Superintendent's Message

Dear Lumberjack Community,

As we eagerly anticipate the arrival of warmer spring weather, we are also diligently working on the 2025-2026 school year budget.

This year, the Governor's proposed budget includes a modest 2% increase in Foundation Aid for our district. However, overall State Aid to the district is projected to decrease by 3.85%. We expect to receive the final aid numbers from the state later in April. Additionally, we have had 40 teachers announce their retirements at the end of this school year. We extend our heartfelt congratulations to all of them for their dedicated service to North Tonawanda. Their retirements will significantly aid in balancing our budget for 2025-2026. As we move forward, we are carefully aligning our future staffing with our projected enrollment and anticipated revenue to ensure stable average classroom sizes and programming.

Spring is also a perfect time to reflect on the wonderful highlights from the winter season. We enjoyed exceptional band and chorus concerts and had the honor of hosting an All-County concert. The High School Musical, Hadestown, was a phenomenal success. Our Winter sports teams performed admirably, and the Unified Sports season kicked off with bowling. Our art department showcased student talent with the Student Spotlight Art Show. We also celebrated 20 of our High School students at the Quality Students of the Tonawanda's Awards.

Looking ahead, Phase 1A of our capital project will commence this summer with roof replacements and brickwork at Drake, Spruce, NTHS, and the transportation center. We are also excited to host the BOCES Regional Summer School at NT Middle School and our Extended School Year program at NT Intermediate.

** CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT UPDATE **

The North Tonawanda City School District voters approved a \$39.9 million capital improvements referendum last year. Construction began this past summer; Superintendent Dr. Jeffrey Jachlewski and the Board of Education are pleased to report that they are a year ahead of scheduled improvements on exteriors and roof repairs.

The District is looking forward to begin Phase 1A at Drake Elementary, Spruce Elementary and the High School this summer; followed by Phase 1B next school year.

Drake Students Learn About “The Legend of the Christmas Pineapple”



It looks like North Tonawanda Middle School Art teacher John Szablewski’s talents extend to literature as well! To kick off the holiday break, he recently shared his third book “The Legend of the Christmas Pineapple” with the Drake Elementary School students. “In 2020 I published “Hey! I’m Clay!” and in 2021, I published “Hey! I’m Sketch!” Each book talks about where their respective art material came from.”

He was inspired to write by his mother, who established a lovely tradition when he and his sister were young. “Every year she would buy my sister and I a Christmas storybook to read throughout the holiday season. I have always cherished those memories and I wanted other families to be able to make those memories together. The greatest gift we can give is memories.”

The story centers around a grandfather who explains to his grandson a family tradition centered on repurposed ornaments and a pineapple. “This story is actually based on my relationships with all my grandparents,” says Szablewski. “They had a whole list of interesting traditions that they would celebrate each holiday season. I tried to bring all of their memories out in the grandfather character. I can see myself as both the boy and the grandfather one day!”

Not only did Mr. Szablewski spend a morning reading to several classes at Drake Elementary, thanks to the Friends of Drake he was able to gift each child with their own personalized copy of the book to share with their families. “I really wanted this book to be a new family tradition, like Elf on the Shelf,” he explains. “There is a participation component to it where families can read and participate in bringing the legend to life!”

The best critique came from the reactions of his young audience. “Whenever you write, you never know how the audience will take to the work. I am honored that my story is being celebrated this year in the school district and within the local community. I loved hearing the students laughter and that they were excited to meet me, a real author! I appreciate that Dr. Jachlewski read my book during the Tree Lighting Celebration as well! I hope that this experience inspires the next generations of authors and illustrators!”

School Superintendents Partner with Niagara County Sheriff's Department for Active Shooter Training



Students representing the Niagara Falls, Niagara Wheatfield and North Tonawanda School Districts recently partook in a day of team building and learning at the Mobile Museum of Tolerance (MMOT). Niagara Falls City Schools Superintendent, Mark Laurrie says he was impressed by the museum. “It is the perfect vehicle to bridge our continued efforts to embrace tolerance and understanding among our students. It is a great centerpiece for today’s efforts.”

The event was held at Niagara Wheatfield High School as part of the Tri-District initiative to keep a conversation going about tolerance, multiculturalism and race. The MMOT vehicle is a world-class learning experience, utilizing innovative technology and interactive lessons to bring the message of tolerance directly to schools and communities nationwide. Their aim is to inspire people of all ages and backgrounds to promote human dignity by empowering them to raise their voices to combat anti-Semitism, bullying, racism and intolerance.

Wendy Weisbrot, Manager of Holocaust Education Resource Organization, says their educators empower participants with knowledge of the dangers of the past in order to create a better future and the museum has been very well received. Niagara Wheatfield CSD’s Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Technology, Jennifer Golias said, “I think it went great. A teacher told me how students were talking about it in class the day after and how powerful and important the presentation was. It made them think and left an impact enough for them to be talking about it with others outside the event.”

Each of the districts has also hosted the MMOT at their schools and it has been well received by staff and students alike. The Superintendents, Mark Laurrie (Niagara Falls CSD), Daniel Ljiljanich (Niagara Wheatfield CSD) and Dr. Jeffrey Jachlewski (North Tonawanda CSD) say they have been pleased with their collaborative efforts and look forward to continuing them for years to come. Mr. Laurrie says, “The stamina of effort these three years passed and what brought us together has been nothing short of phenomenal. Our students and communities are better for these efforts. The Museum of Tolerance was an outstanding vehicle to promote understanding and harmony among three schools that have much more in common than what divides us. The interaction, familiarity and friendships that are developing will last a lifetime.” Mr. Ljiljanich added, “The Tri-District Student Leadership group has given all of the students a chance to learn more about their neighboring districts. The interpersonal interaction through icebreakers, activities and shadowing has increased understanding and empathy for one another.” Dr. Jachlewski says none of this would be possible without the efforts of their staff and students. “Our districts are also committed to doing this work, and we are proud of our teachers and staff for providing unique opportunities and experiences for our kids. These opportunities and experiences will be what they remember when they leave our schools.”
