What is 4-H?

UConn 4-H is the youth development program of UConn Extension. As part of the University of Connecticut, 4-H has access to research-based, ageappropriate information needed to help youth reach their full potential. The mission of 4-H is to assist all youth ages 5-18 in acquiring knowledge, developing leadership and life skills while forming mindsets that will enable them to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of their families and communities.

Arethusa Farm Foundation

The Arethusa Farm Foundation is a newly established not-for-profit 501(c)3 entity created to receive from Mr. Anthony Yurgaitis the gift of a portion of the premises of Arethusa Farm which he and his late partner, George Malkemus, previously operated as a high-quality dairy farm.

The Foundation's primary goal is to establish an agricultural education center for elementary, middle and high school students, 4-H members and to the wider community as a whole.

Environmental Science Day

Campers will explore topics of forestry, wildlife, the science of insects and renewable energy with activities that may include water testing, exploring wildlife natural environments and tree identification.






Tuesday

Plants, Horticulture & Bees Day

Campers will explore topics including plants, horticulture & the science of bees through activities that may include hands-on gardening, watering, harvesting and understanding the production of honey.





Farm Animal Science Day

Campers will learn about dairy science, animal nutrition and farm animals through activities that may include meeting and handling different animals and creating animal crafts.



Thursday

<u>Agricultural Mechanics Day</u>

Campers will learn about safety, tool ID, hands-on skills & machinery overview with activities that may include building birdboxes, project planning and other hands-on activities.





<u>Veterinary Science & Small Animals Day</u>

Campers will learn about veterinary science tools, cat and dog health, and other small animals through activities that may include dog grooming and handling, vet tool identification and working with rabbits.

Campers will learn about the skills used in real-world veterinary medicine for a fun, interactive, and educational experience. Cows, goats, sheep, pigs, rabbits, chickens, and horses are just some of the animals that you'll be introduced to, as you learn about anatomy, safe handling during examinations, identifying disease, treatments, and illness prevention. Immerse yourself in a veterinarian's daily rounds, as we cover nutrition, dentistry, and practice emergency response treatments. You can even learn to suture! Discover what a day in a veterinarian's life might entail as professional guest speakers visit our classes to share their experiences, along with the fundamental concepts and current issues in veterinary medicine. Enjoy this incredible enrichment opportunity to increase your knowledge in keeping animals healthy and happy as you explore a possible veterinary career and a life filled with animals!

Would you like to expand your knowledge about farm animals? Plan on getting your hands dirty caring for our farm animals and working around the farm. Learn facts and fiction about the many breeds of animals found in farming operations. But it's not all work and no play! A new discovery is waiting to happen surrounded by baby animals. The lambs, kids, foal, piglets, calf or kits all inspire the learning as we dive into the rhythm of farm life. This hands-on experience helps campers to understand that each animal has unique characteristics, eating habits, health requirements and seasonal needs to keep them safe and happy. Explore poultry power collecting eggs or watch chicks hatch and grow from eggs to legs. Dig a little deeper to cultivate a stronger appreciation for sustainable farming in our educational gardens filled with honeybees and pollinators. Build an understanding of how vital their role is in producing food that feeds us all. Soak up the sun, make new friends, replace screen time with fresh air and get ready for an unforgettable agriculture adventure!
