Attendance Letters

Summer Anxiety Group

The UW-Madison School Psychology Training Clinic (SPTC) is offering a four-week long evidence-based anxiety intervention program this summer. DECLUTTER YOUR MIND WITH MINDFULNESS!

Body Scan: Sit with your child and take turns naming where you feel tension in your body. Then, focus on releasing that tension.

Breath Counting: Count to 5 with each inhale and exhale. If the mind wanders, gently bring it back to the count.

Gratitude Practice: End the day by naming three things that went well, helping to shift focus away from worry.





NKE Rotations Updates

Music

- Kindergarteners are doing lots of bunny songs and working on singing independently
- 1st graders are creating DMSL songs and playing them on barred instruments
- 2nd graders are learning songs about the Earth.
- 3rd graders are learning about instrument families and finishing up our dance unit.
- 4th graders are reviewing instrument families and creating Rondo form pieces.
- 3rd and 4th graders will also be playing ukuleles soon!

World Language

- Kindergartners are learning to share what foods they like! In particular, ingredients in tacos!
- 1st graders are learning about zoo animals and their habitats!
- 2nd and 4th graders are focusing on clothing and what to wear in different climates.
- 3rd graders are learning about different rooms in a home!

Library/Technology

The Big Cheese by Jory John and Pete Oswald won the 2025 Golden Archer Award! NKE/s winner was Jumper: A Day in the Life of a Backyard Jumping Spider.

Third and fourth grade students will continue to explore the research process, with a focus on selecting sources, during library time. We will also design 3D printing projects with Mr. Ryan's instruction and support.

2nd Graders will learn basic functions in Google Docs and program Dash robots in the library. We will compare and contrast text features in PebbleGo and traditional nonfiction.

1st Graders will use PebbleGo to create slides in Seesaw. We will explore Early Reader and Fiction Favorite series and review strategies for finding good-fit books.

Kindergarten: Kindergartners will read examples of expository nonfiction and practice using Seesaw to share facts they learn. We will also practice coding with Code-and-Go Mice.
