A New Addition to School Curriculum?

This addition will be taking action during the 2027 school year. These classes are open for anyone to take and they have brought in some new staff members to teach the classes at night. But what started it all? Reasons for the need for night school involved fatigue: Students were tired everyday and wanted more free periods during their school day. Students will be able to swap a period in the school day for a night class, meaning during that period of the day you get the time off but you have to show up to the night class you signed up for. They will be listed in the community portal as any other class would be.

The night classes will span 8pm to 12am. This means there is a limit per person during their school day. You can only take one night class. If staff members want a free period they have to cover a night class to make up for the free period time they would receive. Say the staff member wanted a second period off, if they want to do that they would have to cover one of the night classes or the night detentions.

Any student who receives a detention will have to attend one of the night detentions offered. They will also happen during the 8am-12pm time period. Educators are hoping this will help lower the amount of students who are assigned detentions.

During the students' free period, students will be able to leave the school. There will be an option on the attendance forms for a night class period. If students do not return in time for their next class, they will be given a night detention. For extra security there will be officers who remain at the front of the school to make sure that returning students are safe and responsible.

Freshman Jon Feltz said, "I am excited for this change but part of me thinks it won't work so well just because it's a big change."

Teacher Mrs. Money said, "I am not ready for such a big change but the opportunity to get out and see some sun during the day is rewarding."

Sophomore Maya Fernandez said, "I think this will help me a lot because I spend most of my time at night trying to fall asleep because my sleep schedule is so messed up. Hopefully this will help me out though."

Further information will be provided soon about whether they are fully sure about this change but until then, if you are a night owl keep this opportunity in mind.


Starting next school year, school will still start at 7:45am, but the classes will generally be shorter and there will be no need for lunch since the day will end at 12pm.

A New Security Adjustment Pine-Richland Will Require Lanyards For Students

For next school year, Pine-Richland has made the announcement that students will now require a lanyard attachment for both entrance rights and attendance. Due to the prior security incidents this year, the district decided that students must carry a new identification requirement that must be viewable at all times. Staff are required to ensure that students follow these rules on school grounds and security checks will be placed at random each quarter.

If a student forgets their lanyard, they will be placed in the office and a call home will be formally made for a parent or other accessible family member to deliver the missing lanyard.

Pine-Richland plans to make this a strict precaution within the school to ensure the safety of the students and staff during school hours. QR codes will be placed in homerooms in the morning and if late, the attendance check will be made within the office.

The students are allowed to customize the lanyard as long as it is school appropriate and the ID attachment is not affected in any manner. These ID's will have a picture of the student that is taken at the beginning of the school year, birth date, grade, and their identification number. These lanyards will be renewed every year for all attending students.

Students who do not abide by these requirements will be promptly sent to the office as well as a potential detention and a call home.
