. In boys swimming, Shawnee Mission East High School was state runner-up as a team. Gabe Cavin, representing Shawnee Mission Northwest, was named state champion and Max Cavin, representing Shawnee Mission Northwest, earned third place in 50-yard freestyle. Jack Eaton from Shawnee Mission North placed third in the 100 yard butterfly. Gabe Cavin earned second place in 100-yard freestyle. Emmet Lynch from Shawnee Mission East earned third place in 500 yard freestyle. Jonothan Guild from Shawnee Mission North earned third place in the 100 yard backstroke. A

team from Shawnee Mission East earned first place in the 200-yard freestyle relay.

Dr. Schumacher also congratulated the Shawnee Mission Northwest boys basketball team on back-to-back state championships!

In middle school championships- Indian Hills earned the top title in girls and boys basketball. "This represents a rundown of some of the highlights, but we congratulate all athletes and coaches on all personal and team accomplishments from this past season," Dr. Schumacher shared. "Shawnee Mission is proud of the 1,917 students who took part in winter sports and we're looking forward to an exciting spring!"

Superintendent Schumacher also shared the following statement regarding an executive order, signed last week, directing the secretary of education to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education:

"Last week, the Kansas State Board of Education and the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) released a statement in response to the President's actions. The Shawnee Mission School District will take guidance from our state leaders and we do agree that education is a state

issue. However, we have always appreciated the federal role in educating all students. As KSDE said last week, 'For decades, federal support has played a critical role in ensuring equitable access to education, particularly for students with disabilities, and those from low-income families and rural communities.' These are unprecedented times for public educators and for those families and communities who rely on public education and the promise that it provides to ALL students across this country. As I said when I was hired to be superintendent about a year ago, I believe strongly that public schools are the great equalizer in this country. I committed at that time to fight for our students, our families and our community. As public school leaders, there has not been a more important time in our careers to fight for what we know is right, and to do all that we can for those who don't have a voice and depend so greatly on the services that we provide. Having said that, our leadership team will work closely with our state leaders and our local Board of Education to ensure the students of the SMSD receive the resources they deserve. This will include strongly voicing our concerns when necessary and appropriate. We are All In for our students, and for the Shawnee Mission community."
