State Aid Update and Fair Funding Initiatives

Yesterday, we received the state aid figures for the 2025-26 school year, and we are pleased to share that for the first time in eight years, Pitman saw an increase of \$186,337 (or 3.9%) due to a one-time adjustment to the pre-existing School Funding Reform Act. While this increase is certainly a positive step, it's important to note that it does not include last year's Stabilization Aid of \$343,973. Despite this good news, this represents an overall *decrease* of \$157,636. Combined with the ongoing rise in expenses—such as healthcare, salaries, and energy costs—Pitman continues to face funding challenges. We remain committed to advocating for additional support to ensure our students receive the best education possible while minimizing the financial burden on our community.

The district remains steadfast in its commitment to student-centered decision-making, and in the coming weeks, the Board of Education and administration will focus on:

- Prioritizing essential student services and programs to maintain a high-quality educational experience
- Exploring cost-saving measures and alternative funding sources to mitigate the impact
- Maintaining transparency through regular updates to staff and the community
- Advocating for fair and sustainable school funding at the state level

To this end, today we hosted a meeting with Gloucester County Superintendents and Business Administrators, where we worked with our neighbors in the county to strengthen our advocacy efforts. April Miller, our Board President, visited as a leading voice on the funding formula, and she discussed ways we can jointly advocate for better funding for schools in Gloucester County.

As the saying goes, *it takes a village*. Now, more than ever, we encourage our school community to join us in this fight by reaching out to legislators and making our voices heard. Advocacy is critical, and we remain committed—both locally and in Trenton—to pushing for the funding our

students deserve. Together, we will continue working toward a more stable and equitable future for our district.

Boys' Basketball Achievement

Congratulations to the Boys' Basketball team for securing the #1 seed in the NJSIAA Playoffs and for their impressive first-round victory against Wildwood. It was wonderful to see the community support our athletes on the court.
