Key Points on Women in the Workforce:

1. Challenges:

• **Pay Gap**: Women still earn less than men in many industries, with the global gender pay gap estimated to be around 20% (though this varies by country and sector).

• **Discrimination**: Gender bias and sexual harassment continue to be pervasive issues in many workplaces.

• **Healthcare**: Women make up a large proportion of the healthcare workforce, particularly in nursing and caregiving.

• **Education**: The education sector also employs a high number of women, particularly in primary and secondary schools.

• **Digital Economy**: With the rise of the digital economy, many women are finding new opportunities for work through freelance, gig economy jobs, and online businesses.









- Practice, Practice, Practice: The more problems you solve, the more confident you will feel. Use class time wisely to work on problems in Delta Math.





The second quarter of statistics ends in December. We have just completed our work on mean median and mode and their relationships with the normal distribution. The students will finish the quarter with frequency tables.


During the next several weeks, we will finish our work with Area under normal graphs. In the final week, we will explore frequency tables and understand how frequency graphs can help display information in different forms.

Parents should take time to read to their children. Our lives are busy and often hurried but taking time to read to a child can be a moment of peace and relaxation for the parent and is a critical part of assisting a child to learn to read.

Career research is an essential tool in identifying the paths that align with your skills, interests, and long-term goals. In this edition, we'll guide you through the process of career research, highlight key business sectors, and offer tips for exploring your future professional journey.

The business careers the students will focus on include marketing and advertising, finance and accounting, human resources, management and entrepreneurship.

Accounting S2

The students will end the semester with learning about payroll. They will have a clear understanding of how payroll is processed, as well as the various deductions that are reflected in a paycheck.

They will calculate gross wages including hours worked, salaries, commissions, royalties and piecework pay.

After calculating gross pay, they will include mandatory deductions such as: FICA, Federal Income Tax, and State Income Tax to calculate net pay.








From the Desk of Mr. Arrington

- Structure of Government: Be familiar with the roles of the three branches of government—Executive, Legislative, and Judicial—and how they check and balance each other.


Global Issues: Understanding Global Conflict: What's Happening Around the World?

Bellringer Question: What caused World War II?

We began our World War II unit with this question.

Learning objectives

key learning objectives for studying World War II:



- Analyze the political, economic, and social factors that led to the outbreak of World War II, including the Treaty of Versailles, the rise of fascism, and the policy of appeasement.
- Examine the role of key events and decisions, such as the invasion of Poland.
- Identify the main Axis Powers (Germany, Italy, Japan) and Allied Powers (United States, Soviet Union, United Kingdom, France).
- Analyze the role of smaller nations and resistance movements during the war.
- Study significant battles such as the Battle of Stalingrad, the Battle of Midway, D-Day, and the Pacific Island-hopping campaign.
- Understand strategic objectives, outcomes, and their impacts on the course of the war.
- Analyze the development and use of new technologies, such as tanks, airplanes, radar, and nuclear weapons.
- Learn about the Holocaust, the systematic genocide of six million Jews, along with other marginalized groups targeted by the Nazis.
- Examine the creation of the United Nations and the development of international organizations designed to prevent future conflicts.
- Study the roles of major political and military leaders, including Adolf Hitler, Winston Churchill, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Joseph Stalin, and others.
- Investigate how propaganda was used by both the Axis and Allied powers to shape public opinion, boost morale, and maintain support for the war effort.
- Explore the role of media, posters, films, and speeches in promoting war efforts and justifying actions.



- 6. **Speak Clearly and Confidently**: Use a friendly, engaging tone and avoid slang or overly casual language unless the setting calls for it.
