## *NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH*

A code talker was an American Indian who used their tribal language to send secret messages on the battlefield. While Navajo (Diné) code talkers are the most famous, at least 14 other Native nations, including the Cherokee and Comanche, served in both the Pacific and Europe during World War II. The idea began in World War I with the Choctaw Telephone Squad, but it wasn't until World War II that the U.S. military formally recruited and trained American Indian code talkers. Many of these individuals faced the irony of using languages they had been punished for speaking in boarding schools to aid the American war effort. Their instrumental impact remained classified until 2002, when Congress acknowledged and celebrated the efforts of these brave soldiers, saying that at "...a time when Indians were discouraged from practicing their native culture, a few brave men used their cultural heritage, their language, to help change the course of history."
