


"I felt so excited and overwhelmed with joy," said Bailey on how she felt when she found out her team's placements. "I personally prepared the 6 oz filets, the white sweet potato mash, the blackberry

The team, consisting of seniors Esther Chen, Ty Landianche and Olivia Jarreau of Dutchtown High School, and senior Caroline Palmer of Prairieville High School, must turn in plating photos, along with recipes, recipe costing, and menu pricing documents. The judges know what the dish is supposed to look like and deduct points from any deviation.

The Pro Start competition team is prepared to practice before and after school to prepare for the national competition. In addition, past students who have graduated from culinary institutes are helping them improve their skills. "We have to practice with no running water, two burners and one hour. If we forget to pack an ingredient or appliance, then we go without it because that's how the competition is," says Bailey. Bailey says she is most looking forward to the banquet after they compete.
