Teacher's Corner: Math

Ms Ferrari - Algebra I/ Geometry

The Algebra I skills the students worked on this month included solving systems of equations using substitution, graphing, and elimination. They particularly enjoyed the lessons when they utilized Desmos to solve systems of equations and learned about the technology available to assist with doing Algebra classwork. Geometry students worked on the properties of triangles and used the concepts of similar triangles and the Pythagorean Theorem to solve the missing dimensions of triangles. They worked on Special



Right Triangles and were introduced to the basics of Trigonometry. Lastly, the students constructed an equilateral triangle out of construction paper. They analyzed its many properties that include but are not limited to three lines of symmetry, perpendicular bisectors, altitudes, medians, and a centroid.







Ms Fern - Algebra II/ Probability & Statistics

The Algebra II classes began the month of March with factoring trinomials. This lead to factoring special polynomials like perfect square trinomials, difference of two squares, and sum/difference of two cubes. Students then transitioned to completing the square that was a method of factoring unfactorable trinomials before learning the shortcut of the quadratic formula. By the end of March Algebra II students were able to determine the discriminant and begin working on rational equations. Probability & Statistics began



working on standard deviation concepts. They researched what standard deviation was and how to apply it to normal distribution, z-scores, and z-values under a bell curve.

Women's History Month


Bulletin Board



When arriving for their interviews at Hillcrest Academy North, students are told that this second chance IS their greatest opportunity; a chance to start over, a chance to shine, and an opportunity to overcome whatever adversity was facing them in the past. Each year, we as a staff are so impressed with the students for overcoming challenges and building positive futures for themselves. While there are many candidates to choose from, there is one, Anthony Leon, who stands out this school year.

"I know how it feels to be hated on, so there is no hate in me." This is what Anthony started with when I first met him in my office before the school year started.. Anthony further explained that he has faced both medical and social challenges. From a very young age, Anthony had to move from state to state because of his parents' work. He struggled to learn English and form relationships with his classmates because of multiple moves. He began to be untrustworthy with his peers and allowed himself to miss school and become credit deficient. Anthony will call it "being at the bottom of the barrel." But he never allowed any of it to stop him from persevering. His attitude and experience has allowed him to become who he is today, which is a kind, trusting, motivated honor student whose biggest attribute is simply being a gentleman.

Anthony is a positive influence to anyone that he crosses paths with. At Hillcrest Academy North, he is a leader among his peers, he is a role model that is seen as an exemplary student, and he is certainly someone who you would want your son and daughter to be friends with.

Anthony aspires to be an economics teacher, and if possible, get into politics to help cause positive change in the world. Although it will sadden me when he leaves Hillcrest Academy North in three months, it makes me so happy to know such a fine gentleman will be out in the world making such a positive impact with those he may encounter.

How did the unsung hero event go?

Each of the Unsung Heroes stories were compelling and inspiring. The story that touched me the most was one of a student athlete known as EJ. To sum up my experience at the Unsung Heroes event, I enjoyed conversing with my peers and the other Heroes of my region, and I'm grateful for the opportunity I was granted to be a part of a school that recognizes me and that also gave me the chance to make my mother proud.

Restorative Circles

In Kaplan's Class

I facilitated a restorative circle with my class where we explored the concept of "what makes you, you" and delved into the idea of the universe of obligation—how we define our responsibilities and connections to others. This concept is key to understanding the reasons behind our unit topic (the Holocaust) and how something like that occurred and still can.

The session was incredibly meaningful, as every student engaged wholeheartedly in the discussion, sharing their thoughts and listening to others with respect and openness. It was rewarding to witness the sense of community grow stronger, as students reflected on their individuality and the ways they relate to the world around them. The active participation and positive energy was truly great to see.

In the Classroom



The students are finishing the unit "La Escuela y las Tradiciones" in Spanish class. Students distinguish the similarities and differences between the patterns of celebrations in the school, family traditions of the target culture related to activities, school, family, and celebrations of the local culture in different Spanish countries. This unit fits precisely in the social studies component of high school standards, where students are exposed to different experiences, school and family traditions, foods and lifestyles of other people around the world with "Las Tradiciones Alrededor del

Mundo Hispano". Students are able to demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between practices of the culture studied. For instance, students have multiple opportunities to compare and contrast "El Poder de la mujer Latina", which is one of the traditions in South America and around the world, dating back since the rule of the Aztec Empire and "Afrolatinas".

Students discussed the impact of women in society since we are in "Women's History Month" and learned about it since it addresses multiculturalism, helping students develop a sense of diversity and respect for other cultures. Then, as an assessment students analysed, wrote and illustrated their own version of the "El Poder de la Mujer Latina". In addition, students worked in different projects in which they had to create a well-organized research about "La Mujer Afro Latina" in the school/ home in order to describe their favorite Afro-Latina in Spanish. Students were able to engage in conversations, express feelings and emotions, and exchange opinions and compare and contrast different school and family traditions from the Spanish-speaking countries and the United States.

Media Literacy Class

In Media Literacy class, the students explored the website www.JournalisminAction.org. This is a website by PBS NewsHour Classroom that helps students explore the ways journalists have covered major news stories throughout history. Students selected one topic to focus on from a list of twelve events/themes including "The American Revolution and Early Republic", "Exploitation: Labor and Immigration", "Watergate", and "Gender Equality". Students were able to view primary sources and use interactive features to help



them explore how investigative journalism works to prepare them to do their own investigative journalism.

STOPit Solutions

Students and staff were introduced to STOPit Solutions, a program that allows students and staff to report any concerns about unsafe, harmful, or inappropriate behavior to the HAN Safety Team.

Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to download the STOPit App onto their phones.

I have a twin sister with whom I share an incredibly close bond. She also has twin children, and I consider them like my own. We share a truly special and unique relationship.





Project SEARCH Update

This month the Project SEARCH interns became the first cohort to become certified in CPR-Heartsaver! The training was made possible thanks to support from the AHS PEACE Grant team and the education staff at Atlantic Mobile Health. The students will also be utilizing a new modified CPR and AED Basic Skills Game to reinforce the content learned at the training. The game was provided to the program as part of funding from the New Jersey Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services.



The Project SEARCH Program at Overlook Medical Center is now in its 9th year. The one-year immersive program provides intensive, hands-on training for students ages 18-21 with disabilities who are motivated to work and eventually seek paid employment in the community.



Understanding Supported Employment Options
Available AFTER Graduation

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT IN NEW JERSEY

Supported Employment helps individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) secure and maintain competitive employment, or work in a setting to prepare for competitive employment. An individual's interests, likes, and dislikes are important factors when considering a job or career path.



REQUIREMENTS OF COMPETITIVE **EMPLOYMENT**

<u>Wages</u>

Individuals are compensated at or above minimum wage, and at a comparable rate to coworkers without IDD performing similar duties with similar experience and education.

<u>Benefits</u>

Individuals receive the same benefits as other employees in a similar position with a similar level of service.

Scheduling

The schedule is determined by the needs of the employer, not the availability of the individual.

<u>Integration</u>

Employment takes place in a setting where individuals with and without disabilities have the opportunity to interact and work alongside each other.

Advancement

The same opportunities for promotion and advancement are available for employees with and without disabilities in similar positions with similar experience.

EXAMPLES OF SERVICES

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

Federal legislation signed in 2014 to help individuals access education,

training, and support services to succeed in the workplace.

Competitive Employment

Work performed on a full-time or part-time basis in an integrated setting that is compensated at or above minimum wage.

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services (DVRS)

The state agency which provides vocational services for individuals with IDD or other barriers to employment.

Check out our DVRS Go Bag:

"Employment First" State

An initiative that outlines that competitive employment is the preferred post-education activity. It presumes that all individuals, including people with IDD, are capable of integrated employment.

Pre-Employment Transition Services

 Offered to high school students to plan and prepare for entering the workforce.

Job Development

 Assists individuals with a job search, interview skills, and resume development.

Job Sampling

 Gives the individual the opportunity to explore different types of employment and identify areas of interest and ability.

Job Coaching

 Provides assistance with learning essential job tasks, transportation training, social skills, and can act as a liaison between the employer and employee.

Long-Term Follow Along

Ongoing support through worksite visits designed to help individuals maintain skills built during job coaching.

Trial Work Experience

 A workplace readiness assessment administered by a Supported Employment provider agency, such as Project HIRE.

*This is not a fully inclusive list. Services may vary between agencies, school districts, and funding sources.

NJ WORKABILITY

NJ WorkAbility offers people with disabilities who are working, and whose income would otherwise make them ineligible for Medicaid, the opportunity to receive full Medicaid coverage.

Through NJ WorkAbility, individuals can earn up to \$65,196 of gross annual income and maintain less than \$20,000 in assets without threatening their Medicaid status. The Work Readiness Academy serves students ages 18-21 with disabilities and provides a comprehensive employment training experience that incorporates both classroom-based instruction and community-based work-learning experiences. While in the

training classroom, students work cooperatively with similar aged peers to learn critical skills related to employment and socialization. Students also work on career exploration and planning, including the development of a person-centered, post-secondary vision and plan with clear goals and action steps. Program staff remain on-site during the internships to provide and fade support and assistance as needed. Students also participate in field trips focused on career discovery, independent living skills, recreation and independent travel training.






UCESC Annual Bulletin Board Contest

Clinical Corner


Empowerment is the process of becoming stronger and more confident. This allows Here are 5 approaches you might find useful:

- 1. Affirmations Start your day by repeating positive affirmations, such as: "I am capable" and "I believe in myself."
- 2. Surround yourself with positivity Positive, supportive people can help you believe in yourself and help you see your potential.
- 3. Be kind to yourself Practice self-compassion. Replace negative thoughts with more encouraging ones.
- 4. Celebrate your achievements Start with small, achievable goals. Accomplishing these helps build confidence over time.
- 5. Step outside of your comfort zone Try doing things that challenge you. The more you face fear and discomfort, the easier it becomes to handle them.

Group therapy continues to run smoothly and successfully as students demonstrate group cohesiveness with their peers and are eager to attend. Most groups are student led where they feel comfortable to use their voice and share opinions with their peers, supporting the theme of


Sensory Fidget Donation!



Community Based Instruction!











Work Based Learning!


Ms. Grace's Art Class!



Spring is a wonderful time of year, with flowers blooming, pleasant weather, and unfortunately, those dreaded seasonal allergies. Seasonal allergies can be frustrating for all ages, especially young children, who can only let us know through frequent rubbing of their nose, sniffling or wrinkling their nose, pulling on their ears, and clearing their throat. They may also develop sleep issues, mouth breathing due to nasal congestion, and dark circles under the eyes


If you have a child with allergies, here's what you need to know and how to help them find relief.

- Stay Indoors During Peak Pollen Times: Check pollen forecasts and limit outdoor activities, especially in the mornings when pollen levels are highest. Sign up for pollen count allergy alerts at <u>Pollen.com</u>.
- Keep Windows Closed: Close windows in your home and car to prevent pollen from entering.
- Use Air Conditioning: Run air conditioning instead of opening windows. Consider using HEPA air purifiers to reduce allergens.
- Wash After Outdoor Play: Have your child wash their hands and face right after coming indoors to remove pollen and even change their clothes.
- Shower Before Bed: Make sure your child showers and washes their hair before bed to get rid of lingering allergens.
- Start Medications Early and Stay Consistent: Over the counter medications like
 antihistamines, saline sprays or eye drops can substantially help to relieve allergy symptoms.
 Starting early can prevent symptoms from worsening and getting ahead of symptoms, instead
 of reacting to them, can calm the immune system and provide greater relief. Always, talk to
 your child's pediatrician before starting any new treatments.

Allergies or Illness? Here's How to Tell the Difference

Colds vs. Allergies

The symptoms of the common cold and allergies are very similar, which can make it difficult to tell the difference between the two.



One of the most common questions during allergy season is, 'How can you tell if it's allergies or an illness?' While both can cause similar symptoms, there are key differences. Allergies often come with itchy, watery eyes, sneezing and a runny nose without fever. Symptoms tend to last as long as you're exposed to allergens, such as pollen or dust. On the other hand, illness symptoms, like a cold or flu, usually include a fever, body aches and fatigue and often come on suddenly. If your child has persistent symptoms without fever or if they're triggered by certain environmental factors, it's likely allergies. However, if symptoms worsen or include fever, it could be an illness. Always consult with a healthcare provider to get the most accurate diagnosis. It's also important to know that allergies are NOT contagious and that symptoms can vary in intensity throughout the day, often improving when indoors or after showering.



Practical Supports for Home: Navigating Spring Changes- Tips and Tricks from CR Behavior

Team

March brings longer days, changing schedules, and often, travel plans for spring break. While these seasonal changes can be exciting, they can also bring challenges for children with autism. Disruptions to routine, sensory overload, and unfamiliar environments may lead to stress and anxiety. Here are some practical strategies to help make transitions smoother and build independence in the community.

Spring Break Travel Tips

Travel can be an overwhelming experience for individuals with autism due to new environments, changes in routine, and sensory overload. Whether your family is going on a road trip, visiting relatives, or flying for the first time, preparation is key to a successful experience.

Try these strategies to set your child up for success:

Prepare with Social Stories – Read or create a social story about what to expect when traveling, including what they will see, hear, and do. Reviewing pictures or videos of airports, hotels, and other new environments can also help.

Pack a Favorites Sensory Kit – Bring familiar comfort items such as noise-canceling headphones, fidget toys, weighted blankets, sunglasses, or preferred snacks to help manage sensory sensitivities.

Call Ahead for Accommodations – Many places offer sensory-friendly services, such as priority boarding on airplanes, quiet rooms in amusement parks, or reduced stimulation times at attractions. Contact locations in advance to plan accordingly.

Practice the Routine – If possible, take a mini "travel day" by visiting a nearby hotel, airport, or train station to help your child become familiar with the setting. Watching videos or role-playing different travel situations can also ease anxiety. Youtube offers a variety of video models of different settings.

Use a Visual Schedule – Create a step-by-step guide showing what will happen during the trip. Include pictures or icons to help your child understand transitions.

Social Story: "Going on a Trip"

"Soon, we are going on a trip! We might take a car, a bus, a train, or an airplane to get there. I might see new places and meet new people. Sometimes, trips can be exciting, but they can also feel different from home. That's okay! I can bring my favorite things, like my headphones and toys, to help me feel calm. My family will tell me what happens next. If I feel worried, I can take deep breaths or ask for a break. This trip can be fun, and I will try my best!"

Adjusting to Daylight Saving Time

Daylight Saving Time (DST) means changing the clocks forward by one hour, which can disrupt sleep schedules and daily routines. This shift can also be difficult for children with autism, who often thrive on consistency.

Ways to ease the transition:

Shift the Schedule Gradually – Start adjusting bedtime and wake-up times by 10–15 minutes earlier each night for a few days before the time change. This gradual shift can help prevent sudden sleep disruptions.

Use Natural Light & Movement – Exposure to sunlight in the morning and engaging in physical activity (such as stretching, walking, or deep pressure activities) can help regulate the body's internal clock.

Maintain Predictability – Keep mealtimes, school routines, and bedtime rituals consistent to minimize disruptions. Using visual schedules, timers, or countdown charts can help reinforce the change.

Create a Relaxing Bedtime Routine – Use dim lighting, calming music, and predictable bedtime activities to help ease the transition into sleep.

Social Story: "The Clocks are Changing"

"One day, the clocks will change. This means the time on the clock will be different, even though my day will feel the same. It might be lighter outside when I wake up or darker when I go to bed. My body might feel a little different, but that's okay! I can follow my schedule and do my bedtime routine to help me feel calm. After a few days, I will get used to the new time. My family will help me, and everything will be okay!"

By preparing for seasonal transitions and encouraging real-world learning opportunities, families can help their children navigate changes with more confidence, comfort, and success. Happy Spring From the Crossroads Behavior Team


