## *NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH*

Formed in 1974 as a way to supplement the activism of AIM (the American Indian Movement), Women of All Red Nations was the brainchild of women leaders including Lorelei DeCora Means, Madonna Thunder Hawk, Phyllis Young and Janet McCloud. In the 1970s, since many of the (mostly male) leaders from the American Indian Movement had been imprisoned, killed or were under the U.S. government's surveillance, WARN leaders worked to fill the gaps left behind by AIM. WARN spotlighted issues including racist education, environmental contamination

and, in particular, the forced sterilizations of Native women in the 1960s and '70s. The organization is credited for federal regulations on medical sterilization practices in the United States.
