



Car Rider Line 2025-26



- There will be TWO car rider lines.
- Parents will enter Foxland Drive entrance OR the Murray Lane entrance (the very last one before you get to Granny White Pike) on the left side where the current bus line is located.
- Students will be dropped off at the front door before parents exit onto Granny White Pike.


Arrival Procedures



- Doors will open at 7:25 AM at the main entrance and the gymnasium entrance
- All students will report to the gymnasium until they are dismissed to go to first period class at 7:35 AM.
 - If students want to eat breakfast,
 they may go to the cafeteria, but
 they must stay the whole time.

Late Start Arrival

- Buses will run at the regular time.
- Doors will open at 7:25 AM.



- Students will be released to classes at 8:20 AM.

Dismissal **New pattern for* 2025-2026



- School is dismissed at 2:57 PM.
- Students will go to the sidewalk along the front of the BMS building to be picked up by parents. Parents will use either the Foxland Hall or Murray Lane entrance to the car rider line.
- Bus riders will exit the building on the
 Murray Lane side along the new wing
 (C wing) and load buses in the new bus
 lane which exits on to Murray Lane.

6th Grade Academic Classes

English Language Arts

• ELA has a heavy emphasis on reading and writing. Students also participate in WordMasters to grow their vocabulary.

Social Studies

• Students will be looking at World HIstory from prehistory to the fall of the Roman Empire.

<u>Science</u>

• Sixth grade science focuses on energy, Earth's systems, and interactions between living things.

Math Placement



- Our goal for 6th grade math is to find the best "fit" for each student as they transition from 5th to 6th grade.
- Ultimately, based on all the data available, when will a student be ready for Algebra I?
- The following data points will be used to identify the class that is the best fit for each student.
 - > 3rd, 4th and 5th grade TCAP/TNReady scores
 - > 4th and 5th grade STAR/AIMSWEB Data
 - Math Placement Test
 - (given in May at the elementary school)
 - > 5th Grade Math Teacher Likert-scale Survey



• 6th Grade Math – Level 1

- This course covers the state of Tennessee 6th grade math standards.
- Students will take the 6th grade TNReady assessment.
- Students who successfully complete this course will enter into 7th grade math in 7th grade.

Math

 Completion of 5th grade math standards as evidenced by a comprehensive review of the data.

7th Grade Math

• 7th Grade Math (for 6th graders)



- This course covers the state of Tennessee 7th grade math standards.
- Student will take the 7th grade TNReady assessment.
- Students who successfully complete this course will enter Pre-Algebra in the 7th grade.



Prerequisites:

- Students must have a 3-year average on TCAP/TNReady mathematics of the 85th percentile or above.
- > AIMSWEB scores in the 90th percentile or above
- Students must score a 70% or above on the 6th grade math placement test.

8th Grade Math (Pre-Algebra)

Pre-Algebra (8th gr math for 6th graders)



- This course covers the state of Tennessee 8th grade math standards.
- > Students will take the 8th grade TNReady assessment.
- Students who successfully complete this course will enter Honors Algebra I in 7th grade. The grade earned in Algebra I counts as part of a students HS GPA.

Prerequisites:

- Students must have a 3-year average on TNReady mathematics of 95th percentile or above.
- > AIMSWEB scores in the 98th percentile or above
- Students must score an 85% or above on the 6th grade math placement test.

Academic Recovery is a program in response to students who have failed ELA or Math for a nine weeks. It is hosted on Saturday morning, and is an intensive time with small groups of students.

Teachers work with the small groups (2-4 students) to remediate the essential skills needed to put students on a path to success in the future.

Academic Recovery

When moving from elementary to middle school, a student's school day becomes more complex. With physical, emotional and social developmental changes, navigating the many responsibilities of the school day in middle school is a learning process that takes time.

hear....

- "My child won't advocate for herself!"
 "He doesn't want to speak in front of the class."
 - "She's never had to study before."
 - "My child is overwhelmed with missing assignments."
 - "He gets nervous when other people finish a test before him."
 - "She doesn't know how to organize her assignments!"
 - "He is shy and not making friends."
 - "They've never made a B (or C) before."

Tips for what you can do... 1) Track assignments with agenda checks.

2) Remind your child of passing period times and to use them wisely.

3) Routine 15 min. weekly check at home to cleanout binders and backpacks and write upcoming due dates

on a family calendar (assessments, projects).

4) Encourage your child to ask the teacher or email the teacher a question instead of you doing it for them.

5) Keep technology in a public area at home. Charge all devices in parent bedroom overnight.
