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# From Rabbi Malkus, Head of School

#### A New Signature Program - The Sharon and Jacob (z"l) Benus Social Entrepreneurship Program

This school year CESJDS launched the Sharon and Jacob (z"1) Benus Social Entrepreneurship Program, a unique and, we feel, significant way to connect our school's core value of *Tikkun Olam*/Repairing the World with important skills and habits of mind that will be essential for our graduates. This entrepreneurship and social impact program continues CESJDS' long history of educational innovation by applying the start-up spirit we see in Israel to society's most pressing challenges and connecting this work with our core Jewish values.



Our program has been developed in close partnership with Henrik Scheel who heads an educational organization called Startup Experience and has helped develop several successful social entrepreneurship programs in the San Francisco Bay Area and general entrepreneurship programs at universities and independent schools around the country. Henrik is a professor of entrepreneurship and teaches entrepreneurship courses at Harvard, Stanford, Dartmouth, UC Berkeley, Johns Hopkins, and other colleges. Our program has already seen exciting initiatives in each of our three divisions.

Throughout the divisions, students are learning about the entrepreneurial mindset, toolset, and skillset, including design thinking, problem-solving, business modeling, customer interviewing, the startup method, prototyping, and pitching. We are integrating Jewish values, texts, and philosophical reflections to explore ethical perspectives and demonstrate inspiring Jewish models of entrepreneurship and social innovation. We are fortunate that a number of CESJDS alumni are social entrepreneurs who have made a tremendous difference in the world and are available to speak to our current students. We are thrilled that this unique JK-12 program will create a curricular arc across the school focused on social entrepreneurship.

The Sharon and Jacob (z"I) Benus Social Entrepreneurship program has a number of key learning outcomes and is being presented to students in developmentally appropriate lessons from JK-12 grades. In the program, students gain:

- Real-world problem-solving experience
- Leadership and collaboration skills
- Deep research into pressing societal issues
- Business acumen as they develop and present their projects in the Upper School
- Engagement with Jewish values applied through the entrepreneurial process

In this edition of *The Lions' Roar* you will read about how our master educators are weaving the idea of being a Changemaker (what we call the program) into the Lower School curriculum. You will have an opportunity to see how entrepreneurship skills are taught in the Middle School. Finally, you will learn about the two-day Boot Camp that kicked off four months of preparation for an idea-pitch contest in January for High School students. We are thrilled about the tremendous progress we have made in launching the Sharon and Jacob (z"I) Benus Social Entrepreneurship Program and we know you will enjoy reading in depth about this innovative CESJDS initiative in the following pages of *The Lions' Roar*.

## Lower School Log: Learning to Be a Changemaker - Bringing Social Entrepreneurship to the Lower School

Imagine a room filled with pairs of Gurim and Kindergarten students. They have just finished hearing *A Solution for Cold Feet* read aloud, and each group is now working together to create and draw a picture of a solution to an everyday problem. What can I do if I'm bored? How can I play if it's raining? Perhaps the room is instead full of fourth graders prototyping solutions to littering in our school and community or first graders using blocks and Legos to prototype solutions for animals who need to cross roads (over, under, across, through) that pass through their habitat. These activities were just a fraction of our Lower School STEM Day. Students in every grade explored the relationship between seeing a problem and finding a solution for it as they worked to identify solvable issues in the communities to which they belong. They learned what it means to be proactive and began to see themselves as changemakers who can affect problems in the world around them, whether they were second graders

taking their cues from the book *Unselfish* or third graders promoting recycling in our school or fifth graders debating how to manage the overlap of local wild animal populations with local residential areas.

Since that first program in the fall of this school year, Lower School teachers have woven the idea of being a changemaker into various parts of our curriculum. Students in Grade 2, for example, already study what it means to be a good citizen of our various communities throughout the year. Recently, these students researched changemakers from history and created videos explaining how each person studied made a difference. Now, using what they learned from their research, they have begun brainstorming solutions to real community problems and will present their proposed solutions as part of a Shark Tank experience. grades as well. 4th grade students took part in a virtual visit from CESJDS alumni Max Levitt '07, who answered questions about *Tikkun Olam*/Repairing the World through Leveling the Playing Field, the sports equipment donation nonprofit that he founded and directs. Our 5th grade students are incorporating changemaking into their *Tu Bish-vat* Environmental projects, and our entire Lower School took part in a Kindness Challenge with an emphasis on positive changemaking. As we move toward the end of this first year of our new Changemakers initiative, the CESJDS Lower School is looking forward to exciting new programs and curriculum to come.

## Social Entrepreneurship & STEM in the Middle School

The Middle School division is using Social Entrepreneurship to empower students to make a positive impact in the world while gaining valuable skills in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math). Social Entrepreneurship is about creating innovative solutions to address societal challenges, and our students have already been introduced to the power of this concept firsthand. Middle School students learned more about the High School's Social Entrepreneurship program during Innovation Minimester. The High School team who won the recent Shark Tank competition shared their inspiration, ideas, and processes.

During our Middle School STEM Days, students participated in a challenge that incorporated Social Entrepreneurship and

engineering principles. Students were presented with a scenario about a community in need and discussed how a bridge would benefit that community. They then used their engineering skills to build a bridge using the materials provided. Teams competed to see which bridge design held the most weight. This hands-on project gave students the opportunity to think critically about how engineering and social change intersect, fostering creativity and problem-solving skills.

Looking ahead, we are excited to offer a new Social Entrepreneurship elective during the 2025-2026 school year. This semester-long course will be open to interested 7th and 8th grade students. This course offers students the opportunity to make a real change in the community, living our School's value of *Tikkun Olam*/Repairing the World, while

## High School Highlights: Social Venture Preserves Tradition & Values from Dor L'Dor

We officially launched the Sharon and Jacob (z"l) Benus Social Entrepreneurship Fellowship program in the High School with a two-day Boot Camp led by Henrik Scheel, Founder and CEO of Startup Experience, on September 19, 2024. Mr. Scheel guided 17 students through the process of building new social ventures that integrated Jewish values, texts, and philosophical reflections to explore ethical perspectives and demonstrate inspiring Jewish models of entrepreneurship and social innovation.

At the end of the two-day Boot Camp, five teams presented their ideas to a panel of JDS parent-entrepreneurs for feedback. The teams then had the option to continue developing their ventures over the next four months in preparation for an idea-pitch contest in January. Guided by Matthew

Landy '18, High School Social Entrepreneurship Program Coordinator, four of the original teams participated in this Shark Tank-like "event" with the winning team awarded \$1,000 seed money to continue developing their venture.

We asked the winning team, StoryBridge (now known as GoldenMemoirs), to share more about their social entrepreneurial journey. Team members include: Daniel Jacobson (Grade 11), Yedidya Milner-Gillers '25, Coby Schlactus (Grade 11), and Leo Steindecker (Grade 11).

# How did your group come up with the idea for your business, GoldenMemoirs? Please share more about the business and how it is related to the School's core value of *Tikkun Olam*.

We were told by the leader of the program Henrik Scheel to think about problems. We identified the problem that people's life stories and legacies were being lost. We had each wanted to find a way to preserve our grandparents' legacies, but discovered severe problems: a time barrier and lack of structure and assistance. We brainstormed different solutions and decided that an Al-assisted biography would effectively solve the problem. Our business is special and reflects the School's value of *Tikkun Olam*/Repairing the World. It strengthens familial bonds as it preserves traditions and values from *Dor L'Dor*/Generation to Generation. Two of us have already created biographies through our company for our grandparents and we have witnessed firsthand how captivating and moving our product is for our families.

#### What have been the benefits and challenges of the program thus far?

Firstly, the program taught us what entrepreneurs do: they solve problems. We learned about the start-up process, and what a business needs to succeed. It has honed our business skills, as well as helped us channel our values into a business we are passionate about. The biggest challenge has been finding time to work on the business consistently. As JDS is an extremely rigorous school, it has been tough balancing schoolwork with working on the company. Additionally, at times our business idea seems impossible, due to the large amount of work needed to create the company. The best thing to get us through these challenges is our strong belief in the business' mission.

#### What are your short-term and long-term goals for your business?

In the short term, we aim to attract new customers to our website goldenmemoirs.ai to increase sales, as well as raise money from investors. In the long term, we plan to use the money from our sales and investors to automate the product wherein we will have AI doing the interview for us, scaling us from a business that can do \$100,000 in sales to millions of dollars.

#### In what ways has the school supported you in these goals?

Our company exists purely because of the new Social Entrepreneurship program. We all had business ambitions, and this program allowed us to effectively channel these ambitions into reality. Mr. Landy has guided us through this program, being an essential mentor, and Henrik Scheel has given us the knowledge to develop our business. Additionally, through the program's ending Shark Tank, we were able to gain an early, unconditional investment into our company, which has helped fuel our initial growth.

He knew I wanted to go into business and encouraged me to use my success to give back. I'll never forget when he told me, 'Go into business and build something meaningful — maybe even a new science wing for JDS.' This isn't quite a science wing, but it's a start," Zach said.

By channeling their professional success into meaningful philanthropy, these alumni exemplify social entrepreneurship — leveraging their resources to strengthen the community that shaped them. Their gifts ensure that CESJDS students will continue to be nurtured, challenged, and inspired for generations to come.
